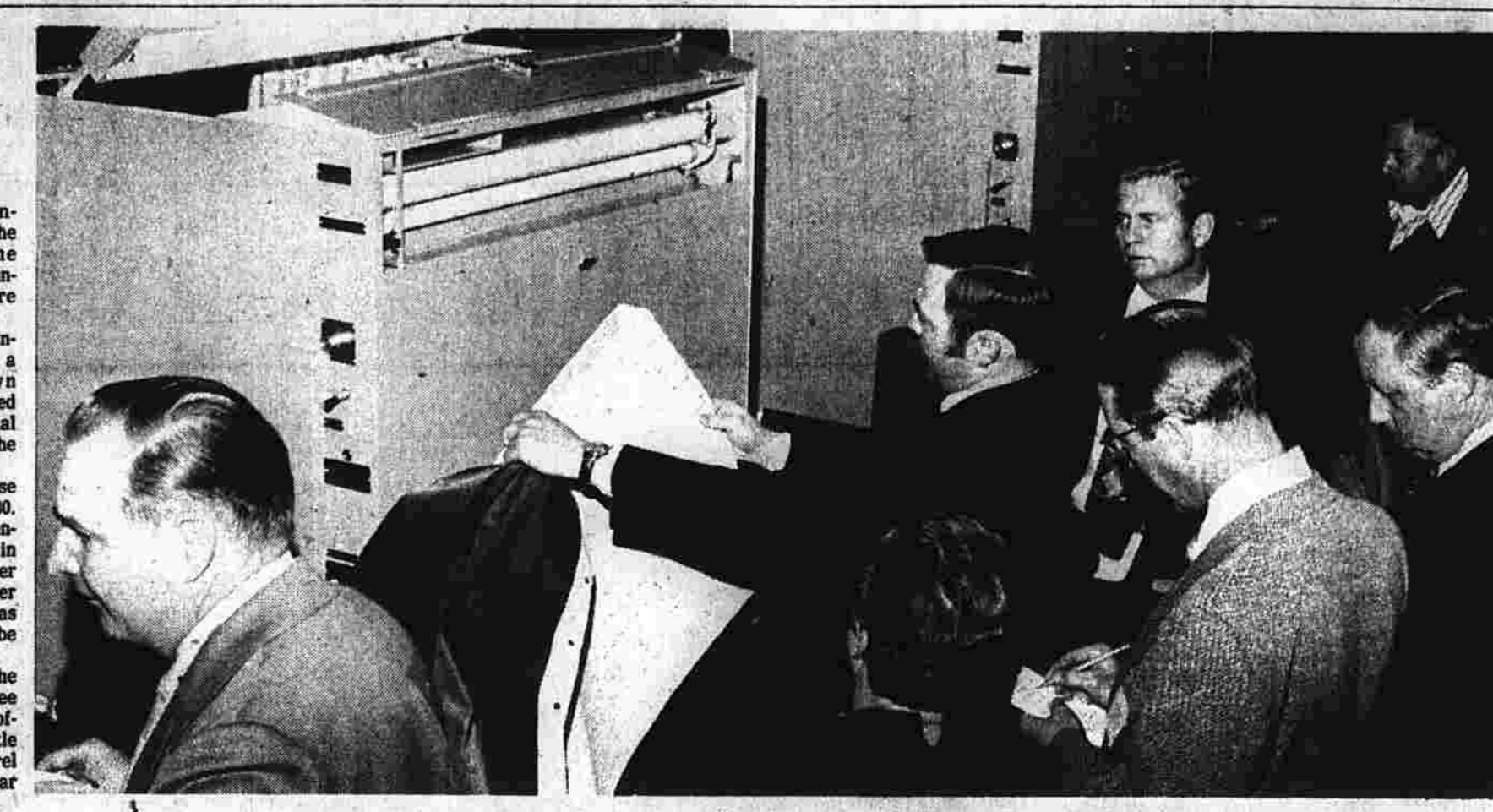

### Sheinwold on Bridge

**DIAMOND OCCUPY CENTER OF STAGE**  
By ALFRED SHEINWOLD  
Diamonds occupied the center of the stage in the play of today's hand. They gave declarer his best chance to win an important trick, and then a convenient way to lose a trick. South's chance to win a trick didn't work, but his chance to lose a trick brought the contract home.

South dealer

West opened the jack of spades, and South won with the ace. Declarer drew trumps with the ace and king, after which he led a spade to dummy's king.

The stage was now the first play in diamonds. Before we see that first play, let's examine declarer's problem. He runs the risk of losing a diamond and three clubs.

He must work out a way to limit the loss to just three tricks.

In tackling the diamonds, declarer led the three from dummy. East played low, and South finessed with the ten from his own hand. He didn't expect to win this finesse, but he did want to duck the trick into the West hand.

Diamond Returned  
West won with the queen of diamonds and saw the danger of returning either a spade or a club. After some thought, West returned a low diamond.

South won with the ace of diamonds and led his last diamond to dummy's king. If the suit broke 3-3, dummy's last diamond would be good for a trick. As it happened, East's center on a pair of New York police officers discarded a spade on the third diamond, and it was clear that dummy's last diamond was not high.

What do you say?  
Answer: Bid 1NT. With 8 points in high cards you can clearly afford to respond, but you cannot bid a suit of your own and lack the length in spades you would need to raise partner's suit. The response in no Trump is the only remaining possibility.

### Bucky Beats Rhythm For Senior Benefit

For sixty-five years, Carlton L. Buckmaster of Rockville has been beating out the rhythm for area bands, orchestras and drum corps of which he has been a member. Better known as "Bucky," he began swinging the sticks when he was 18. For a while, he was employed as a printer at The Herald.

NEW YORK (AP) — Carefully pulling a white glove onto his left hand before lighting a cigarette, actor Peter Cushing explains, "It's to keep nicotine off my fingers. I think the stains look so ugly in color films."

A thoughtful gesture, since many horror films are in color and Cushing has appeared in some 40 of these, often as the fiendish Frankenstein (seven times), or "the chap who's always trying to drive a stake through Dracula's vampire heart," or, perhaps for a change of pace, a hanged man who emerges from the grave to destroy the men who put him there.

A gentle, soft-spoken Englishman, Cushing's latest ally into horror is in a film called "Asylum," advertised with the warning "You have nothing to lose but your mind." Usually talkative, the 59-year-old Cushing only will say about his part in this movie that "I'm rather an impetuous gentleman with the wonderful name of Mr. Smith who goes to a tailor to get a suit made and that's all I can tell you."

Cushing, a widower who has occupied his idle hours painting, bird watching, and making models, acted as an actor when "Scream and Scream Again," says he thinks such films are popular because "they're like them. They take the viewer away from his worries and anxieties. He knows he is going to see fantasy and not reality and that he is entertained."

"Since the purpose of all actors is to entertain I appear frequently in the kind of film that does just that — entertains."

Cushing notes that in the past 18 months he has made 11 films "not always playing the leading part of course. I literally haven't stopped acting and it's been a wonderful experience."

His next job he says is playing his usual role as Dracula's playmate in a film called "Dracula Is Dead... But Well and Living in London."

As to the future, he says, not cryptically, "when I signed my contract for 'Frankenstein Must Be Destroyed' I wrote next to my signature 'Over My Dead Body.'"

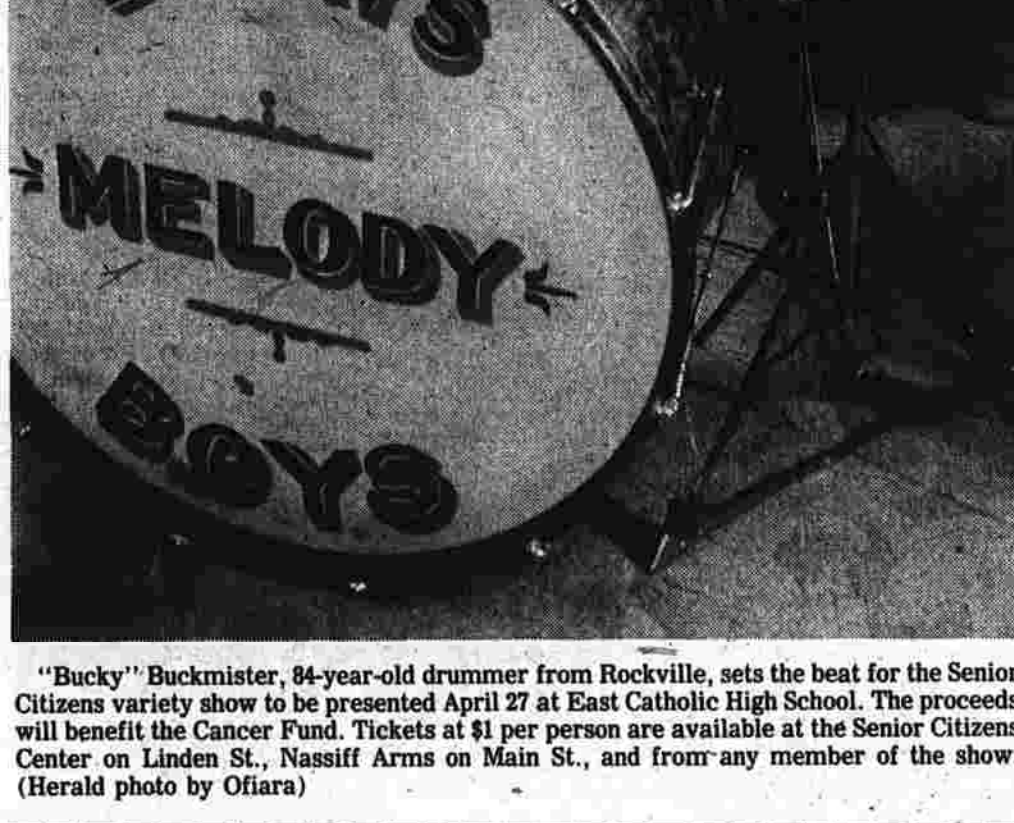

### Students Take a Chance In College Gambling Class

CHESTER, Pa. (AP) — It's a sure bet that 40 students at little Widener College felt the odds were stacked against them in Jill Masterson's class.  
But they were game for something different, and so was the petite Miss Masterson, a 32-year-old professor with a doctorate in psychology.  
The course was entitled "Gambling 729. What else? Two crap tables and a roulette wheel built by a student, plus some card tables, were set up in a long, narrow, carpeted room in the basement of the campus library.  
Dr. Masterson even had loaded dice and marked cards for one class session.  
Gambling 729 was her idea for a one-month, one-credit course which the college features each year. But she didn't think she'd get approval of the program committee, which has final say on all courses.  
"I thought there would be adverse reaction," she said. "But there was none. They just approved it and said they were happy to see something 'zazzy'."

### Latest Effort To Boost Dollar May Devalue It

WASHINGTON (AP) — The decision of six European nations to let the value of their currencies rise and fall together may mean another drop in the dollar's value.  
But it could give the United States a better trading break in those Common Market countries.  
The situation is so uncertain at this point that no one in a position of authority is willing to predict what will happen once the world's money-exchange markets reopen March 18 after a two-week shutdown forced by the monetary crisis.  
The European move is the most complex yet in a string of international monetary steps taken in the past year and a half to halt speculation and restore peace to money markets.  
No one is sure the joint European currency float will work.  
The six nations—West Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark and Luxembourg—have agreed to let their currencies float with the dollar. This means that the six currencies would be free to find their own values against the dollar from day to day.  
But it is a joint float, meaning the six nations want to keep their currency values among each other fixed at roughly the same relationship, give or take 2.25 per cent.  
Thus, they will allow their currency values to rise or fall together against the dollar.  
If, for example, a wave of speculation in West Germany forced up the value of the mark 5 per cent against the dollar—meaning the dollar

could buy 6 per cent fewer marks—then the other five nations would move to push up the value of their currencies by roughly 6 per cent.  
In unofficial transactions in Frankfurt Monday, the dollar was worth 2,192 marks, compared with 2,178 last Friday.  
Any time the dollar drops in value against other currencies, imports from those nations become more expensive to the U.S. consumers, and American exports into the affected countries become cheaper.  
For this reason, the six nations—and other countries which may join the float—probably will not allow the value of the dollar to drop too far.  
They could halt any dollar depreciation by buying up excess greenbacks with their own money. Or the United States could force foreign currencies to buy up excess dollars.  
A currency float means that things could go either way—the dollar could rise in value in relation to other currencies, as it did in unofficial trading among banks in key European cities Monday. If this rise became a trend, the 10-per-cent devaluation of the dollar on Feb. 12 would have less impact on the price of foreign imports.  
However, most experts appear to be suggesting that a decline in the dollar's value against the other six nations is the most likely possibility.  
That is because of the tremendous surplus dollars still overseas—some \$80 billion worth by latest estimate. There is also foreign concern over U.S. inflation and a continuing balance-of-trade deficit.  
President Nixon says the dollar will not be devalued again.  
But, if the United States agrees to a lower value for the dollar in relation to the six nations before any action is taken to defend it, it would amount to a devaluation against those currencies.  
Under the world monetary system that broke down in mid-1971, currencies were exchanged according to fixed values that could vary up or down by 1 per cent from their official exchange rate with the dollar.  
The dollar was at the center of the system because the United States emerged from World War II with the strongest economy. When it appeared that a nation's money was either falling or rising above the 1-per-cent range, it would buy up dollars with its own currency.  
That was fine until expanding trade and U.S. business operations overseas, stationing of troops around the world, rebuilding other countries, and other policies created a big U.S. balance-of-payments deficit and a dollar gold overseas.  
Meantime, Japan and Europe recovered from the war and began competing directly with the United States in world markets. Their currencies became stronger. They began building up trade surpluses. The U.S. gold supply dwindled.  
Nixon brought the system down on Aug. 15, 1971, by ending the nation's long-standing pledge to convert foreign dollar holdings into gold. Since then, U.S. inflation and a continuing balance-of-trade deficit.

## In World of Fish Stews Cioppino Is All-American

By TOM HOGE, AP Newsfeatures Writer  
With the winds of winter still chilling our bones, a hearty fish stew seems a good way to thaw out of an evening.

Fish stew, or chowder, is a universal dish made wherever people catch the denizens of the deep, from Cape Cod to Polynesia.

The Portuguese also have their fish stew, a rib-sticking combination of sea bass, clams, mussels, shrimp, sole, eel, tomatoes, olive oil, pepper, parsley, rosemary, ground anchovies and at the last moment, a little butter and white wine.

Most famous perhaps is the Bouillabaisse of Marseille, made from a large variety of fish found in the Mediterranean. Purists claim that a proper Bouillabaisse should contain at least eight different kinds of fish, but I have had admirable samples featuring four or less.

Heat olive oil and add garlic and onion. Five minutes later add green peppers, mushrooms, tomatoes and simmer 10 minutes. Add clam broth and mussel juice and cook another 20 minutes. Add red wine and tomato paste and simmer 30 minutes more. Season with salt and pepper and add brandy and white wine. Add fish and shrimp, scallops and lobster with claws cracked and tail cut into sections. Add clams and mussels and place on top of the stews. Add red wine and unprocessed foods so popular in Italy.

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### Ribicoff Seeks End To Farm Subsidies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., says he will seek to end \$4.6-billion federal farm subsidy program and to compel President Nixon to freeze all food prices.

"Food prices are 15 per cent higher today because of the inflationary farm subsidies," Ribicoff said as he prepared to introduce legislation to end the subsidy program.

He called the present subsidy program outdated and said it primarily benefits large-scale farming operations.

The Agriculture Act of 1970 expires this year and Ribicoff said this presents an opportunity to kill the subsidy program.

"If we are ever to bring food prices under control, the old laws must be abolished and modern legislation, designed for a free market economy, enacted," he said.

### Farmers Must Pick Feed Grain Program

Friday is the final day of the farm program sign-up period and area farmers are asked to look carefully at the choices offered by this year's farm programs and to pick alternatives that best fit their individual operations, according to Joseph Szegda, local farm program official.

The feed grain program offers alternate plans, according to Szegda, so each producer should get details from his county office and then do some figuring to see which program will yield him the best return on his land, labor and management resources.

Szegda said the feed grain program has plans allowing producers to set aside land or to participate in this year without any set-aside.

The official said the feed grain program includes two plans. Under the basic plan, he explained, a farmer may set aside 25 per cent of his feed grain base and receive payments, loans and other benefits.

Some producers who sign up and maintain his farm's conserving base is eligible for certificate payments, loans and other program benefits without restricting his total feed grain acreage. Under this plan the producer need maintain only his conserving base and is then free to plant soybeans or other crops on his remaining cropland. Other crops means other than feed grains or quota crops.

A producer who signs up and maintains his farm's conserving base is eligible for certificate payments, loans and other program benefits without setting aside any land, Szegda said.

Some producers who sign up for the feed grain program may wish to consider uses of set-aside before deciding between the 25 per cent and the zero set-aside plan, the chairman added.

## Ex-Prisoner Says Chinese Wanted Downey Spy Label

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Ohio schoolteacher who spent 32 months in a communist Chinese prison said today two former CIA agents imprisoned by China for 20 years apparently would have been freed long ago if the United States had admitted they were spies.

Steve Kiba, Akron, Ohio, said in an interview that the Communists indicated to him in 1964 that John T. Downey and Richard Fecteau would be freed if the United States publicly admitted that they were Central Intelligence Agency agents.

Kiba said Downey and Fecteau told him and fellow prisoners they had already admitted to the Chinese that they were on a CIA mission.

However, only in recent months has the United States publicly admitted they were CIA agents.

Kiba was one of 14 crewmen aboard an Air Force B29 shot down by the Communists on Jan. 12, 1963, over North Korea. Eleven members of the crew were captured and then taken to Red China, Kiba said. The other three apparently were released.

The Chinese indicated that Downey and Fecteau would be released very shortly after such an admission was made, Kiba said.

## Constant Revision Needed To Keep Road Maps Current

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Both roads and road maps have changed significantly in the 30 years since Paul T. Tidens started dealing with them as surveyor, cartographer and aerial photographer during World War II.

"The creation of the Interstate Highway System has been a major development in the nation's road network," says Tidens. "But they're doing some work all year and when a major connection to a highway or a new bridge opens we want to get the information out to the public as soon as possible. If we know a road will be closed for six months we put that on the map."



CREATING A MAP — The painstaking task of adding place names is one of the numerous steps involved in the preparation of a road map.

On the technical side he has seen map production grow from a one-man operation where the cartographer "did everything" to an assembly-line effort involving such specialists as designers, researchers, cartographer-draftsmen, cameramen, lithographers and printers.

"Original road maps were in black and white until about 1932, when they went to two colors," says Tidens. "They're getting more complex all the time and in 1960 we began putting out four-color maps on which you could put twice as much material and still have it legible."

"We have to keep the information the motorist needs clear," he goes on. "The basic idea is to help someone get from where he is to where he is going as easily as possible, providing safety, enjoyment and trip-saving him gasoline."

Opening of new sections of roads, connections between roads, as well as changing of highway numbers, annexation of territory by towns, and updating of population figures make con-

stant revisions necessary. There were 18,000 changes in maps and information from 1972 to 1973 in the Atlas, which covers all 50 states, Canada and Mexico. The company, which also produces oil company road maps, revises them twice a year.

"In fall we get the bulk of revisions because highway departments have been working like mad all summer," Tidens says. "But they're doing some work all year and when a major connection to a highway or a new bridge opens we want to get the information out to the public as soon as possible. If we know a road will be closed for six months we put that on the map."

Researchers are in close touch with city engineers and with every state highway department and get regular department bulletins showing construction in the state. A research car is constantly in operation, sometimes actually clocking mileage, at other times checking highway conditions and arranging for contacts in various areas — people who report on local changes.

"The index includes population figures and we have our own census system to keep up to date," Tidens points out. "We send out 26,000 queries every year to postmasters asking how many they serve in their area. We want to know the relative importance of a place in its locality. A town of 500 might make it on the map in Arizona but not in a population center like New Jersey."

The first road "maps," which appeared in the late 19th century, were merely verbal descriptions of the road, later accompanied by photographs of junctions and landmarks, Tidens says. Early maps were bulky and expensive items sold

## Interstate Road Aids Small Town

**CARROLLTON, Ky.** (AP) — No need to pity this small riverfront community. The concrete snake call an interstate highway did no great harm. In fact, it's been a boon.

Like hundreds of other little towns, Carrollton was startled when the traffic flow of its main street, a major interstate highway, was siphoned off by the new interstate four miles away.

"I'd say at least half of the town was afraid, especially the fellows who depended on tourists — like me," Tommy Combs, owner of a small motel, said.

Carrollton, population 4,200, is located on U.S. 42, halfway between Louisville and Cincinnati. It has both the Ohio and Kentucky rivers on its borders, but isn't a port call for either of them.

For years, the steady parade of cars and trucks poured through the town, a percentage of them stopping for rest, food or lodging and making Carrollton just a little bit richer.

Then, in the summer of 1969, I-71 was opened to traffic.

"So many people here made the remark that they'd seen other towns where the interstate states killed 'em," Randall Kely, a liquor store clerk, recalled.

But, for Carrollton, it wasn't that way at all. If anything, the community has prospered since that summer day in 1969 and I-71 has helped it.

"When the interstate road first opened, we had a reduction in traffic flow, of course," H.C. Fryman, assistant cashier at a local bank, said.

"But this was mainly heavy trucks and that sort of thing and those people weren't stopping here much anyway. For them, our being centrally located didn't mean much. They just wanted to get to Louisville or Cincinnati as fast as they could," he added.

William G. (Butch) Livesey, who operates a restaurant and bar, figures the profit from and loss to the interstate road just about balanced out as far as Carrollton is concerned.

"And having a state park next door was the key, he said. "Sure there was a lot of traffic here at first, but the volume is probably double or triple on I-71 and if you've got that many people on the interstate, there are bound to be more that drop off it," he said.

"And, in the summer, we have a lot of tourist trade and Gen. Butler State Park brings a lot of that," his wife, Lynn, said.

Then, too, Carrollton now is the world's second largest burley tobacco market.

During the 15 years that I-71 was on the drawing board, industry came to Carrollton. Dow Corning has a plant just outside town, a division of American Can Co. is located closer to the city limits and Kentucky Utility Co. has an expanding power plant eight miles north, at Glasgow, Ky.

"We never would have bought up this plant site except for the interstate," Arthur Mandell, plant manager for American Can's M&M chemical plant, said, adding that he employs 310 persons.

But not everyone could profit from the new road. "It always happens to a small town. When you get good roads leading out of it, your customers leave home to shop," grocer Harold Carlisle said.

"But, really, I can't see much difference in my business," he added. Neither can Combs, the motel owner.

County Judge John F. Tilley also noted that U.S. 42 still is traveled by those "who aren't in a hurry, mostly the scenic types" and coaches they're more likely to stop and shop.

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Bobby Joe Keesee, the lone civilian to be released in Hanoi, is a middle-aged soldier of misfortune who hijacked a Thai charter plane 2 1/2 years ago and forced the pilot to fly him to North Vietnam.

He's also an Army deserter with a prison record in Arizona and once sought refuge in Cuba. But Fidel Castro wouldn't have him.

Bira Air, the Thai charter company, said Keesee hired one of its single-engine Cessnas in September 1970 at \$60 an hour on the pretext he was scouting locations for a motion picture.

The pilot, Sangiam Poomketkarn, said he flew Keesee all over northeast Thailand for four days and on the fifth took off from Ubon to return to Bangkok.

"We had been flying for about 20 minutes when the foreigner pulled a gun and said, 'Fly that way,' pointing to Laos and Vietnam," the pilot said.

"He told us to shut off the radio. My copilot and I tried to work out a way to disarm him but the plane was too small to move about in."

"We flew over Laos and we were hit in the tail by ground fire."

"We told him we were short of fuel and that we had been hit but he said 'I don't care.'"

"We told him we would have to land. We put down on a beach between Vinh and Dong Hoi."

"When we landed, villagers and children ran around the plane. He jumped out with small boxes of medicine and walked across the sand to the village."

"We took off and flew back to Thailand."

A Bangkok newspaper reported at the time that Keesee arrived from Manila on Aug. 31, 1970, gave his age as 36, and said he had been held prisoner by Palestinian guerrillas in Jordan for 36 months before.

He was described as "short, fat and crew cut."

Hanoi never said a word about its uninvited guest until it included his name on the list of POWs to be freed Wednesday.

Keesee's sister, Mrs. F.O. Riley of Amarillo, Tex., said in 1962 that he was born in Allison, Tex., the youngest of six children, and that she raised him from the time he was a year old.

She said he quit school in the eighth grade, later enlisted in the National Guard and then joined the paratroopers in 1961.

Mrs. Riley said Keesee was wounded during the Korean War and was given the Purple Heart and other medals. She said a steel plate had to be put in his head for a head wound he suffered.

The sister said Keesee served 11 years in the Army, much of the time overseas, including duty in Russia.

In 1962, he deserted from Ft. Huachuca, Ariz., flew a single-engine plane he had rented to Cuba and asked for asylum. Forty-nine days later the Cubans returned him to face trial in Arizona on 153 charges.

## Keesee, Soldier Of Misfortune California Keeps Going On Jelly Beans

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan tells children who visit his office, "State government in California runs on jelly beans."

To prove his point, he takes the lid off the fancy wooden tobacco humidor on the big table in his cabinet room and pulls out a handful of jelly beans.

In the reception room outside, a 15-inch high glass canister is filled with jelly beans. A smaller glass canister filled with the candy sits on a shelf behind the governor's desk in his private office. Smaller jars and dishes of jelly beans are found on desks in other offices in the governor's suite of the Capitol.

"It all started as a joke. But it caught on. Once you get on jelly beans you never outgrow them," Reagan told a visitor.

Reagan explained that he started chewing jelly beans as a substitute for cigarettes when he stopped smoking during his acting days in Hollywood, "and I just got in the habit."

Shortly after he took office as California's governor in January 1967, an aide brought him some jelly beans for his new office.

The candy has been a part of the office supplies ever since. Ten-pound boxes of jelly beans are stocked in the storeroom across the hallway along with stationery and other office supplies.

"I have to laugh at it myself. Sometimes in cabinet meetings, when the debate on serious issues is really intense, you can look down the table and see the cabinet members passing the jelly bean jar around," Reagan said.

"If I ever run out of jelly beans — well, I don't know how this state could function."

## Computers Grind Out Millions In Tax Refunds

ANDOVER, Mass. (AP) — Your neighborhood federal tax man still has a heart, no matter what you may have heard.

There had been rumors that the Internal Revenue Service, never known as the swiftest and lightest bureau of the federal government, had become all cool, grinding, dehumanized efficiency with the advent of computers.

Not at all, according to Frank Browitt, director of the IRS center in Andover, which handles personal and business tax returns for all of New England and New York State.

"The computer has not and will not dehumanize the IRS," he said. "It will enable the IRS to do more things more quickly and more efficiently, but it never will be more than an electronic tool to us."

The Andover center is the largest of the nine IRS regional processing centers scattered across the U.S.

It processes about \$41 billion in taxes a year and pays out about \$2 billion in refunds.

During the Feb. 15-April 15 crush, the center will process upwards of \$150 million in tax returns on a single day.

To keep from going under in a sea of paper and scribbled numbers, the IRS switched to computerized data processing seven years ago. The Andover center has \$10 million worth of the glistening electronic hardware.

Only about 40 employees are involved in work with the computer, Browitt said, out of the center's 1,619 permanent and 2,909 seasonal employees.

Processing tax returns for southern New York State, including New York City, will be switched in July from Andover to a newly opened IRS regional center in Holtsville on Long Island.

Browitt said this will mean a cut of about 900 seasonal employees from the Andover center, representing a payroll cut of about \$1 million.

Last year, the center had a \$22 million payroll.

# He Freaked Out, And Tells of It

Clear of eye and complexion, neat of dress, not too long blond hair and a neat goatee. That describes David Therault of Vernon. It describes him now, but not a year ago. David has returned from hell via the drug route and the "Jesus Freaks" but he has come back to caution other youth.



David, a 1972 graduate of Rockville High School and an accomplished musician, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Therault of Jan Dr., Vernon. His parents have suffered silently over the past four years, but Monday night David shared his frightening experiences with those attending a meeting of the Lake Street School PTO.

The school cafeteria was filled to capacity as other anxious parents listened with disbelief as David unraveled his experiences of the past four years that led him to New York Hospital and membership in the "Jesus Freaks."

David said he started on drugs when he was a student at high school.

Why? In a way, it was peer pressure in my own circle of friends...every day I woke up and thought I had to get stoned. He explained.

David had been using marijuana and other drugs. One night when he was playing with a musical group in the Norwich area, someone gave him some LSD...he took an overdose.

David told of his hate for Florida and his job and his longing to see his parents, but the leaders would not let him go. Through an uncle who went to Florida and visited him, his parents were urged to get him out "even if by force," and they did just that. David's mother said she felt like she was acting out some sort of weird movie at the time.

Deprogramming. David went through a deprogramming period while still in Florida. He said that after he was deprogrammed, it took him months to pick up the telephone and tell Chief Ripa that he was ready to help them. Now he is ready and willing to help anyone to prevent them from falling into the same traps he did, he said.

Speaking of an overdose of LSD he had taken before he went to Florida, David said, "The damage drugs had on my mind was not just emotional." He said the doctors at Norwich told him it would cause him some problems for two years, and maybe some damage is permanent. He said he still sees colors flashing when he first wakes up in the morning and he sees spots where there are no spots. He said the doctors told him he will have to learn to live with it and he feels he is.

## Freedom with an If

"I will suspend your jail sentence and let you go free on one condition," said the judge to a teenager found guilty of malicious mischief. "You will have to go to church every Sunday for a year."

But on appeal to a higher court, the teenager's lawyer argued that the court should suspend the sentence and let the teenager go free on one condition: that he should go to church every Sunday for a year.

Nevertheless, special restrictions may make sense in the context of a particular situation. Another involved in a similar case had twice been convicted of unlawful conduct during anti-war demonstrations.

The judge granted probation on condition that he not take an activist part in any more such demonstrations. And this restriction was fully upheld on appeal.

# Social Security

Q. How does Medicare pay benefits for doctor bills?  
A. There are two different ways that benefits can be paid. First, your doctor can be paid directly, but only if you and your doctor agree to it. Second, Medicare can pay you either before or after you pay the doctor's bill.

Q. If my doctor does not accept assignment, how do I submit my doctor bills for payment?  
A. You should obtain a Request for Medicare Payment form from the Social Security office or from your doctor. Complete part I of the form, sign it, attach your doctor's itemized bills to the form and mail it all to the carrier listed in your Medicare Handbook.

Q. If I have more than one doctor bill, must I prepare separate Medicare forms for each bill?  
A. No. You can send all of them with the Request for Medicare Payment form.

Q. Should I send in my doctor bills before or after I have accumulated 90 days of bills to meet the \$60 deductible?  
A. Since payments can't be made until you have met the \$60 deductible, we recommend that you hold bills until they total at least \$60 and send them in all together. Once you have met the \$60 deductible we suggest you send in additional bills as you get them.

Q. If my doctor's bill is more than the reasonable charge determined by the Medicare carrier, does that mean my doctor's charge for that service is not reasonable?  
A. No. You could mean, for example, that your doctor has recently increased his charges, and the increased rates have not been in effect long enough for Medicare records to show that the new higher charges are being made known to the patient. Or, it could also mean that your doctor's charge is in the upper bracket of doctor charges for your area, and for that reason the charge is not considered to be reasonable charge.

Q. Can I get a leaflet briefly explaining what medical insurance pays?  
A. Yes. You can phone, write or visit the Social Security office and request the leaflet entitled "What Your Medical Insurance Pays."

# Dixie Solons Cool Toward ERA For Belles

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - Dixie legislators have turned a cold shoulder to the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, apparently accepting claims that the measure would strike at the magnolia-entrenched femininity of Southern belles.

What's wrong with our placing our women on a pedestal and recognizing their beauty? asked state Sen. Phil Godwin as the North Carolina Senate voted down the amendment, 27-23. "This body should look after women..." Tennessee is the only Southern state that has approved the amendment and that action is being reconsidered.

Both Louisiana and North Carolina rejected it while Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi and Virginia have killed the measure, at least for the current legislative session. Ratification is pending in Alabama, Florida and South Carolina. Heavy opposition is developing in those states.

Debate over the measure, which needs the approval of 38 states to become law, has been highly emotional in the South, whose history and literature have generally placed women in an exalted position while men are being treated as second-class citizens.

## Downey Says Earlier Release Not Possible

NEW BRITAIN (AP)—John T. Downey says the United States was helpless to win his release from Communist China any earlier than it did even though he made a full confession to his captors at the beginning of his 20-year imprisonment.

The 43-year-old CIA agent said Tuesday during his first formal news conference since his release Sunday that U.S.-Chinese relations had been too strained until recently to permit his freedom.

"I don't think more should have been done earlier," he said in reply to a question about U.S. efforts to win his release. Downey made his comments just hours after another former prisoner of the Chinese, Communist claimant in an interview that Downey and another civilian might have been released much earlier.

But Lyman Kirpatrick, a former assistant director of the CIA, said in an interview Tuesday in Providence, R.I., that the two men were helping to drop documents to Nationalist Chinese in mainland China.

Downey, looking back on the half of his life spent in Peking's Green Basket Prison, called it a "crushing bore."

Kiba was among 11 Air Force crewmen captured when their plane was shot down over North Korea.

Kiba and the others later were released.

Downey said that during his first nine months in prison, while in leg irons and under intensive questioning, he "revealed about every information I had" to his captors.

WATERFORD (AP) — The \$200,000 kilowatt power station that closed down last Sept. 1 after seawater was discovered leaking into the reactor system producing power again, according to Lelan F. Sillin Jr., chairman and president of Northeast Utilities.

But the plant, known as Millstone No. 1, will be shut down again for a total of six weeks during the next few months for inspection of reactor and plant components, Sillin said Monday.

## Mid-Decade Census Hinges On Funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau is ready to push ahead with the 1973 first mid-decade sample survey of the population if Congress votes the money for it.

Census officials said plans call for surveying about one million households, or about 1.5 per cent of the population, to find out how the nation changed socially and economically since the 1970 census.

## Stamps In The News

The British Virgin Islands, for the second consecutive year, are honoring the International Stamp Exhibition with a special set of new stamps. Also hailed on these stamps are three famous Quakers, two of whom were born on these islands.

Receiving philatelic tribute are Dr. John Coakley Lettison, Dr. William Thornton and William Penn. The first two were born in the British Virgin Islands.

Dr. Lettison, featured on the 1/2 cent and 10 cent stamps of this set, founded the famed Medical Society of London. He willed his home, Lettison House, as the site of the House of the Medical Society. Dr. Lettison's portrait appears on the 1/2 cent stamp while Lettison House, the Lettison Medal and Queen Elizabeth's vignette are on the 10 cent value.

Dr. Thornton is the designer of the United States Capitol, one of the most beautiful buildings in the world. He designed this Philadelphia Library. The 15 cent stamp bears a portrait of Dr. Thornton while the 30 cent shows the Capitol, Dr. Thornton and the Queen's effigy.

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The Federal Republic of Germany has issued two new stamps in tribute to two cities famous for tourism: Hamburg and Rudesheim. Both are seaports with Hamburg on the North Sea and Rudesheim on the Rhine, reports the World Wide Philatelic Agency.

Views of ship passing by these cities with their famous buildings in the background are the main designs of the new stamps.

The fame of the U.S. astronauts has even seeped behind the Iron Curtain.

In January, Hungary released a 10 forint miniature sheet showing a U.S. astronaut in space. Also seen on this sheet is a view of the landing capsule Challenger. The words "Apollo 17" appear above the circular globe in the background which is supposed to represent the planet earth.

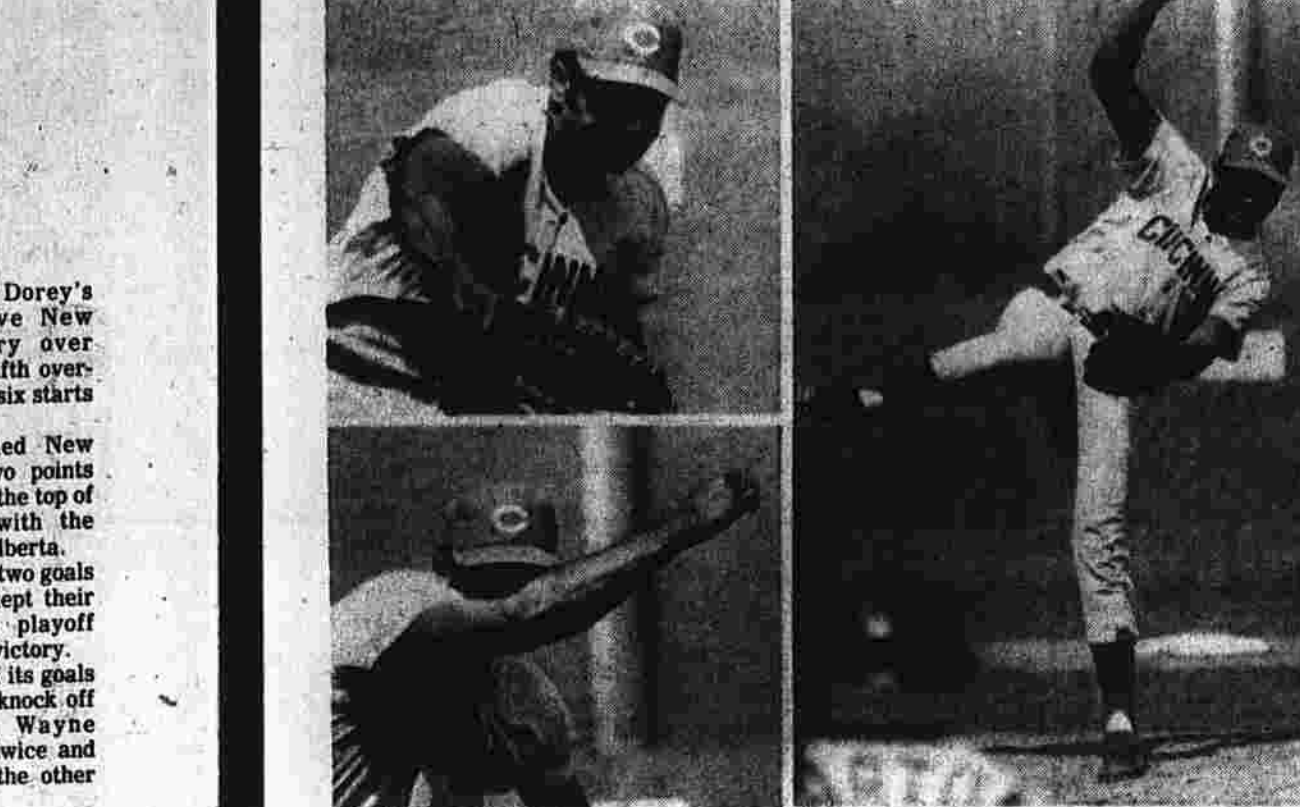

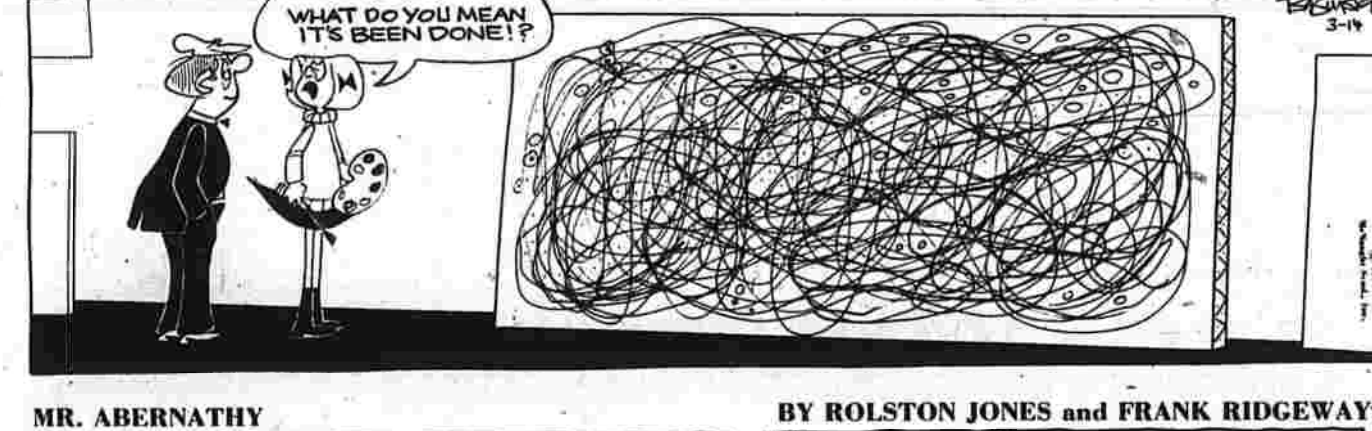

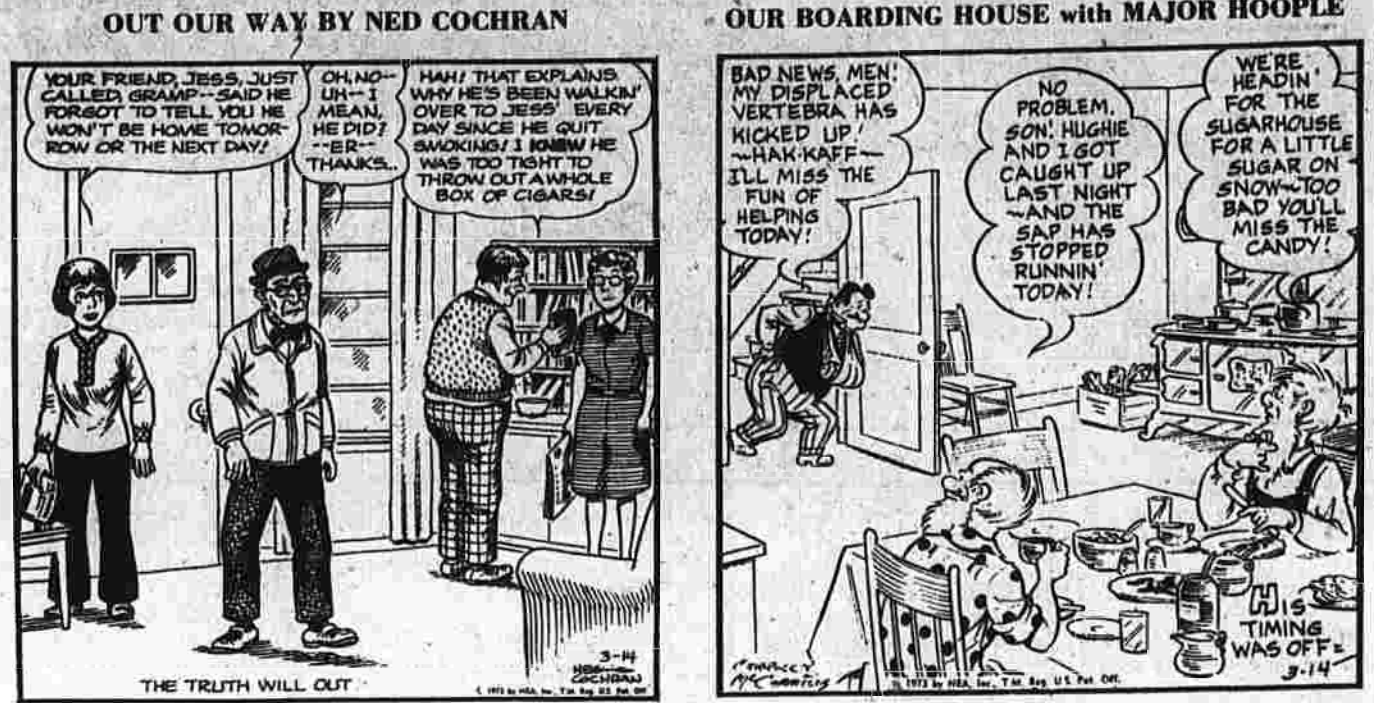
