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## Wrong A.I.M. at Wounded Knee

Militants in the name of the American Indian Movement (A.I.M.) have been diluted by outsiders, emboldened by Indian protesters' sacking of the Bureau of Indian Affairs building in Washington, who in a way paid for their vandalism. They were given more than \$60,000 for transportation home and none has been effectively punished.

Wounded Knee is the site of what the Indians now call a massacre o between 200 and 300 Indians in 1890 by the U.S. Cavalry. For a long time, it was considered a battle which began when the Sioux warriors opened fire on the soldiers.

There is no way, now, to redress that grievance, no matter what the Indians at Wounded Knee may wish or believe, nor what they may be told by Joseph Rauh, of the American Civil Liberties Union; William Kunstler, the revolutionist lawyer who is always ready to defend violence; and Ralph Abernathy, self-styled head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, who is always on the side of protest.

Authorities have been extremely cautious and forebearing in dealing with the Indian hoodlums at Wounded Knee who are reveling in baiting the United States government. If their aim is to arouse sympathy for the Indians of today, they are doing more harm than good for that cause.

There has been violence - an FBI agent was shot in the wrist - and threats of more violence. But the strangest ploy of all came when the Oglaala Sioux proclaimed they were an independent nation asking recognition from the UN and threatened to shoot any "invaders."

Surely the nation has been patient to the point of becoming ridiculous.

## Way To Run A Railroad

The railway industry and 15 unions have reached agreement on a wage raise of four per cent, effective Jan. 1, 1974, a settlement remarkable on two counts. First, it is the first time in history that the industry and its workers settled on new contract terms ahead of expiration of the old, July 1. Second, it appears to come within the limits of Phase III wage guidelines.

There were fringe benefits, however, that would make the total gain for the workers 10.7 per cent over the 18 months beginning July 1. The primary benefit was a revised pension system under which the industry will pick up retirement payments heretofore paid by the individual union members of \$42.75 a month. In addition, early retirement would be provided and maximum lifetime major medical benefits would be increased from \$50,000 to \$250,000 for each workers.

Whether this settlement will serve as a pattern for other industries remains to be seen. Some union leaders, including George Meany of the AFL-CIO, and Leonard Woodcock of the Automobile Workers, 5.5 per cent specified in the wage guidelines but they should find acceptable a

Britain has put a ceiling on wages to take effect April 1 following a five month's freeze under Phase I of the anti-inflation program. There were two rail stoppages last month in protest and the present strike by locomotive engineers is accompanied by slowdowns in the state-owned gas industry.

Slowdown strikes in Japan have been going on in protest against cost reduction moves.

A major reason for the U.S. rail agreement was reportedly the shaky condition of the Railroad Retirement Fund. The agreement is subject to ratification by officials of 14 unions and by the membership of the sheet metal workers. Ratification should be

It is their understanding that none of them can claim her as a dependent on their tax return since you must contribute more than one-half of a person's total cost of support in order to claim them as a dependent. Are they

ANSWER: Normally you must contribute more than half of a dependent's support before you will be entitled to an exemption. Here, however, we have a potential exception. The three brothers can fill out a multiple support statement (Form 2120) and take turns claiming her. Thus, each one would get an additional exemption every third year.

PANAMA CITY (AP) - U.S. Ambassador John Scali has threatened to use his veto in the U.N. Security Council against a proposed resolution seeking the handover of the Panama Canal Zone to Panama.

"I look forward to a constructive, positive discussion and I have no thought that it will be necessary to use a veto," Scali told newsmen Friday. "But, if necessary, can assure you that I am fully prepared to exercise the veto with the full support of the President.





Not all succeeded of course but most of them did in some degree and the greatness that is America today is based on these immigrants - Irish, Swedens, Poles, Italians, and almost every nationality in the world - who wanted something better for themselves and their children.

Tomorrow will be a great day for the Irish but even more it is a great day for us all because it distills in one day what America is all about, a nation created by men and women from many far off places brought together by a spirit of human dignity seeking fulfillment.

The Irish are real and symbolic. Real because they have retained that romantic Irish charater. Symbolic because they have proven, as other nationalities have proven, that freedom-loving men can keep the best of the old and still build something new that is greater because of it.

## **Free Market Works**

If you were to dream that you drove into a town where gasoline was selling for 48 cents per gallon, and a price war was raging, and stations were giving away dishes and glassware and free car washes to attract business, you'd hate to wake up, wouldn't you?

But it could happen and you wouldn't be dreaming. And you'd only be one mile from downtown Detroit. The catch is, of course, that you wouldn't be in the United States, but in Windsor, Ontario, just across the bridge.

Canada's Eastern provinces, o which Ontario is one, depend in great part on imported petroleum, even though the dominion has a large flow of domestic crude.

How can it happen that gasoline is plentiful and reasonably priced there? Well for one thing, oil operates in a free market.

In short there is little or no govern ment meddling with the law of supply and demand. There is no price fixing such as contained in the Emergency Energy Bill which Congress passed but the President vetoed.

We are going through daily frustrations in a vain attempt to hold down the price of petroleum products to unrealistic and uneconomic levels. Wall Street Journal economists estimate that a price of about 60 cents

per gallon would stabilize in the United States and bring a sufficient flow to ease greatly the burden of the

American motorist. The allocation program on crude oil has created what the bureaucrats are calling "disincentives" to the natural flow of raw petroleum into the coun-

"Disincentives" is a new Washington word for uneconomic obstacles. It is of the same origin as "shortfall" for shortage.

To give him his due, Energy Chief William Simon seems to fully realize the problem and most of his efforts are directed towards relaxation of restrictions imposed by Congress which are obstructing the regular channels of oil commerce.


Threatened dollar a gallon gasoline is probably in the same category as the dollar a loaf bread which the bakers have been threatening us with. So far, it just ain't so.

The price of gasoline here would probably stabilize at about 60-62 cents if all governmental restrictions were lifted and the oil industry could go about its business.

If the politicians would only stop attempting daily miracles with one eye on the votes they may garner, the system could get back into high gear

were seized in 1972. The agent also attributed the decline to the fact that some moonshine now costs as much as some brands of bonded whiskey




