## Guarding Right to Know

Reporters serve as the eyes and ears of newspapers and of the public. whose right to know the truth is basic to our democracy.

Public officials almost always want to color and control the news. That is why there are so many public relations employes helping government to tell its side of the story or todivert attention from things it doesn't wish to become known.

Conflict is inevitable between the press which seeks to tell all the news and officialdom which often doesn't. The friction need not be unhealthy if the press is left free to probe. When newsmen are harassed in the performance of their duties, the public is the

The freedom of the press and the public's right to know the facts are infringed when judges, grand juries or prosecutors harass newsmen, even to the jailing of those who refuse to reveal sources of information or to surrender unpublished data and notes.

The right of judges to assess penalties for so-called contempt of court apparently has been misused in some instances and as a result of a series of provocations, there is an effort in Congress and in some state ticut, to provide a protective shield for newsmen.

Newsmen do not need an absolute

privilege against being called upon to testify in court when they have or are believed to have knowledge of facts important to the case. The constitutional bar against infringing the freedom of the press should be sufficient, if it is properly upheld. If it isn't, there should be such a public up-


roar that the matter would be righted. Senator Sam Ervin, North Carolina Dmocrat, has been hodling hearings on a bill that would grant some protection to newsmen from "fishing expeditions" and he is leaning toward a qualified privilege, not an absolute

"We are all dependent upon the press or information," Ervin observes. "Where it is hobbled, we all walk a more uncertain path." The best course of action in Ervin's view is for newsmen "to be as objective as humanity permits them to be, and to work against bias or irresponsibility."

A tax on freedom of the press will continue," Ervin said. "The conflict between freedom on the one hand and tyranny on the other will always go on. Ervin challenged the press to defend itself vigorously and to "convince the public of the rightness of

### **MorePOWs En Route** To Homes

CLARK AIR BASE, Philippines (AP) - Sixty happy American prisoners of war left Clark Air Base for home today, and plans were being made for the departure of more on Sunday and Monday.

Three evacuation flights, carrying a total of 57 men, were scheduled to leave Sunday for Andrews Air Force Base, Md.; Scott Air Force Base, Ill.; and Travis Air Force Base, Calif. All will make refueling stops at Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii.

The POWS who left today were from a group of 108 released by North Vietnam Wednesday. They included Navy Lt. Cmdr. John S. McCain III, 36, son of Adm. John S. McCain Jr., former commander-in-chief of U.S. Pacific Forces who directed the war in Vietnam. McCain, whose wife Carol lives in Orange Park, Fla., flew to Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala.

Bobby Joe Keesee, a civilian accused of having hijacked a small chartered plane from Thailand to North Vietnam in 1970, was aboard another flight bound for March Air Force Base, Calif

In Bangkok, the owners of the company that chartered the plane to Keesee said they will petition the U.S. Embassy to extradite Keesee to Thailand to stand trial on hijacking charges. U.S. officials at Clark said there have been no instructions to arrest Keesee, and he will be treated like all other returnees.

Keesee of Phoenix, Ariz., ducked welcomers on his arrival Wednesday by exiting from a rear door of an evacuation plane into a bus. He was cheered on his departure when he kissed the American flag held by a color guard before boarding a C141 StarLifter for March Air Base.



"Gare" is the French word for railway station. Saint-Lazare is the name of a station in Paris. If you will look beyond the fence you will see the railroad tracks and the smoke left by a passing train. This is a scene that you might see in everyday life. See the puppy asleep in the woman's lap. See the grapes on the bench. Manet, who painted in the second half of the 19th century, influenced modern painting because he painted in a new way that left out the details in real-life scenes. He lived from 1832 to 1883.







## Cord Is Ready for TV

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — (NEA)—Human nature being what it is, Alex Cord is currently trying to find a TV series after turning them down for many years.

Maybe "Genesis II" will do it for him. A pilot-movie by that title will be aired by CBS in March—the tentative date is March 23—and the network is pretty high on it. It's the new one from Gene Rodenberry, the man who created Star Trek.

Cord says that for 10 years or so they were pounding on his door to get him to do a series. He turned them down flat. But, like most movie actors, he has become disenchanted with the motion picture situation-"the business is falling apart"-and so, for the last two years, he has been looking for a series to

"I remember being with Mike Connors when we were both in 'Stagecoach,''' Cord says. "He got the offer to do Mannix then. I wondered why he took it. He said it was because of the money.

"At the time, if I had gotten that same offer I would have turned it down. But, in retrospect, I was wrong. I think now it would have been smarter to take it and Mike made the right move. He doesn't have to work for the rest of his life—and where am I?"

If "Genesis II" has any-thing of Star Trek's class he may be on the threshold of something good. It's a story of a scientist of today who is caught underground while working on suspended animation. When he's rescued he finds it is 155 years later and he's in a world wrecked by nuclear wars.

Although Cord has never been a science fiction fan he thinks the series has possibilities.

"There's so much interest in science fiction today," he says. "Look how our world has advanced in my own lifetime. I can remember when milk was delivered by a horse-drawn wagon and I've men go to the Moon. All in one generation."
