





He hopes his return will be checked by an individual revenue sharing auditor or computer, who or which, has a sense of humor.

> WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. Rep. Stewart B. McKinney, RConn., says a bill he is introducing today would give second class mail users twice the time to pay for recent postal rate increases.

Without such a measure, he said, some magazines, expecially those with a small circulation, may be forced to cease publication because of

the postal rate increases. Under the bill, second class users would be allowed to pay for the increases over a 10-year

period instead of the current five years. McKinney said the measure also would allow publications with circulations under 250,000 to pay only two-thirds of the rate increases.

"I'm certain that unless Congress acts favorably on this measure, magazines with 250. 000 circulation or less will encounter great difficulty surviving in the coming years," McKinney said in a statement.

McKinney, who is coponsoring the bill with U.S. Morris Udall, D-Ariz., said the measure would also provide relief to non-profit nagazines, which are faced with 400 to 800 per cent increases. He said any rate increases for these magazines would be equally shared by the publisher and the consumer.


