SAIGON (AP) - The Communist-backed Pathet Lao announced today they have agreed to a U.S. proposal on the release of American prisoners captured in Laos and are "ready to set free at any date the U.S. military and civilian personnel captured in Laos during the war."

The Pathet Lao gave no specific date, time or place, as demanded by the United States.

#### Release Slated Tuesday

SAIGON, (AP) - North Vietnam has announced an agreement to release the final 139 American prisoners held in Vietnam in exchange for withdrawal of the remaining American military forces beginning Tuesday and ending

Thursday. Bui Tin, chief spokesman for the North Vietnamese delegation in Saigon, said today the first group of 32 American prisoners captured in South Vietnam and contained on the Viet Cong list, will be turned over to U.S. authorities Tuesday at Hanoi's Gia Lam

The dispute over the release Cong and North Vietnamese, with the deadline for their release only two days away.

121 Days Of Idleness HARTFORD (AP) - The blue-and-silver buses of the Connecticut Co. returned to the streets of Hartford, New Haven and Stamford early today after a 121-day bus strike that affected thousands of riders and raised political tempers to the boiling point.

Buses in the three ConnCo divisions began rolling out of their barns between 4:30 a.m. and 6 a.m.

The order for the buses to roll resume riding the buses. followed a decision two weeks ago by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill to provide direct state subsidies running on their pre-strike to the financially strapped com-routes, show a drop in pany for a two year period. ridership. Amalgamated Transit Union drivers and mechanics struck Conn. Co Nov. 26 after the company declared it was losing \$10,-000 per week and couldn't give the union a new contract without some form of subsidy.

Meskill's plan guarantees ConnCo 5 per cent of bus service revenues as its profit margin. ConnCo will operate the buses under the supervision of the Connecticut Transportation Authority.

Meskill and other officials urged the 150,000 former commuters of ConnCo to discard emergency transportation arrangements they may have the Amalgamated Transit made during the strike and to Union locals at ConnCo, es-

timated his drivers and mechanics had lost about \$1.5 million since the marathon walkout began. Many of the 520 ConnCo employes involved took temporary jobs but the company said only three employes, all of them in Hartford, had quit their jobs.

Orders for the buses to roll followed a breakthrough last week in the three-cornered negotiations among the state, ConnCo and the striking Amalgamated Transit Union.

Gov. Thomas J. Meskill took to statewide radio and television to report that the state would subsidize ConnCo and a new union contract on the condition that New Haven and Stamford would join Hartford in forming transit districts designed to eventually take over the company's operations.

The districts were formed and the buses were readied for operation amid claims from top Democrats that Meskill could have solved the bus crisis much earlier or avoided it altogether by making his subsidy offer lastyear. Meskill claimed,

# Land, Lumber, And Labor Driving Up Housing Costs

Increased costs of land, lumber and labor have sent Connecticut housing prices soaring.

During the past five years, the average home price has risen about 5 per cent each year, according to James F. Carey, executive director of the Connecticut Real Estate

"And that's probably a conservative estimate," he

Gardner W. Dogherty, executive vice president of the Greater Hartford Board of Realtors Inc., said the increase was more like 26 or 27 per cent in the 17 towns comprising the Greater Hartford area.

"For the first three months of this year the average cost of a 3-4 bedroom house has been just under \$36,940," he said.

Despite the costs, middle-

income, residents apparently still constitute a good home buying market.

"They can't afford it but they're buying them," said Joe

Lacava, past president of the and construction discouraged Home Builders Association of Hartford County, Inc.

A former rule of thumb was that a family could afford a home that cost roughly two and a quarter to two and a half times its income, Dogherty

"But I've heard of some mortgages recently that make me wonder how the people will ever pay them off," he said. 'The average home buver

would have to be making at least \$12,000 or more a year in order to afford a 5-6 room ranch house in the \$30,000 range,'

A lot of people "are com-pletely annihilated right off the because they can't afford a downpayment, he said.

This in turn "removes a tremendous volume (of potential home buyers) and prevents developers from building on a volume basis that would bring down the prices," according to

He added that the cost of land

developers from building houses with less than six and a half to seven rooms. Dogherty said there was

evidence that younger couples in particular were turning to townhouses and condominiums as the only affordable alternatives to apartment

"They simply can't find any houses in the \$19,000-\$20,000 range," he said. Scarcity is a major factor in

the rising costs, Carey said. "The highly regulated use of land by policing agencies, such as the state Environmental Protection Agency with its open space program, is causing less property to be available," he

A. Douglas Proctor, a major Hartford area developer, said " he started selling 1,400 square foot lots in 1946 for \$1,875. The same lots would cost \$15,000 today, he said.

"Builders tell me the cost of framing a seven-room house has gone up \$3,500 in the past four years," he said.

the Homebuilders Association, said lumber costs alone on a small house have gone up \$1,200 in the past two to three years with increased land and labor costs adding another \$2,000-\$3,000 to the total.

"The cost of lumber is almost prohibitive," Carey said.

'There have been tremendous violations of Phases I. II and III (of the President's wage-price guidelines) and the cost of lumber is still going up,"

"And instead of making the supply for this country the lumber companies are shipping it to Japan and other places where they can get top dollar for it and selling lumber of lower quality here," he added.

"This has caused a great deal problems for developers because some of the lumber (they receive) is not up to specifications," he said. "This causes the builder to start modifying the type of house he is building, which is costly."

#### ICC Proposes Drastic Rail Reorganization WASHINGTON (AP) -

Congress has received from the Interstate Commerce Commission proposed legislation that would drastically reorganize modernize the Northeastern railroad system with the help of public funds.

Saying in its detailed report and draft bill sent to Congress Saturday that the railroads alone are incapable of meeting the enormous cost of the plan it outlines, the ICC suggested a 1 per cent tax on all surface freight charges in the United States to enable the federal government to pay a share of

The ICC said the physical plant of the railroads, which serve 17 states and the District of Columbia, is a hodge-podge of track and yard facilities that grew up in an era before the advent of trucks, private cars and

Since then, the commission said, changes in technology, traffic and industry have resulted "in a system which possesses far greater capacity than is needed; a system which is antiquated not only with respect to the state of its physical plant but as regards the fundamental location and design of that plant.

"The cost of rehabilitation of an antiquated system, upon which maintenance has been neglected for years, will be enormous," the 39-page report said, adding that available estimates of \$600 million to \$800 million for the Penn Central alone "are probably not unrealistic."

"The Northeastern railroads are clearly incapable of generating funds anything like this magnitude either from increased revenues or in private

money markets," the commission said. "Public funding appears to be

the only alternative." The draft bill is entitled "FederalAid Railroad Act of 1973." The ICC said implementation of the plans would cost the

government between \$400 million and \$500 million a year. Although the railroads received government aid in their formative years, the commission said, "more recently it has been their competitors that have benefited."

The report cited public support of development. maintenance and operation of highways, waterways and airways and said:

petitor in the world's markets? Once best known for toys, silk, and shoddy merchandise, modern Japan is a prime source of optical equipment, cameras, radio and television sets, economical automobiles, and many other quality products. There is no un-

How come? The secret is pride in sharply increased productivity, the result of a unique system of labor and management relations. Japanese workers are proud to be "company men" a term more likely to be used as an epithet in these United States. They are loyal and hard working,

Their astute company managements are concerned and compassionate in dealing with their men as individuals, not as a faceless

Together, they glory in the results

Japan has shown its appreciation for the help given by the United States, a benevolent victor in war. Japan's economy is booming and they have revalued the yen upward to help our growing trade deficit. They are willing to import more American

goods - beef, oranges, grain, even

In contrast to American workers, who cherish the right to strike and prize their mobility, the Japanese worker rarely moves from the company he starts with. The company could be described as paternalistic, a word often used critically here. That is to say, the company provides a host f fringe benefits, vacation spas, free hospitalization, training, promotions and other things that tend to keep the workers on the job with "his" company until he retires or dies. As a result, the worker puts loyalty to his company only after his devotion to

country and family. The Japanese version of cradle to grave security is company made, not government controlled. It works well and it obviously is not so costly as to hurt Japan's competitiveness on prices of her products.

Japan's example is worth careful study as American labor and management prepare for important contract negotiations in the months ahead. The railroads and their unions reached agreement long before expiration of current contracts on a basis that has Japanese system.

Is it "square" to be a "company man?" Isn't the welfare of the square employe bound up with that of the fair employer? Could it be that Japan's "secret" is based simply on the old fashioned American ideal of a square

The budget that follows will, I am sure, receive careful scrutiny by your Board and by the general public. In a sense it is a disappointing budget in that it provides for a tax rate increase despite all efforts to come up with a program of action for the Town that would preclude an increase. In my instructions to Department Heads prior to their budget requests, I strongly enjoined them to provide me only with requests representing the current level of service except where very unusual circumstances prevailed. Despite this, and I think the Department Heads made an honest effort, their requests came in \$3,312,086 higher than last year's adopted budget. In my review I reduced these requests by \$1,465,221. The net increase is \$1,439,767 from the current budget as of 12/31/72.

As you know, in recent years we have been holding an extremely tight budget line. However, the public demand for increased services keeps expanding. Inflation, which in many arean has slowed down, is still a major factor affecting this budget. Our fixed costs show substantial increases.

The federally funded E.E.A. program has provided us with important positions during the past two years - positions that we really needed before E.E.A. came in. Now that this program is terminating we must evaluate the impact and importance of each position to the Town. I have covered this area of concern in substantial detail in another section of this message.

The impact of the Federal Revenue Sharing Program is substantial. It is recommended that these funds be used primarily to fund capital improvements. This has a direct impact on the tax rate by reducing the amount of money that must be raised by taxes.

As you know, we provide considerably more detail in our budget document than most communities so that you have adequate information for your evaluations. The green sheet with each agency budget summarizes changes in costs from current year operations and should be particularly helpful to you. The written document is still limited and I trust that the Directors will schedule ifficient work sessions with me and appropriate staff members to facilitate your review.

I am sure that you will realize as you review the budget that in most instances we propose maintaining the present level of services. Any cuts made by the Board will directly affect services.

#### TAX RATE

A tax rate of 50.66 representing an increase of 2 mills is recommended to support General Fund services. An increase of .29 to 5.35 mills is required for the Fire District. No increase is recommended for the Special Taxing District or in water rates; however, it will be necessary to increase sewer rates to the same level as water rates. Please note that sewer operating costs are now higher than water operating costs. We have delayed this increase for three years but can see no way of continuing at the present rate.

#### REVIEW OF CURRENT FISCAL YEAR ACTIVITIES

Projections made after the first six months of the present fiscal year are holding up. At that time we indicated a possible expenditure deficit of approximately \$93,000. We are now confident that a combination of under-expending appropriations on several accounts and revenues exceeding original estimates will produce a modest end of the year surplus.

#### FISCAL PROJECTIONS 1973/74

Fortunately some revenue factors have a favorable impact on the tax rate. The Grand List increase of 4% will produce approximately \$500,000 in added revenue projected at last year's tax rate. In addition we have allocated \$275,000 from last year's surplus toward next years operations. We are estimating \$100,000 in income from property occupied after the October tax date in accordance with

On the other hand, total income, other than taxes, are estimated to be down by approximately \$85,000. Some categories are up; however, state grants in the education area are down resulting Listed below are improvements recommended for the next fiscal year. Emergency Employment Act One of the most difficult areas of budget projection and decision making has involved the E.E.A. program. The best information we have at this time from Washington is that the B.E.A. program will be phased out. There was \$2.25 billion appropriated for the two year effort with about \$580 million of that remaining for the phase out. We are not sure yet how the phase out will work but the following program is what we feel will best meet the Town's need.

In the establishment of E.E.A. positions initially we were guided by needs expressed by various departments for positions that were not approved by me or the Board of Directors in recent years. In other words, we did not create positions merely to provide work, but rather utilized the

available funds to meet identified needs that had not been met. Budget recommendations on the B.E.A. positions fall into three categories - .itions to be filled for the full year by Town funds, positions to be funded for half the year by Town funds and half the year by E.B.A. funds and positions to be dropped. In the Board of Education program six positions were established of which three are in their budget for funding next year.

At this point in time I feel that the general employment situation has improved so that most of our E.E.A. employees could relocate in the private sector. The retention of these positions should be evaluated by the Directors on the basis of impact on the Town service level if the position is abandoned.




