

# Dog Track Bid Passes Hurdle

Three Manchester men have passed the first hurdle in their plan to construct a \$5 million dog-racing facility in Colchester.

The nine-member Colchester Planning and Zoning Board last night unanimously approved an amendment to the town's zoning laws, to include dog-racing facilities as a permitted use in any Residential, Agricultural Zone, providing at least 20 acres are involved.

Proposing to build the facility on a 44-acre site are: Richard P. Hayes, real estate broker and land developer; Stephen J. Cavagnaro, owner of Casey's Restaurant; and Raymond F. Damato, building contractor and developer.

About 250 persons reportedly attended a public hearing last Wednesday on the request by the Manchester men. Reaction appeared at least evenly divided, possibly even on the enthusiastic side, among the persons favoring the track, according to published reports.

The next step for the developers is to make application to the same Colchester Board for the dog-track facility, based on formal plans. If that permission is granted, the next step would be to apply for a license from the State Commission on Special Revenue.

**House Democrats Seek Tight Price Controls**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The ceilings to avoid "gross inequities" in other prices and interest at March 16, 1973.

## United States To Cut Back On Latin-American Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State William P. Rogers goes before the Organization of American States today with a recommendation that Latin American nations depend less on the United States for social and economic needs. It is understood Rogers will tell the hemisphere foreign ministers gathered here that because of limitations on American resources, they should seek a "more constructive involvement with the nations of Europe and Africa in trade and financial relationships." Information made available suggests Rogers believes a confrontation has developed in relations between the United States and Latin America, a point amply demonstrated during the first days of debate. Before the OAS General Assembly. Previous speakers have outlined a long list of grievances against the United States including what many say is American foot-dragging in meeting hemisphere development requirements. Informed officials predict Rogers will resurrect a dormant 3 1/2 year old but shelved since then because of rising protectionist sentiment in Congress. Under the proposal, the United States would create a scheme of tariff preference for the manufactured products of the developing world. Implementation of the plan would help alleviate a chronic Latin American trade deficit with the United States, which has averaged \$200 million a year. There also were unconfirmed reports that Rogers will inform the meeting that he plans a trip to Latin America in the near future as an expression of American interest in the region. Rogers has visited over 45 foreign countries since taking office in 1969.

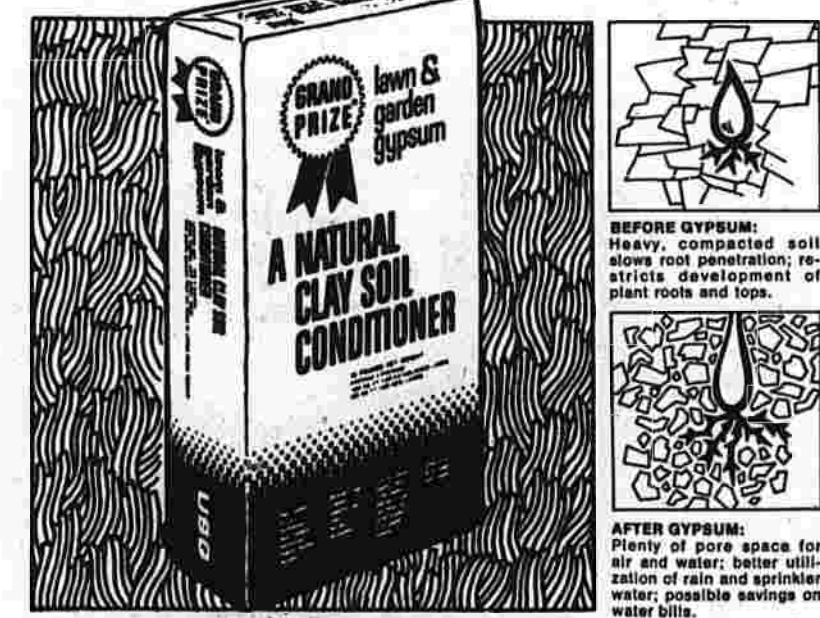

## Plans To Be Unveiled For Kennedy Library

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Detailed plans for the \$30 million Kennedy Memorial Library complex will be announced May 29, the 50th anniversary of the birth of John F. Kennedy, a Library Corp. spokesman said Thursday.

Robert Fitzgerald, a first cousin of the former president, said the design review will help determine the outcome. Duhay's major complaint has been proposed parking facilities.

After taking in a good meal a snake is inclined to keep pretty quiet until the object has been reduced in size. That doesn't take very long. Snakes must have very powerful digestive juices because they do not regurgitate anything they cannot digest.

Some kinds of snakes lay eggs in the sun to be hatched by it. Others bear their young already enough to see it, there was a large rattlesnake at the base of the mailbox post. Mr. Fenn answered her call and dispatched the snake.

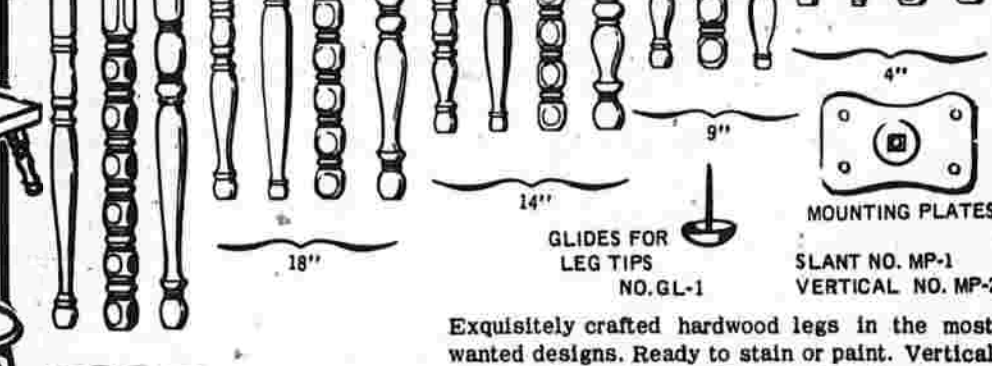

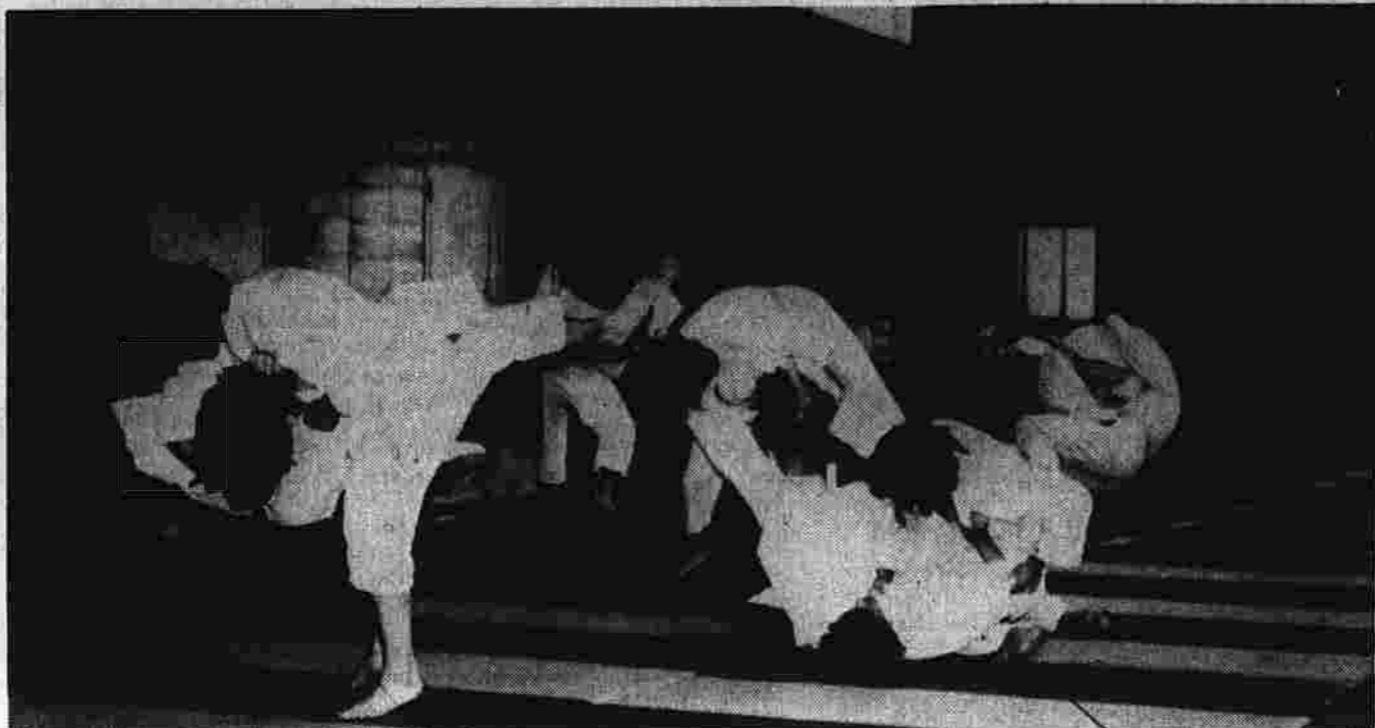
