Equalize Schools

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling upholding the use of local property taxes to finance public schools has, perhaps predictably, been decried by a number of educators.

"The yield of crops and the concentration of wealth in individual communities will continue to determine the kind of education each child receives," says Allan M. West, acting executive secretary of the National Education Association.

"Thus the quality of education child receives depends in no small part upon the accident of birth or residence—the place a child's parents happen to live."

This is essentially true, but it is also true that a great many other things in life also depend upon the accident of birth, beginning with looks and basic physical stamina - the kind of parents one happens to "choose."

The question is how far government should attempt to level out the inequalities of life, and this seems to be wisely refrained from leaping into.

If it is properly within the domain of the courts to equalize the financial disparities between a state's school districts, what about the disparities between the quality of police and fire protection and other government services in each community? Then there is the larger question of educational inequalities between the states themselves.

As West points out, there is nothing in the decision to prevent the states from reforming their own school finance systems. Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the majority, made clear that the court was not endorsing the status quo.

This, and the fact that there have been so many class-action suits on the issue, not just the one in Texas on which the court based its decision, suggests that it is a very real problem which the individual states must sooner or later find ways of

HARTFORD (AP) - Superior Court Judge Leo Parakey, who narrowly avoided losing his seat on the bench earlier this week, had his renomination confirmed by the state House of epresentatives Thursday by a rote of 85-47.

Parskey, of Bloomfield, was involved in a controversial 1971 eapportionment plan that was later declared unconstitutions by a U.S. District Court. An appeal is pending before the U.S. Supreme Court. On Tuesday, the Senate voted 9-16 to confirm his renomina

The House also confirmed the ollowing Superior Court renominations which previously cleared the Senate: Judge David M. Shea of Hartford, 112-4; Judge Anthony J. Armentano of Hartford, 116-3; Judge Harwinton, 92-13; Judge Michael Radin of Avon. 95-11. The House voted to elevate Circuit Court Judge William C. Bieluch of Hartford to the Court of Common Pleas, 77-6, and to elevate Common Pleas Court Judge John M. Alexander of Windsor to the Superior Court

It also confirmed the nominations of Judge John P. Cotter of Hartford as an associate judge of the Connec-ticut Suprème Court and a judge of the Superior Court, 100-11, and Harold H. Dean of Darien as judge of the Circuit Court. Cotter also was confirmed as chief court ad ministrator, 115-5.
