More Impounding, Not Less mind that it is safe for your family and other motorists. Mr. Groot makes this all possible. Mr. Groot is courteous, help-Needed In Most Budgets

In all the furor over impoundment of funds by the President, which ires Congressmen who voted money for pet projects back home only to have the money more or less put in escrow, we forget a more significant and more prevalent problem involving public

It is almost an unwritten law in American government, be it a Connecticut town hall, the state bureaucracy, independent federal agencies and the rest of the structure of our government; which in effect says, if the money has been budgeted and appropriated, it must be spent.

The reasons are simple:

1. Any agency ending up with a surplus of funds at the end of a fiscal year fears it will either be criticized for failure to carry out its directives or it asked for too much money in the first place; therefore its next budget can be cut. And if the Assembly, the Congress, or Town Directors are on the ball and find out that either is the case, they justifiably act accordingly

2. There seems to be a certain thing about people in leadership, both in and out of government, who equate status of the job with the size of the budget he or she is given to administer and this is translated into larger staffs and captial outlays. In other words, empire building, is a goal of many regardless of justified need or quality of service performed.

The result is that often when a surplus appears evident there is a rash of spending "this year's money" for next year's things, particularly nonperishables which are not covered specifically by budget rules. Now this wouldn't cause a minute's concern to us if, for example, a surplus of \$500 was used to buy office supplies which will be used, if, and this is the big if, the ensuing budget for supplies is reduced accordingly.

What it adds up to is that in too many places in our governmental bureaucracy, local, state and national, there is no dirth of ideas on how to best use "unexpected surpluses" or other windfall funds.

In the light of Manchester's relatively large unencumbered surplus as reported by the final audit Tuesday, we would suggest the first consideration be to the taxpayer in the form of a several mill reduction in next year's tax bill.

If such an action were followed at all levels of government real tax savings could be made and we feel fiscal creditability could be restored.

Isn't it really too bad that we can generate as much concern and headlines over the issue of spendin every nickel appropriated, whether i is necessary or not, like we do over the President's impoundment of funds. It appears to us that what the country needs is more impounders all the way down to the town hall.

No-Fault Report From Delaware

There is no-fault automobile insurance and then there is no-fault utomobile insurance, and the question confronting legislators in many states is which of the numerous plans proposed or in effect is best-if any is. Basically, no-fault means that people are paid directly by their own imsurer for their losses without waiting to determine who caused a collision.

One point of controversy, however, has been the contention of proponents of the Keaton-O'Connell type of nofault, which was adopted by Massachusetts, that the concept can't work unless it bars the right to sue below a suitable "threshold." In Massachusetts, for example, lawsuits are restricted unless hospital or medical costs exceed \$500.

Lawyers, on the other hand, argue that a threshold isn't necessary-that effective auto insurance reform can provide firstparty coverage, regardless of fault, without abrogating legal rights and still reduce court congestion, reduce premiums and effect prompt payment of claims.

They are now citing Deaware's experience as an example. Compulsory no-fault insurance went

into effect in Delaware on Jan. 1. 1972, providing a \$10,000 economic package and no restriction on the right to sue.

According to the state's insurance commissioner, 13 months later claims had been reduced by 70 per cent and less than a dozen suits had been filed by Delawareans.

Litigation over medical costs, wages and loss of services has disappeared, he reports, except for outof-state drivers and their passengers. There has not been a single known incident where the Delaware victims were not paid promptly upon presentation of their bills and the vehicle was insured as required by law.

In other words, when people are promptly and reasonably reimbursed for losses in autombbile accidents, they don't make unreasonable claims and file "nuisance" suits.

At the same time, there has been no increase in insurance rate levels in Delaware and in some cases decreases. Bodily injury rates were reduced as much as 25 per cent.

"Delaware's no-fault auto insurance is working and can well serve as a national model," says the commissioner. His statistics suggest that it at least bears looking into by other states
