Capital Gains: Fair Or Unfair?

Like the annual reappearance of the cherry blossoms around the Tidal Basin, it's tax reform talk time again in Washington.

High on the agenda is the subject of capital gains, under which income derived from the sale of such assists as stocks, bonds and real estate is taxed at a lower rate than income from wages and salaries.

The rate is about 50 per cent that of ordinary income, the object being to encourage and reward investment that will help develop the U.S. economy.

Yet it seems that almost nobody likes the special treatment accorded capital gains. A number of groups such as Common Cause, Ralph Nader's Tax Reform Research Institute and the AFL-CIO, have mounted campaigns to revise the capital gains law.

"The most glaring inequity in the present tax code is its application of different rates to different kinds of incomes," says Fortune magazine editor Richard Armstrong.

"It's pretty hard to justify treatin a capital gain diffently from ordinar income," says Rep. Wilbur Mills, I Ark., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. "I've never felt there is anything more sacrosanct about the profit from the sale of an asset than from the sweat of your brow."

But then the congressman proceeds to offer justification by adding, "If people had to pay regular tax rates on capital gains, they'd never sell (their assets). You'd freeze them in their present assets."

At least one businessman suggests that rather than shrink or close the capital gains "loophole," it should be vastly widened.

In recent testimony before Mill committee, Ross Perot, chairman of the board of Electronic Data Systems, Inc., proposed that every American be given the opportunity to accumulate a lifetime total of \$100,000 in capital gains, tax free. Above the \$100,000 threshold, capital gains income would be handled as it is now. Perot likens the flow of capital in the United States to the Mississippi River. It seems inconceivable that the

water in it could ever dry up. But the Mississippi depends upon innumerable springs, creeks and small rivers. Simply by clogging and damming these tributaries, it would be possible to turn it into a ditch.

In the same fashion, he says, if we should clog the springs and other tributaries of our capital market, it, too, could turn into a dry and empty ditch at a time when we are going to need more money than has ever been raised before to modernize our industrial capacity to allow the working American, with his high standard o living, to compete effectively with his counterparts around the world.

The current catch phrase, "Money made by money should be taxed like money made by men," is invalid, he argues, because it equates two totally different types of money. It assumes that jobs will always exist to allow "money to be made by men" and assumes that the capital money rivers will always flow.

"The most valuable resource in the American economic system is the working American," says Perot. "If we are to raise the capital requirements for our future, the working American must be given opportunity through our tax laws to become a participating capitalist."



MANSFIELD (AP) - This r, Eddle learned to say, I'm hungry," and his life, i t his stomach, became fuller Eddie is a 32-year-old etarded deaf-mute. For ears he has been a lonely insfield Training Center, Ofcials there c everely retarded, but no one new for certain because comnunication with him was im-

ossible, This year, Eddie was taught a lign language with 300 different gestures. He stopped disrobing. hey discovered he was only noderately retarded and herefore trainable.

He now is earning money making candles, picking his own color wax and even complaining when he wants the wintow closed.

There's a breath of fresh air Mansfield, and Eddie is one of the fortunate ones to be in its

But there are 1,000 others, severely or profoundly retarded, whose needs are not being met, who have not been allowed the same opportunity to develop their abilities to help

Their progress is impeded by 50-year-old buildings that lack privacy and the home-like at nosphere now considered a mportant factor in training the mentally retarded. The structures also violate the state health and fire codes and fail to meet national accreditation standards.

These conclusions are the state's own, based on a yearlong assessment of its programs for the mentally retarded. The study, however, spawned several pilot projects, ncluding Eddie's gesture class. It also led to a policy decision to reduce Mansfield's popula-tion from 1,439 to 1,100 by putting 300 residents in grou

nomes of 10 to 15 each in their own communitie A total of 148 former Mansfield residents already have been placed in eight group

homes in Hartford, and Manchester. "There are at least 700, out o 1,439, who should be living in a better place," said Mansfield's superintendent, Francis Kelley.

"We're trying to care for then in an impossible situation." "I'm not interested ebuilding the old Mansfield,

Kelley told The Associated Press. "We're interested positive way. I want home-like facilities that are conducive to training." Even buildings constructed in

the 1960s are outmoded today, Kelley said, because they were built under outdated concepts. For at least 30 per cent of Mansfield's residents, the state provides just the "basic things in life," he said. There are no programs or training for them. Many of the severely retarded (those with an IQ between 20 and 34) and the profoundly retarded (those with an IQ under 20) sit in idle boredom day after day, victims of a half-century-old rationale Kelley termed the "put them

away" and "watch the kid" philosophies. Today, the emphasis is on developmental training. Deputy Mental Health Commissioner Gareth D. Thorne, the man in

charge of mental retardation in Connecticut, said the survey showed that the "vast majority" of residents at Mansfield and the 1,700-patient Southbury Training School were failing to achieve self-help development. "There are gobs of children

and adults unable to communicate, dress, feed or am-bulate," Thorne said. Out of 1,451 profoundly and severely retarded at the two schools: 78 per cent or 1,171

can't speak, 39 per cent are not toilet trained, 26 per cent are partially toilet trained, 32 per cent cannot feed themselves, 60 per cent can not groom emselves, 55 per cent are unable to dress themselves and 29

per cent can't walk. Of Mansfield's 1,439 residents: 187 make no sound at other communication problemsa total of one third of the residents. Some 200 must be dressed by others.

In addition, many of Mansfield's residents, who range from three to 70 years of age, have other disabilities: 66 are deaf, 123 are blind, 18 are blind and deaf and 447 have



Thorne said a young girl who constantly bashed her head against a table, completely dis-figuring herself after years of elf-abuse, was stopped from doing it after four weeks of "reward" training. At two home-like coed cot-

tages on the Mansfield grounds, groups of 18 teen-agers are iving nearly normal lives-even attending nearby public schools. At the Walters Cottage, good behavior is rewarded with fake currency which is redeemable for such treats as going to bed later, taking trips or teen club passes. The youths earn "cash" by washing windows, cleaning bathrooms, watching television news programs and reading. The state Mental Retardation

Department has begun a "contract" system on each new patient. The contract, signed by the patient's parents, outlines specific problems, training and goals for the child and has a fixed expiration date. At the end of the contract term, the parents review the progress made and can sign another one. When patients arrive at Mansfield, they either progress

or regress, Kelley said. "If you develop programs for them, they progress," he said. "If you just give them custodial


care, they regress." "We've got to stop thinking of lifetime care at Mansfield," he said. "We should develop everybody, no matter how limited they are.

Oddity on the Mound

Observed during a recent baseball game was this situa-

tion, which is an oddity. With no runners on base, the pitcher got his sign from the catcher, started his windup and suddendly his spikes got caught in the rubber and the ball fell forward several eet in front of the mound.

The plate umpire cried out, "No pitch.

The coach of the team at bat didn't utter a word at the time. Later he questioned the ump and was apparently satisfied that the ruling was correct.

This is anything but the truth. The pitch should have been ruled a ball. Rule 8.01 (d) covers the unique situation. If the pitchers makes an illegal pitch with the bases unoccupied, it shall be called a ball unless the batter reaches first base on a hit, an error, a base on balls, a hit batter or otherwise.

The same ruling would apply if a pitcher, on the mound after starting his delivery, lets the ball slip out of his hand nd the ball falls to the ground.
