





A Time For Reflection

For the Christian community it has been a Holy Week which climaxes with Easter services Sunday The Jewish community has been marking Passover.

With the unstable world about us today it is significant that despite the rivalries, bitterness, and other human frailities that often pit brother against brother throughout most of the year we seem to set them aside, if only momentarily, to permit men and their families to worship according to their customs and beliefs.

For the Christian and Hebrew communities this is doubly significant since both share a common root.

And perhaps this is the lesson of the various Christian and Jewish rites performed. We share much more in common than in what we may differ. Perhaps it is the roots we should remember and build upon.

Easter and Passover may have very fundamental different meanings but both are festivals of joy.

Regardless of religious faith, both express a form of God's mercy and committment to men. And it is a season in which we, regardless of religious faith, accept once again God's promise and recommit ourselves to Him.

It is a happy time. Peace on Earth and shalom alecem.

Why Phase 3 Failed

President Nixon's strategy for phasing out wage and price controls through a system of voluntary controls failed because nobody was willing to exercise controls voluntarily. And Nixon's "club in the closet" designed to clobber Phase 3 offenders proved an empty threat because there were too many of them.

The result has been more inflation and a renewed demand for wage and datory controls. George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO, has resumed his role as a critic of Nixon's economic policies and is demanding stringent price, interest and rent control, plus a senseless threat to tie wage demands to the price of meat.

While some members of Congress moan about the growth of executive powers, there is little disposition to take responsibility in fighting inflation. It is politically more expedient to castigate the President for impounding funds and to keep on deficit spen-

The House voted 293 to 114 a one year extension, to April 30, 1974, of Nixon's economic powers. It was a victory for the administration but it leaves the problem squarely in the President's lap. The real triumph for Nixon and common sense was the rejection of all attempts to roll back

ceiling on all except farm prices at the April 16 level.

Opponents cited the administrative difficulties involved in a roll back. Business and organized labor opposed the proposal which drew its support from so called liberals.

Treasury Secretary George Shultz said he did not expect Nixon would impose a new wage price freeze but might seek tighter controls in less dramatic ways. The trouble with controls is that

they bandage over the underlying malignancy and do not touch the root causes of inflation; chiefly continued government deficit spending and excessive expansion of the money supply. They do not affect wage increases which have no relationship to increased productivity.

Worst of all, the talk of freezes or roll backs diverts attention from the root causes.

The explosive inflation that occurred during the first part of the year was a shock to the planners and to the

Political pressures now may force Nixon to reimpose tight controls and keep them for a year or more. Controls won't get rid of the inflationary push. That bug-a-boo will be with us until the runaway federal budget is brought under control.

Canadians **Orbit New** Satellite

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) A new Canadian communications satellite circled the earth today to expand service to that nation's remote northland and provide a new telephone link between Alaska and the continental United

States. The satellite, named Anik 2 after the Eskimo word for brother, was launched by an American Delta rocket Friday night into a great elliptical orbit ranging from about 130 to

22 300 miles above the earth. Telesat Canada ground stations will calculate the precise orbital path for three days and on Monday night will send a radio signal to fire a rocket motor that will lock the payload in a stationary orbit 22,300 miles high.

After extensive checkout, Anik 2 is expected to be placed in commercial operation in about four weeks.

Its twin, Anik 1, was launched Nov. 9 and is providing telephone and television service for the first time to scores of remote Canadian communities, some north of the Arctic Circle. For many of these villages, the only previous communication with the outside world was by shortwave radio.

Telesat Canada will pay the National Aeronautics and Space Administration about \$7.5 million for launch services, including the price of the Delta

tests a machine that will be used in Skylab to record the energy required for astronauts to do a measured amount of work in weightless condi-

The Saturn 1B will launch the Apollo spacecraft or command/service module carrying the astronauts to the Skylab orbital workshop.

Skylab, our country's first earth orbiting space station, is scheduled for launching sometime next month. It will be placed into orbit about 270 miles above our planet.

The purpose of the Skylab mission is to gather information about the earth, the sun, man and space. About 60 experiments will be carried out.

Skylab experiments about the EARTH will help man learn about this planet's resources and problems, such as air and water pollution, flooding and erosion.

Skylab experiments about the SUN will tell man more about his most important source of energy. These sun (or solar) experiments will also tell us how the sun affects the weather.

Skylab MEDICAL experiments will increase man's knowledge about himself. For long periods of time, crews will be living under weightless conditions. How will this affect man's balance, heartbeat, circulation and sleep?

Skylab experiments about SPACE will find out more about the stars and the upper atmosphere. New machines for use in space and new methods to help astronauts to move around in zero gravity will be tested.


To carry out the mission, three different crews will live in Skylab during an eightmonth period.

The mission will begin with the launch of unmanned Saturn V, carrying the workshop which will automatically assemble in space.

Twenty-four hours later, the first astronaut crew will be launched in a command service module. This module will hook up with Skylab. The three man crew will remain on Skylab for 28 days.

Sixty days after the first crew returns, another crew will be sent up to visit the workshop. This mission will last 56 days.

The third and last crew will be launched about 30 days after the second crew returns to Earth. This visit is scheduled to last for another 56 days.

Prime crewmen for the first skylab mission are Charles Conrad, Jr., commander, Joseph P. Kerwin, science pilot, and Paul J. Weitz, pilot. Conrad, a U.S. Navy captain, was commander of Apollo 12 and has spent a total of 506 hours in space. Kerwin is a doctor of medicine and is a commander in the U.S. Navy Medical Corps. Weitz holds a master's degree in aeronautical engineering. This will be the first flight into space for Kerwin and Weitz.

Space Quiz-a-roo

What about water, food and clothing?

Water, food and clothing supplies will be stored in special places in the Workshop before the launch.

What will the astronauts wear?

For normal working and living in the workshop, the astronauts will wear cotton overalls over undershirts and underpants. These will be thrown away when dirty. They also will have a special space suit to wear for some inside experiments and possible emergencies.

What are some of the problems of living in zero gravity?

Keeping motionless becomes a real problem. Means of holding the astronauts down, such as a firehouse pole and handrails, will be provided. In zero gravity, the idea of up and down makes very little difference. It is as easy for the astronauts to stand on the ceiling as on the floor.

What about the air?

The air inside Skylab will contain the same amount of oxygen as the air on earth.

New 8-Cent Postage Stamp




An 8-cent postage stamp honoring the astronomer Nicholaus Copernicus (1473-1543) is the newest postage stamp issued by the Postal Service.






