Gas Saving Tips

Suggestions for getting more miles to the gallon have been released by the Auto Club of Hartford of the American Automobile Assn. and should be considered by each of us as the suggestions not only will conserve

gasoline but save us some money also. First, the club says, slow down. It costs you almost 50 per cent more money to drive at 70 to 80 miles per hour as it does to drive 50 mph. The average car uses gasoline most efficiently at 40 mph.

Second, use the proper octane for your car. Too high an octane wastes money and too low lessens performance and can cause engine damage. Third, keep your car's engine in tune because an out-of-tune engine can reduce mileage by as much as 23







Stamps In The News By SYD KRONISH

The Boston Tea Party - one of the heroic episodes which led to the birth of a new nation will be hailed on a block of four new U.S. postage stamps to be issued July 4. The block of 8-cent stamps is a postal recognition of the Bicentennial of the American Revolution. The place of issuance is, naturally,

The quartet of stamps, each a design entity, combine to complete the scene of 1773 when enraged colonists dumped chests of tea from British ships into Boston Harbor as a protest of the English-levied tax on tea. The over-all design shows two British ships, colonists in boats and a portion of the dock. Each stamp is inscribed horizontally "The Boston Tea Party, U.S." in black and "8c" in red. A vertical inscription, in black, is "Bicentennial Era." followed by a modification of the Bicentennial logo in red. The importance of the Boston Tea Party to the cause of the colonists can be assessed by the nents of an angry King minister: "The die is now cast

The colonies must either submit or triumph." Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send them to Boston Tea Party Stamp, Postmaster, Boston, Mass. 02109." Enclose the proper re mittance, which is 32 cents for the block of four (in money order or certified check but not cash or stamps). Requests must be postmarked no later than July 4. Due to the size of the combination of the four stamps, the accompanying envelope should be addressed low and to the left.

Collectors of Israeli stamps and unusual pictorially canceled cachets can still obtain two companion official souvenir covers of the limited edition of the 25th anniversary of Israel Independence issued for the Jerusalem Fair. The white envelopes are dec-

orated with the blue and silver menorah symbol of the Jerusalem Fair and an enlarged reproduction of the stamp depicting the great Lion's Gate at Jerusa-

One cover carries the Israel stamp with tab and features the famous Moroccan lamp at the Jerusalem Museum. This rare cancellation, dated Nov. 22 in Jerusalem, was used only for that one day to greet the fair. The companion cover, com Nov. 23 of the Los Angeles 25th anniversary of Independence Jerusalem Fair, carries the U.S. Albert Einstein stamp. The set of two covers is available for \$2.50 per set from: Holy Land Covers, c -o International Stamp Collectors Society, P.O. Box 48806, Los Angeles, Calif. 90048.
