





John Connally has left the Democratic party, which elected him governor of Texas, to become a Republican in a masterpiece of anticlimactic timing that ended months of mild speculation.

Connally, friend and adviser to Presidents Johnson, Kennedy and Nixon, when he made his switch to allegiance official explained that the Democratic party he had supported all his life "has moved so far left that it has left the majority of Americans who occupy the great middle ground of political thought in this country.'

Connally said he sought no elective or appointive political office but skirted the question of whether he would seek the Republican presidential nomination in 1976.


Democrats discounted his defection as having been coming a long time. Republicans welcomed Connally. Senator John G. Tower of Texas said his timing "demonstrates the sincerity of his commitments" and urged other Democrats to follow his example in "a realistic political

Senator Robert Dole of Kansas said "he can be of enormous help to our party in this time of adversity."

A portegee of Lyndon Johnson, Connally maintained his Democratic allegiance during his service as President Nixon's treasury secretary. Nixon has proclaimed his admiration for Connally and doubtless would be happy to have Connally undertake another post in his government. Nixon naturally was pleased by Connally's announcement which came after he

had telephoned the President. Vice President Agnew and Senator Percy of Illinois, who have been mentioned as possible candidates for the nomination to succeed President Nixon, expressed their gratification at Connally's entry into the party, although he may challenge them for

For the present, Connally has indicated he would prefer to remain outside the administration, but, if pressed by Nixon, he probably would accept another appointment.



Progress in Electronics

Four new U.S. stamps hailing our progress in electronics will-be issued on July 10 - the fourth anniversary of the first man to step on the moon. The quartet of adhesives, in as many denominations, span development of electronics from Marconi's turn-of-the-century spark coil to the transistor which set the stage for the

space age.
An 8-cent stamp for firstclass mail commemorates the transistors and a printed circuit board. The transistor virtually revolutionized electronics, opening the way to new products. particularly the computer. A 6-cent stamp, intended for postcards, shows Guglielmo Marconi's spark coil and spark The 11-cent airmail depicts Lee De Forest's Audion and the Audion tube. With these in 1915 he transmitted the human voice from Arlington, Va., to Paris. De Forest is also credited with developing the motion picture. facsimile transmission and

In a 15-cent stamp for international surface mail, three electronic elements - an early microphone, a goosenecked speaker and a vacuum tube are combined with a TV camera tube.

Each stamp will contain one plate number and will be issued in horizontal format, commemorative size, in panes of 50. It is interesting to note that these four stamps, were designed by a husband and wife team, Walter and Naiad Einsel of Westport, Conn. They have won numerous awards for their joint art efforts.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send their requests to "Electronics Stamps, Postmaster, New York, N.Y. 10001: Enclose the proper remittance - 40 cents for the set of four stamps - in money order or certified check. Should you desire just a specific stamp or less than four, send the appropriate amount. Requests must be postmarked prior to July 10.

The UNESCO program to excavate the site of the ancient city of Carthage is being honored by Tunisia with a set of six new stamps and a souvenir sheet, according to the World Wide Philatelic Agency. Each of the new stamps illustrates a reproduced artifact from earlier digs. Also shown are tools used in archeology, from the ancient to the modern. Located within what is now Tunisia, Carthage enjoyed prominence to challenge an-cient Rome as led by the famous warrior, Hannibal.




