





#### **Marrieds-Only** Restriction **Ruled** Out

WASHINGTON (AP) - A state's desire to promote fami-ly life is insufficient réason to deprive illegitimate children of welfare benefits granted the offspring of married couples, the Supreme Court has ruled. The ruling knocked down the marrieds-only provision of New Jersey's assistance to families of the working poor.' For whatever its purpose, the eight-member majority said in an unsigned opinion, the program works to discriminate against illegitimate children in an unconstitutional manner. "The status of illegitimacy has expressed through the ages society's condemnation of irresponsible liaisons beyond the bonds of marriage," said the court, quoting from an earlier opinion on the same "But visiting this condemnation on the head of an infant is

illogical and unjust," the majority said. The New Jersey Welfare Rights Organization attacked the state law. The high court found in their favor without pausing for a hearing. Justice William H. Rehnquist said he favored the state's position.

# A Matter of Ethics

Herald.

While many of the Watergate revelations are frightening enough the reaction of some people are even more frightening, in many respects. Because "dirty politics" is not a

new phenomena on the national scene, state scene, or even in Manchester, if we were to dig back far enough, there seems to be rather blase reaction to the whole affair. And this is not just locally but enough reports from other parts of the country indicate a similar nonchalance about the sordid mess.

To assess the full implications requires careful distinction between the criminal and political aspects of the case.

The actual burglary of Watergate, the bugging attempt, and the aiding and abetting of these acts are things which can be and are to be dealt with in courts of law.

The political aspects, that is the ethics of conceiving such political tactics, is more difficult to resolve. Ethical conduct, short of actual violation of the law, is usually beyond legal punishment.

True, careers can be ruined. Public opinion, if really aroused and indig nant, can bring about laws which could deter future ethical aberrations but the fact remains that we in America have become too ingrained into accepting a certain amount of "dirty politics" as part of the game until it touches too close to home.

There hasn't been a political campaign in recent years that we can recall where some charges or allegations of political chicanery haven't been raised. In the past, these have faded away after the election. Watergate has not and will not for some time.

It appears then the time may be now for really coming to grips with the central issue of Watergate which is the question of political ethics and fair play.

We have had a fair campaign practices committee and code for years. We have select committees over the years make cursory examinations of alleged corruption in campaigns. We have had many half-hearted attempts. at writing laws to control campaign contributions and campaign spending. The problem has been that despite all these efforts, a Watergate has occurred. And the tragedy is that it can occur again unless we take a whole new fresh approach to the problem of political ethics.

There are three areas which sould concern us about the ethical conduct of any campaign, whether for director of Manchester, governor of Connecticut, or any other political office.

First, the responsibility for the conduct of the campaign cannot be divorced from the candidate. There is no valid logic in assuming there will be moral leadership in office unless it is demonstrated prior to holding that office.

Second, the campaigns should be shortened to reduce the costs and in turn reduce time devoted to fund raising which would be better used to discuss the issues.

political parties concentrate on issues, instead of personalities, fund raising with its real or imaginary links with corruption would diminish in importance since financial support could be solicited without implied favors.

Present laws to list contributors and contributions have not "cleaned" up politics. Only when both parties and the candidates in both parties place ethics ahead of "winning" can this evil be eliminated.

So let's not fool ourselves.

People back parties and candidates they believe will help their own interests best. As long as parties, all political parties, base their appeals to special interest groups, and they all do, they'll get special interest support and, once elected attempt to fulfil special interest favors.

Only with shorter campaigns conducted on broad issues, can the need for heavy contributions and the resultant obligation to special interests be placed in reasonable perspective.

And the third area is the individual American voter. The Democrats or Republicans aren't running this town, state or country. They may be in control at various levels but they do not represent a true majority of Americans.

In Connecticut, the unaffiliated voter bloc is substantial enough to deny either party true claim to epresenting the majority.

President Nixon's landslide was cancelled out by Democratic control of the Congress. In many states, voters do not have to register party or non-party affiliation at all.

If-the political party system is in sad shape a large share of the blame lies right at the door step of each us who "vote the man," don't contribute time or money to a political party; don't raise cain when we witness hanky-panky going on or, and this is the greatest sin of all, don't take the time to read, listen or study about the problems of our democracy so that we really know what we are voting for, if and when we do vote.

This is where the real answer to an uncorruptible political system lies. Unless the people set the level of ethics they expect in public officials, unless they back this up with political and moral participation at a grassroots level, and unless they are unswerving in demanding swift and just punishment of those who abuse the public trust; no code of ethics, no volume of laws, no number of special reports, and no periodic house cleaning is going to elevate politics to the professional level it should have in a democracy.

After all the politician and the political parties represent a constituency and to the extent this constituency has an ethical standard is the extent of the standard in politics

For in the final analysis, public morality is but a reflection of private morality, which means passing the buck does not depend entirely upon where it stops but where it starts as well, meaning you and I.





WASHINGTON (AP) - For John B. Connally, there is a job of political salesmanship ahead if he is to establish firmly his new Republican credentials in time for what looks like a crowded 1976 presidential con-

\*As he switched parties, Connally said he sought no office, appointive or elective. That is the kind of thing politicians say three years in advance of a presidential campaign. It is also the kind of thing

other politicans discount. Formally joining the GOP in its hour of Watergate trouble, Connally has been warmly greeted by the party establishment. But some of the same Republican leaders who welcomed him aboard are likely to be his rivals in the years immediately ahead.

When that time comes, men like Vice President Spiro T. Agnew and Sen. Charles H. Percy may well be pointing out that Connally after all is a fledgling Republican with a long Democratic past.

Agnew, Percy, and Govs. Nelson A. Rockfeller of New York and Ronald Reagan of California all are potential entries in 1976 Republican

presidential competition. There may be more. So Connally clearly is not going to move to the top of his new party without a fight. Having forsaken his

Democratic ties, the former Texas governor now needs to get his lines open and his alliances made in the Republican party. Some already have been forged, during his days as

Nixon's secretary of the treasury and 1972 campaign al-He has the advantage of his

role as head man of Democrats for Nixon, an assignment that demonstrated his political preference, and leaves him out of what has become the Watergate scandal.

One obvious step for Connally now is to start on the Republican speechmaking fund-raising circuit. Beyon that are the 1974 congressional and state election campaigns. By that time, if he is to make a move in 1976. Connally will have to be a Republican on active duty, working for GOP candidates for Senate, House and overnor

A more immediate, and more difficult question is the Watergate affair: How does he handle that one? So far, he has denounced the incident as stupid, while saying that it was not the work of the Republican party itself.

Associates had said Connally's long anticipated political switch was delayed because of the Watergate controversy. He denies that, saying the scandal had nothing to do with his timing.

Monday, he turned up in Key Biscayne, Fla., to confer with President Nixon at the President's- request. He left without taking a new assignment in the administration, but that may yet happen, at least on a part-time or temporary basis. There had been reports he might be offered appointment as secretary of defense, but the

word was that he wasn't inerested. There have been suggestions that he might have had that job in the first Nixon term had he

not decided in the waning days of the 1968 campaign to stick with the Democratic ticket instead of openly boosting Nixon n Texas.

The President is a Connally admirer. He once said the Texan could handle any job in the nation or the world. Nixon is said to have told a White House visitor early this year that Con nally is likely to top the GOP ticket next time.

More recently, Nixon has been quoted as saying that Illinois' Sen. Percy will never be nominated if he has anything to say about it, in an angry response to Percy's pressure for a special prosecutor in the

Watergate case. But it now appears that Nixon may not have much to say about it. He would enter 1976 as a politician serving his last year in his last office, with dwindling powers to reward or punish politically.





#### We finally have the secret of the fermented fruit which was discussed in this column in March of 1970 Lee Spinella of 11 Wyllys St. had told us about the fruit

which is served atop ice cream, sherbet or cake. As the story went, one had to be 'worthy' to receive a portion of the fruit from a friend. The mixture consists of peaches, pineapple and

maraschino cherries. While it has a mild brandy-type flavor. no spirits are used. Every two weeks, the recipient of the fruit adds to her supply to keep the fruit jar filled foreover or to give away.

At the time of the story, received letters and phone calls from several people requesting the starter recipe if I ever found it. Jane Squires, who now lives in Minnesota, wrote me at the time. She included a column that had been in the Minneapolis paper on the same topic but also without a recipe. searched high and low for the answer, studying also the fermentation of wine. I missed the answer completely. The secret of the starter is so simple I don't know why it didn't come to mind.

It's yeast! Ann Maulucci of Bolton called me several weeks ago to tell me that a friend of hers had found the recipe on the back of instant dry yeast. Here is the recipe as Ann gave it to me. You must make the starter before making the fruit sauce itself. Allow two weeks for the starter to ferment before going on to the second process for the sauce itself.

Starter for Fruit Sauce % cup drained canned peaches, cut in pieces <sup>3</sup>4 cup drained pineapple tid- means at room temperature.



#### **Admen Ask Equal Time** From CBS

By JAY SHARBUTT **AP** Television Writer

NEW YORK (AP) - The American Advertising Federation, whose members include national advertisers and ad agencies, thinks CBS News gave the business of TV commercials a bad image-and right on television, too. So now it's asking the network to "consider an appropriate vehicle in which to present points of view that balance those expressed" April 26 in a CBS-TV documentary. called "You and the Commercial.

The AAF made the request in a two-page letter its president, Howard Bell, sent to Richard Salant, president of CBS News. In the letter, the AAF said there was a "lack of fairness and objectivity" in the show's study of TV commercials; i also complained that the "general treatment and emphasis of the program was to portray advertising as a con

It said that although advertising spokesmen were interviewed on the show, "there was no opportunity to respond to the one-sided opinions expressed by others on such critical matters as counter-advertising, social impact and economic value. Salant, who said he got the letter Monday, declined to publicly comment right now on its charges. He said he felt that Bell, "as an old friend of mine, is entitled to first word of my

He said he would write Bell this week and respond both to the letter's complaints and request for time to "balance" what the AAF considered to be 'one-sided opinions" expressed on the unsponsored show.

The two-page letter nowhere asked for the time under the Federal Communications Commission's "fairness doctrine." "We haven't faced that yet," said Jonah Gitlitz, executive vice president of the Washington-based AAF.

"We're waiting to see what kind of response we get." Gitlitz, whose group has total membership of 450 major advertisers, advertising agencies and media companies, said the AAF wasn't specifying how CBS should let the ad industry

express its views. CBS' unprecedented documentary about TV commercials drew a few disgruntled harrumphs from advertising agency officials right after it was broadcast, but no official complaints until the AAF's letter.

A CBS spokesman this week said there still have been no formal gripes about the show from either advertisers or ad agencies. He said none have threatened to withdraw their advertising from CBS, either. Until the AAF's letter, the

strongest industry growl had been a bitter editorial in the April 30 edition of "Advertising Age," a magazine widely read by advertising men and women. The editorial described "You and the Commercial" as "as unfair and slanted as any program we have seen in a long
