

Form Long Line For Sesquicentennial Medallions

This is only a small part of the crowd lined up Thursday evening to buy silver and bronze medallions, commemorating Manchester's Sesquicentennial Celebration. The line started forming at 4:45 in front of the Municipal Building and wound its way into the parking lot. Many people drove by and left when they couldn't find a place to park. Some of them returned later. The sale opened at 7:30 and by 8:45 the limited supply of 500 silver medallions was sold out. Many

of those in line were still in line when the edition was exhausted. With 2,000 of the bronze medallions on sale, they lasted longer and some were left when the sale ended at 10 p.m. Those were placed for sale today in town banks. 

A Liveable Town Budget

Manchester Town Directors have adopted a new budget and in the process have given the property axpayer some relief in the form of a two-mill levy cut.

In most instances most departments had their budgets increased reflecting surplus funds from the past fiscal year, revenue-sharing funds, and increased property valuations.

It is not a fat budget nor is it an austerity one.

Understandably there are some, who had original requests cut in the oudgeting process, who are not totally appy with the final budget.

Manchester budget is one the own and its agencies can live with and one which recognizes that fiscal esponsibility as exercised by the Board of Directors is appreciated by the taxpayers.

Now that the budgets have been set for the various town departments, the

task shifts from the directors primar ly to each department head, to live within the bounds of those limits.

It is our hope that they can and will so that next year when a new budget is being formulated there will be no deficits to contend with by the town manager or the directors.

Balancing the budget and living within it, like charity, should begin at home

We, the taxpayers of the community, should commend the efforts of the directors in holding the line in so far as was possible in town operations and in passing on a two-mill tax saving.

The significance is not the two mills but the fact that the trend toward ever-increasing mill levies not only has been halted but reversed. This may not be possible again next year. but for this year at least it has, and if the directors and administration continue along these fiscally conservative lines, we are a long way from the road toward that goal of getting full value for each tax dollar expended.
