



. It is in this background that Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana has raised the point that Congress and the Administration may be on a collision course toward a constitutional crisis.

The elements of such a confrontation are basically three: First, there is no question of the right of Congress to control the purse strings of the federal government for defense or any other purpose.

Second, the Constitution charges the President, as commander-in-chief of the armed forces, with the full responsibility of the nation's defense.

Third, the first two elements are blurred a bit by the constitutional provision that the Congress only has the right to declare war.

Until our involvement in Indochina, there has really never been any question raised as serious as the one now posed by the House action and Mansfield's expression of a need for a

In the past our involvements in conflicts have stemmed either from presidential requests for a declaration of war following attacks on the United States, fulfillment of treaties, including such misadventures as South Korea and South Vietnam; or protection of the national interests, such as our frequent incursions in Latin America in the 1920s and more recently, the landing of troops in Lebanon, under then President Eisenhower.

So until now, the powers of Congress to declare war or Gulf of Tonkin resolutions, have for the main been formalities recognizing or, if you prefer, legalizing the actions already taken by the commander-in-chief.

The attitude has been that the President as commander-in-chief has the responsibility for deciding what does or does not threaten the nation's security and the Congress, rightly or wrongly, has up to now, never really challenged this interpretation. Obviously in cases like Pearl Har-

bor there would be no dispute. There has been criticism, mostly after the fact, of our involvement in Korea and Latin America.

But today, in the wake of South Vietnam and an almost obsessive desire to disengage the United States from Indochina entirely, we are faced with what Mansfield has labeled a true "constitutional crisis."

For the moment it must be considered a "headline" crisis for the Senate has yet to follow the House lead. A critical decision is expected today and as this is being written there is undoubtedly a lot of behindthe-scenes jawboning going on.

For if the Senate affirms the House action the full implications for too awesome to contemplate.

On the one extreme, should the Congress win its point that it, and it alone, can involve this country in combat. Whether it is a brigade of Marines to protect American citizens and property in a nation involved in internal turmoil as had happened so often in Latin America; send troops and weapons in meeting Senate-approved treaties; or tie the commander in chief's hands at defending the nation from attack until Congress has formally declared war; we are dead in

On the other extreme, should the President's power all but ignore the Congress in the committing of men and materials in conflicts not directly involving the United States be ruled supreme, the present bombing venture in Cambodia could be just small

> In effect his constitutional duty to detend the nation will then be expanded to permit him, rightly or wrongly, to wage a foreign policy once trial-ballooned in the first few years after World War II, the concept of 'defensive attack" which simply meant striking at potential enemies before they attained military strength to pose a real threat.

Thus a constitutional test, such as Sen. Mansfield foresees, could open up a can of worms. It might be far better for the

Congress to more earnestly and unctions it now has rather than "rubber stamp" Gulf of Tonkin Resolutions and other presidential requests which are more often acted on in heat of emotion instead of the light of reason.

The question of our present involvement in Cambodia is being debated and will continue to be. The question raised by Sen. Mansfied deserves an airing. The real question remaining is that by the time the constitutional issue is resolved, the Cambodian and whole Indochina misadventure may be ancient history.

ly circled the track with steel and concrete grandstands. There is now an estimated seating capacity of 235,000 and room for an additional 100,000 persons in the track infield. Hulman has supervised construction of a more-than-100-room motel, a 27-hole golf course with nine holes in the infield and an office-museum building as well as press and hospitality quarters edway officials never announced attendance figures, but an

estimated 60,000 persons watched the 500 in 1946 and prize money totaled \$75,000 after a prewar high of \$96,250. Hulman, whose great wealth comes from varied business and

will run the 57th time May 28 with another colorful show drawing For the third straight year prize money this year will total more than \$1 million. His newest improvement at the Speedway is an addition to the motel to house VIP suites which rent for \$10,000 a year on the second floor and \$20,000 for the third-floor. round. There is even the opportunity to ride around the track in a Speedway bus for 50 cents, except in May .-But it's the race cars, the speeds and personalities that draw most people here. Racing has changed tremendously since the Waddell Ray Harroun won the first race in a Marmon Wasp at an Buckley average speed of 74.59 miles an hour.






