Fox Hill Tower Vandals Prey

Fox Hill Tower is one of Vernon's landmarks. It's used as the symbol on town stationery and on the town seal, but vandals are making it impossible for the general public to enjoy the tower and its view.

Monday night the Town Council listened to a report by Councilman Thomas Benoit who said he was approached by Miss Hazel Lutz of the Vernon Historical Society who asked about cleaning up the tower and the area around it.

Benoit said the windows in the structure have all been broken and vandals have even broken a steel door that was installed to keep them out.

There is hardly a civic group in town that at some time or other has not attempted to fix up the tower and the area around it. Benoit said most have eaten up their resources on this and other projects.

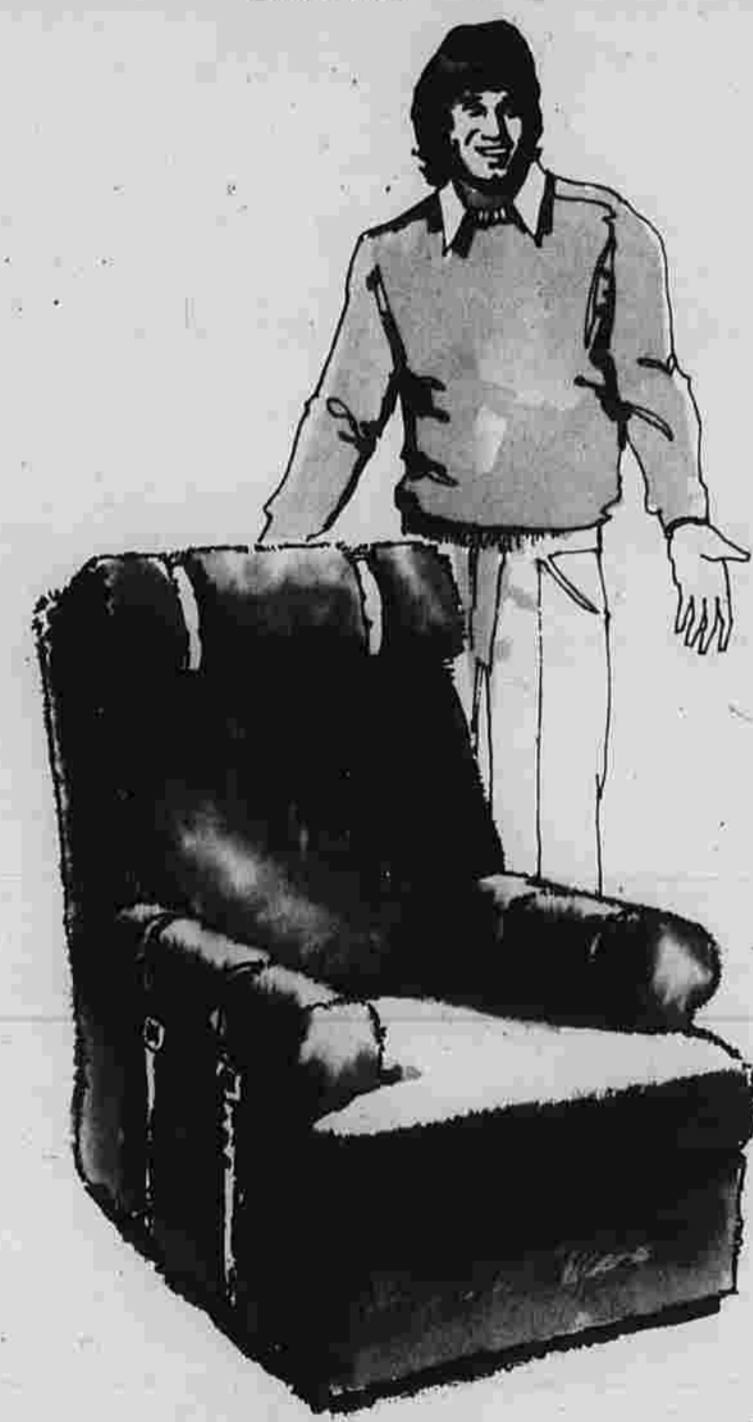
The Recreation Department, which has also worked on keeping the tower presentable, is once again having the matter turned over to it and will be assisted by a special committee to be appointed by Mayor Frank McCoy.

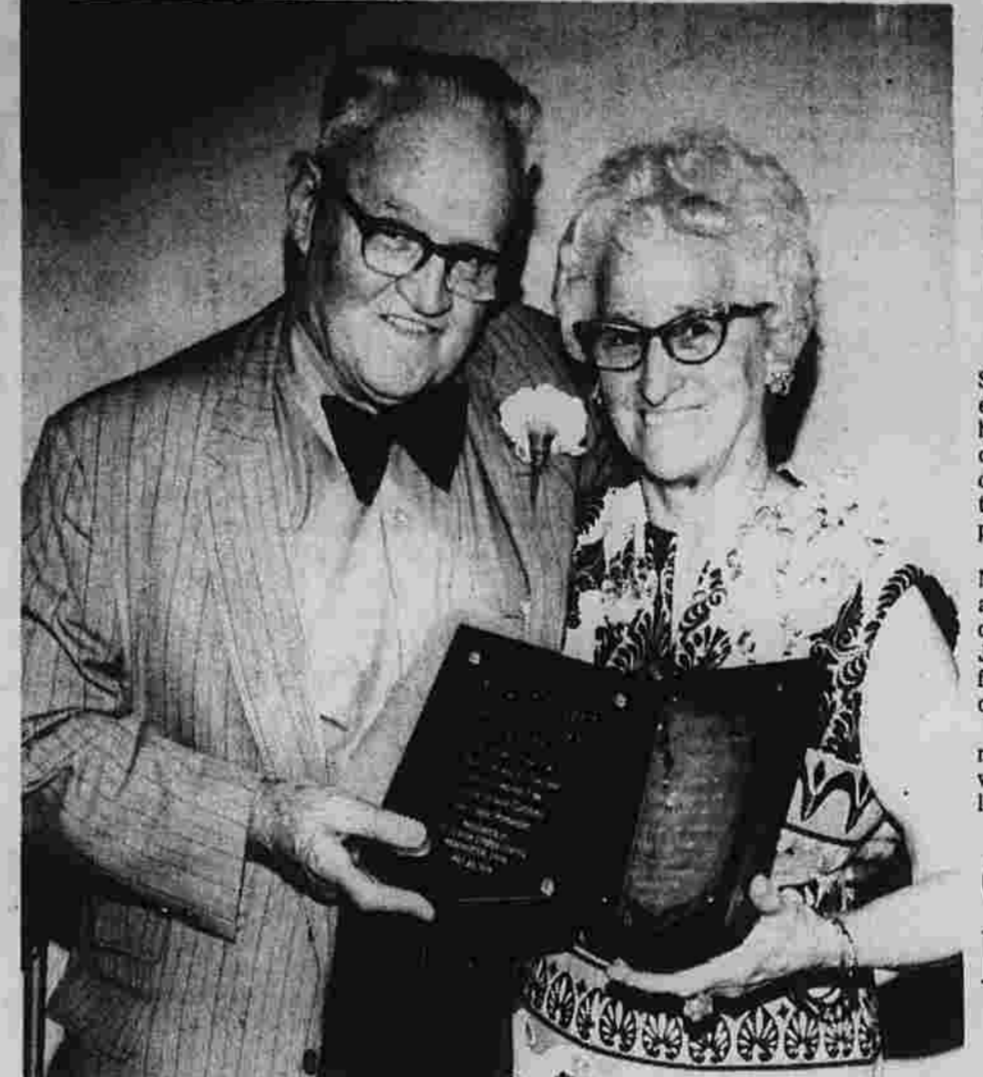

Portuguese Water Dog Striving For Survival

NEW CANAAN (AP) - A much-dreaded canine population explosion took place Tuesday night on Nantucket Island off the southern coast of New England, the Portuguese Water Dog Club of America announced Wednesday. The birth of seven of the nearly extinct water dogs brought the breed's number in this country to 22. It is estimated there are fewer than 50 of the dogs in the entire world. The breed has served European man for centuries as a retriever, lifesaver, courier, guard dog and companion of fisherfolk. It originated in the 1400's in what now is Soviet Central Asia near the Chinese border and once herded the sheep of hostile Turks. Years later, the poodle-like dog went to sea with the Spanish Armada and once herded the fishermen who piled the waters along the coast of southern Portugal. But the breed began to fade, probably due to the mechanization of the fishing fleet, which obviated the need for a dog who could dive after lost fish and gear, and carry messages between ships. Hampering the effort to save the dog from extinction is the refusal of the prestigious American Kennel Club to recognize the breed until "a genuine, continuing interest" in it is demonstrated. Without AKC recognition, dog fanciers are reluctant to become involved with the Portuguese Water Dog, because they cannot compete in any sanctioned dog shows. The dogs have wavy black coats and weigh from 35 to 55 pounds. They have unusually powerful hind legs, a physical attribute that enabled them to leap from the sea to a ship's deck. Even with the efforts of the water dog club, the breed still faces an uphill fight for survival, because the shortage of bloodlines makes a proper breeding program difficult. Club members have traveled to many Portuguese fishing villages in search of information. "The near eradication of the breed today can only be regarded as a supreme tragedy," a club spokesman said. The breed will be among many represented this weekend at the First Annual Match-Show sponsored by the Associated Rare Breeds of New England (ARBNE) at Moodus. More than 200 dogs from throughout North America have been entered in the competition.

The Hebron Symphonic Band will play host to the Barnstable High School Band from Cape Cod, which will arrive Friday and play through Sunday. The concert, featuring the Hebron High School and Hebron Rams players and coaches. Babbidge Committee Organized

HARTFORD (AP) — Legal papers formalizing the creation of a "Citizens for Homer Babbidge" organization were filed Wednesday with the secretary of state's office. The group, whose aim is to raise money in support of Babbidge's expected gubernatorial campaign, lists George J. Conkling as its treasurer. Conkling was a state finance commissioner under former Gov. John Dempsey. The organization's mailing address was listed as 101 Knollwood Road, North Haven. Babbidge, former president of the University of Connecticut and currently master of Timothy Dwight College at Yale University, last month denied published reports that he was actively seeking the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. He has been suggested as a potential challenger for incumbent Republican Gov. Thomas J. Meskill.

Newsman's Panel See No Need For Shield Statutes

NEW CASTLE, N.H. (AP) — A panel of newsmen from weeklies papers ranging from weeklies to national dailies agreed there is no need for a shield law to protect journalists. The panel was part of a Judicial Conference of the First Circuit Court of Appeals. It included Tom Wicker, associate editor of the New York Times; Robert Healy, executive editor of the Boston Globe; Thomas Gerber, editor of the Concord Monitor; Peter Cox, editor of the weekly Maine Times; Sturge Higgins, assistant U. S. Attorney for Massachusetts and a former newsmen; and U.S. District Court Judge Hugh Bowles. Wicker said he is opposed "to any kind of congressional shield law because if one is passed, it would be more restrictive on reporters than having no shield law. Absolute shield law is bad policy."

Healy said he was not in favor of a shield law unless it was absolute and he didn't think it would ever become a reality. He said his paper has had problems covering stories because its reporters have been arrested. Gerber said that he has made a complete circle in his belief in shield laws and now is not in favor of an absolute shield law. Wicker, in a speech at the conference, said the Watergate scandal will change the course of American politics. Since 1932, he said, Americans have looked upon the president as a strong man above ordinary citizens. In the next election, Wicker said, Americans will look for a man with an open personality and one who demonstrates a willingness to cooperate with the various branches of government. Wicker said there is more need to control the CIA and FBI and predicted reforms in campaigns and White House staffing because of Watergate. Wicker said he was disturbed by some aspects of the Senate Watergate hearings because some testimony is hearsay.

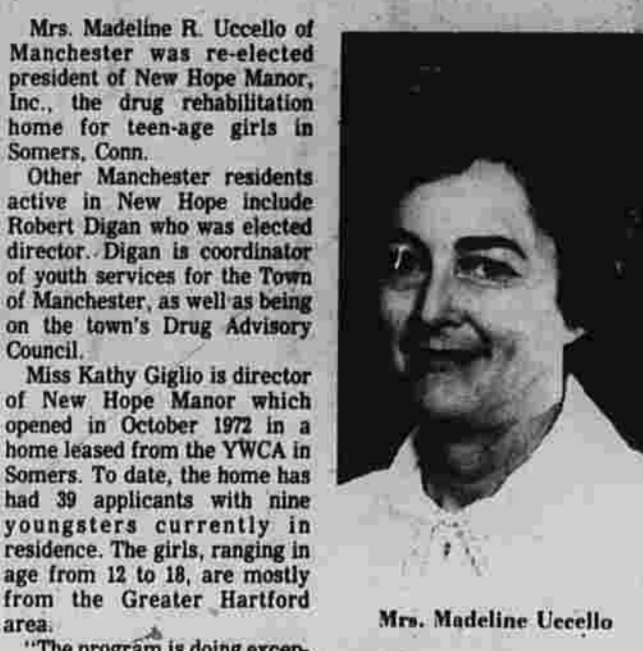

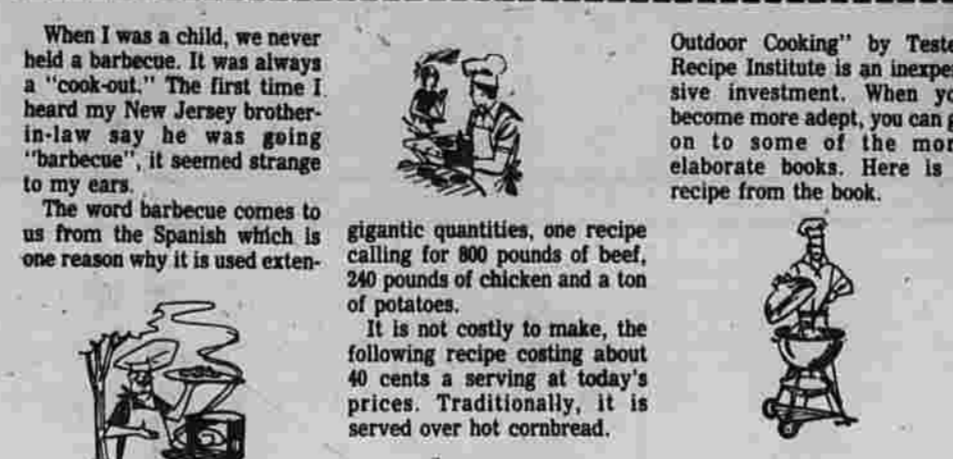

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

"When I was a child, we never held a barbecue. It was always a 'cook-out.' The first time I heard my New Jersey brother-in-law say he was going 'barbecue', it seemed strange to my ears.

The word barbecue comes to us from the Spanish which is one reason why it is used extensively in the western part of our country. The early Spanish called it 'barbacoa,' a word taken from Haiti. Of course, French is spoken in Haiti. Some historians claim that the early French explorers saw the natives pit-roasting whole animals. It is thought they said 'barbe a queue' which meant it was cooked 'to the tail'; in other words from head to tail. The original word 'barbacoa' had nothing to do with roasting meat. Mencken, in his 'History of the English Language' tells us that a 'barbacoa' was a sleeping bench elevated on stilts. There is no accurate reasoning for the change in name unless one considers the information in the paragraph above.

Colonial records of the Spanish show that within a few years after being first recorded, barbecue was being used throughout the Caribbean. It designated a variety of lattice-like structures which were used for drying as well as roasting and also applied to a type of fish trap.

We find barbecue, sometimes spelled barbeque, being used by 1700 to describe the roasting of an animal. By 1720, it was used to describe the social gathering as well. Well before 1758, politicians gave great outdoor feasts to win over voters. George Washington mentions barbecues in his diary. He served rum, punch, wine, beer and cider along with the food.

In the 1800's, political parties vied with each other to see who could supply the greatest amount of food. Their guests traveled miles to attend and were usually hungry when they arrived. The meat was basted with salted hot water while cooking. Before serving, the cook would take a mixture of lard, strong vinegar, red and black pepper which he brushed over the meat.

When Harrison ran for president, a huge rally was held at Wheeling, West Virginia. 30,000 people attended. They consumed 360 hams, 26 sheep, 20 calves, 1,500 pounds of beef, 8,000 pounds of bread, more than 1,000 pounds of cheese and 4,500 pies.

In the second half of the 19th century, Kentuckians served a highly popular dish called 'barbecue.' This dish had its origin in the mid-18th century. A mainstay of the salar's diet it was served as a thick porridge.

Eventually barbeque became associated with Kentucky. It was served at large outdoor functions and is connected with Derby Day. It is a popular dish at church suppers and horse sales. Barbeque was made in

gigantic quantities, one recipe calling for 800 pounds of beef, 240 pounds of chicken and a ton of potatoes.

It is not costly to make, the following recipe costing about 40 cents a serving at today's prices. Traditionally, it is served over hot cornbread.

Kentucky Barbeque For 20 People

2 lbs. lean beef with bone
1 stewing chicken, cut up
1 lb. lean lamb or veal, cubed
4 quarts water
2 cups chopped onions
¼ cup butter or margarine
2 cups diced potatoes
3 cups diced carrots
1 stalk celery, sliced
2 cups fresh or one 10-ounce frozen lima beans
2 cups okra, chopped
2 green peppers, sliced
1 quart tomato juice
1 clove garlic
1 small red pepper
8 ears young corn, fresh or frozen
2 teaspoons chopped parsley

Boil beef, chicken, and lamb or veal until tender using 4 quarts water. Remove meat from bone and replace in pot with the liquid. Save onions in butter in skillet until brown. Add to meat and stock. Add potatoes, carrots, celery. Cook 15 minutes. Add lima beans and simmer slowly 30 minutes. Add okra, green peppers, tomato juice, garlic, small red pepper and the corn out from the cob. Simmer 30-45 minutes more. Add parsley. Serve over squares of cornbread. Makes 20-25 servings.

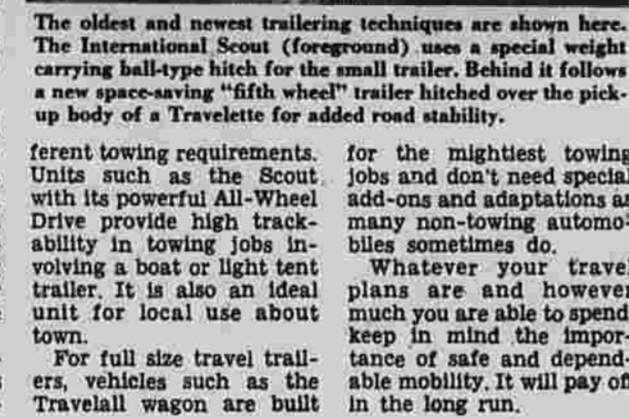
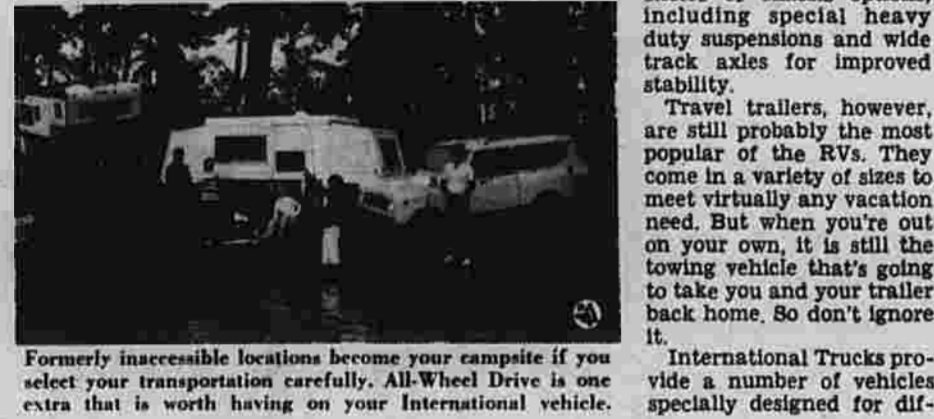

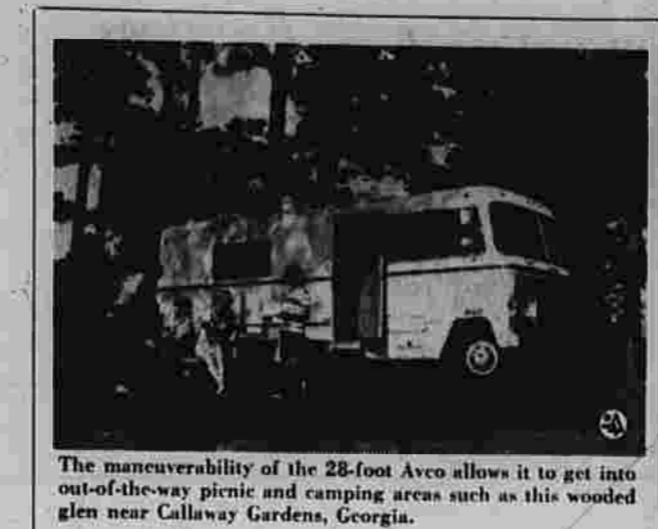
