Base Closings Not All Bad

Americans have nursed so long at the federal breast that the mere thought of having to get along on their own gives them severe teething problems.
Cries of anguish went up across the land at the recent announcement by the Department of Defense that it planned to shut down or cut back 274 domestic military bases, eliminating some 26,000 civilians and 16,000 military jobs.
Closing of the Air Force Base in Laredo, Tex., claimed Mayor J.C. Martin, will deprive his city of \$15 million a year. "I was stunned," he said. "We are economically dependent on the base."

In Rhode Island, where the Navy is the state's largest employer, Democratic Rep. Fernand St. Germain predicted that closing of all naval facilities in Newport would have "consequences that may approach that of the depression of the '30s."

As usual, Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater had a biting comment: "It is ironic that members of Congress who have yelled the loudest in recent years for lower defense spending are among those complaining because establishments in their states were closed."

A funny thing has been happening, however, on the way to the closing. As noted by Alan L. Otten in the Wall Street Journal, "a disproportionately large share of military installations and defense contracts seems to gravitate to the home areas of high-ranking members of committees dealing with military matters."

According to a survey by Congressional Quarterly, he says, two-thirds of the members of the Senate and House Armed Services committee represent states or districts where military outlays are the largest source of federal funds.

One city that will not be having teething problems is New Orleans, which happens to be in the home district of Rep. F. Edward Hebert, who happens to be chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.

Indeed, Rep. Hebert issued a press release in March informing his constituents that 1,700 new jobs and millions of dollars in military payrolls and construction outlays were coming into the district — "undoubtedly the largest single move made by any branch of the military into the New Orleans area in history."

Some of the Navy personnel are being transferred from Omaha. This elicited a blast from Sen. Carl Curtis of Nebraska who claimed that the whole thing was "an attempt by the Navy to cater to the demands and wishes" of Rep. Hebert and that rather than saving money, the moves would cost the taxpayers an extra \$41.5 million or more.

But all is not gloom for those communities not fortunate enough to have friends on the congressional military committees.

According to Members of Congress for Peace through Law, a group of congressmen dedicated to trimming the fat off defense budgets, the closing of a base does not necessarily result in economic disaster.

Preliminary findings in a study being conducted by the MCLP show that in communities which have received special assistance after local base closings, 79,456 defense-oriented jobs were replaced by 80,762 new non-defense jobs.

Moreover, base closings have provided communities with vocational and technical training facilities for 10,000 students, 3,000 former military housing units to meet civilian housing needs and facilities for industrial parks and recreation areas.

Capital Fare

WASHINGTON, D.C. — In many ways we have become a nation of phonies. We call it Memorial Day weekend, but it is in fact a weekend dedicated to gold-brickers that they may loaf for three days instead of one, the better to enjoy what used to be an annual tribute to our war dead.

The age, of course, is unemotional, perhaps because Americans have had so much war during the past 32 years. Yet it is said that Memorial Day's meaning passes unnoticed by so many millions of the citizenry. Its very untruiseness — no fireworks, no gift-giving — would seem to plead with a people not to be too worldly or cynical to spare a moment's thought enroute to the golf course or ball game for the men who died in their wars.

There is no obligation to proclaim as heroes those millions of dead. Men who go to war are not always the stuff of which heroes are made. Most of them admittedly would not fight if the decision were theirs. But that is what gives them an authentic glory. By and large, Americans are a peace-loving people, and when they serve honorably in a way they deserve the gratitude of their countrymen. For doing well what they abhor.

Gen. James Garfield, a Civil War commander later to become President, said it in his speech at Arlington National Cemetery on May 30, 1869: "We do not know one promise these men made, one pledge they gave, one word they spoke, but we do know they summed up and perfected by one supreme act the highest virtues of men and citizens. For their country, they accepted death."

Admittedly, a touch florid for 1973. For one thing, none of these men wanted to die. But they did in effect "accept death" by serving. They grumbled and sometimes sought to avoid death by cowardice, by doing their best to stay out of harm's way, but they did their duty merely by doing the uniform.

Even today, it is possible to think well of a grandfather who was wounded at Antietam and came back to fight at Gettysburg with the 15th Massachusetts Volunteers. Besides, John Tully happened to be a fervent opponent of slavery.

Indeed, in a day when professional ideologues fill the air with their harangues on civil rights, it seems at least surprising that they are the first to sneer at the idea of Memorial Day. True, the War Between the States was a national tragedy, but at least the men on both sides put their lives on the line for their beliefs instead of carving peaceful and profitable careers out of civil unrest.

Shipyard Workers Suspended

GROTON (AP) — A spokesman for the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp. said Thursday that 52 workers at the Groton shipyard have been suspended without pay following a wildcat walkout Tuesday.

S.J. Worsom, public affairs director for Electric Boat, said the workers, members of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers local at the shipyard, were suspended because of "a wildcat illegal work stoppage." He did not indicate how long the suspensions would remain in effect.

A union spokesman said the workers were among 70 IBEW members who left work to attend a special union meeting called to discuss "mistreatment of union members." He declined to elaborate.

The company termed the walkout a violation of the contract between Electric Boat and the Metal Trades Council, an organization composed of 12 separate unions that represent workers at the submarine shipyard.

One union official said the incident stemmed from continued worker unrest following the company's shutdown of the shipyard on Saturday in April. The company maintained the shutdown resulted from a lack of work, but the union said it came after company executives toured the plant and complained about workers being idle.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional probers are digging for information about people who switched from jobs with the White House, executive offices or the President's re-election team to posts with federal agencies. House Commerce Committee investigation subcommittee. The requests stem from concern by some Democratic congressmen about the state of the so-called independent regulatory agencies that Congress created to carry out administrative or judicial-type functions.

Rep. Harley O. Staggers, D-W. Va., chairman of the Commerce Committee, and members John E. Moss, D-Calif., and Bob Eckhardt, D-Tex., recently proposed legislation aimed at providing more independence to such agencies. Staggers has circulated a letter to a dozen agency chairmen or acting leaders whose operations come under the eye of his committee. The letter asks for details of agency hiring. He also sought the identity of the person who actually decides whether a particular applicant will be hired as an agency attorney.

The letters were sent before The Washington Post reported that former White House aide Charles W. Colson and a partner made plans to place a lawyer in a key position at SEC to help their firm represent clients. Congressional probers are expected to look into this

What It's About

It's an awesome game of truth and consequences. Let us hope we are learning the truth. The Watergate participants are learning the consequences, to their rue. Thus far the story is about the particular people — what they did, whom they accused, how they defended themselves, whom they give the lie to, whom they corroborate. It makes fascinating reading, in a nonstop-suspense drama in which the nation's identity and perhaps its sanity are at stake.

But assessing the scene as a whole, following the Senate committee hearings, watching the story unfold in all its majestic inevitability like a tragic drama, we are also getting a glimpse of the misty, dark nether world which attaches itself to any administration, especially one as deliberate about managing images as the Nixon Administration.

In the process of learning something about image-making and image-breaking, we are also getting a glimpse of the misty, dark nether world which attaches itself to any administration, especially one as deliberate about managing images as the Nixon Administration.

It is a world of cloak-and-dagger men in the service of the image technicians, and breaking-and-entry men in the service of both, and smart lawyers in the service of all three.

It is a lawdy nether world. I know something like it will crop up again, but I trust never with so much ugliness. The press has emerged well from it, with a prestige it hasn't enjoyed since the attacks on it began. This is all to the good. But all the media world do well to remember that central to their whole enterprise is the shaping of political images, and that the effort to select and distort those images is what the whole Watergate project was about.

Very self-conscious about agency origins of H.R. (Bob) Haldeman and John Ehrlichman, the advertising fraternity is asking itself some soul-searching questions these days. Is this what the whole packaging, branding, ballyhooing, image-managing stuff is all about?

The soul-searching is bound to be healthy. There are honest as well as dishonest admen. There are those who care about being citizens as well as technicians. But the media people must also remember that they are the image parveys. Everything is aimed at the readers and listeners through their mediation. What is hidden, what is leaked, what is disclosed, how it is presented — this depends on the media. They have become one of the great power institutions of this society.

Necessarily, they are in an adversary relation to any and every administration. But the First Amendment means that the administration cannot be in an adversary relation to them, and hit back at them.

Today they are rising high, because the earlier agency attacks and the Clay T. Whitehead intimidations and the Watergate shenanigans have all come a cropper. But in long-range terms we in the media must be aware of our power, not only to track down culprits but also to distort for our own political preferences the images that flow through the passes we guard. This puts a special responsibility on us.

Student Researchers Fare Well in Bermuda

Vernon students who recently spent a week at the Bermuda Biological Station returned with a plaque bearing the coat of arms presented to them by the Lord Mayor of Hamilton as a formal gesture of welcome to Bermuda.

The trip involved 34 students divided into two groups, each spending one week at the station. The students were exposed to the many facets of science and were in contact with professionals engaged in basic research in varied fields.

Francis E. Brookes of the Vernon Center Middle School staff, and Joseph Bellino of the Rockville High School staff, led the two groups.

Both men said Vernon is in very good standing at the station. This was the third year such a group trip has been conducted. The continued

favorable reputation of Vernon is based on exceptionally good behavior and contributions of the groups to the station and visiting researchers, Brookes said.

Laboratory sessions and cultural experiences are also an integral part of the program. Students maintain their own salt water aquaria containing the organisms they have collected, Brookes explained. He said they use these specimens and record observations in notebooks.

In the evening the students listen to the news and weather for 20 minutes and then work in the laboratory or listen to guest lecturers. Brookes said visiting scientists are always willing to speak to the students on their research projects.

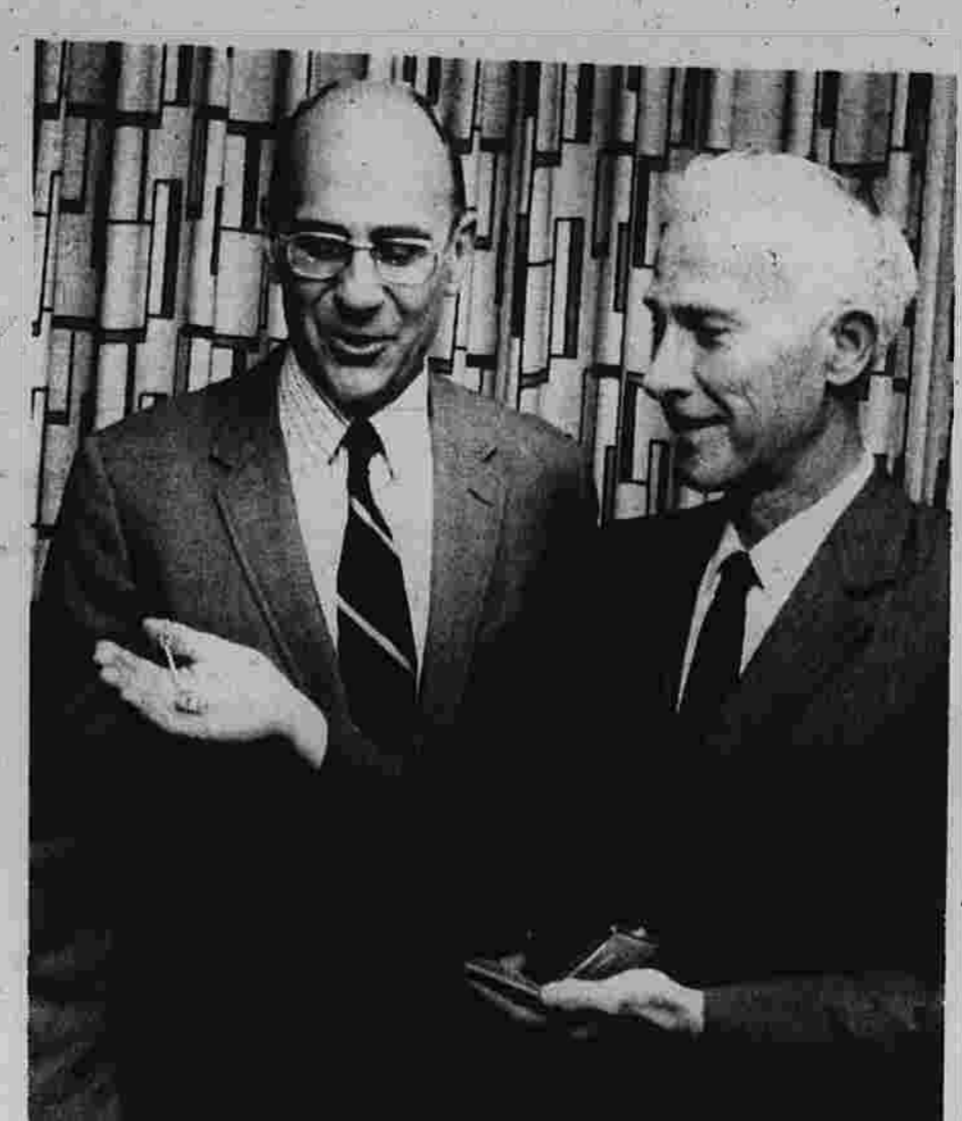

Timothy Cheney's Legacy

Story by June B. Tompkins

When Timothy Cheney, clockmaker, farmer and miller, built his home on Hartford Rd. sometime around 1780, he probably unknowingly established a precedent for quality home building for his heirs and descendants. As the pictures on this page will attest, the original model was well followed for good design, classic architecture, comfort, and magnificent landscaping achieved mainly by leaving the surrounding grounds in their natural setting. Complemented by appropriate shrubbery and flowering trees, every home in the Cheney

compound, though individual, fits into a beautiful park-like setting in the South of Manchester.

A variety of stately trees provides large areas of cool shade in summer. In the fall, the spacious rolling lawns are carpeted in riotous autumn foliage — the mass of bright yellow leaves around the former Rush Cheney mansion, in particular, brings a new brightness to the dark brick building.

Although the Cheney homes were within a short walking distance of each other, privacy was maintained by scenic driveways that curved around the great estates, the gardens specially tended by members of the Cheney

family, and the non-symmetry of the location of the homes.

It may have been the impression of the Cheney residential area which inspired the epithetical phrase — Manchester, a city of village charm. It is pleasant to see that, in spite of the houses that mushroomed like so many boxes during the World War II years, there are still many shaded streets and properties that have not been afflicted by eager bulldozers.

Manchester's physical charm is still evident in the obvious efforts of its residents to plant trees where others have been uprooted, and to plan attractive landscaping.

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U.S. Trade Surplus Recorded In April

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States recorded its first trade surplus in 18 months during April, Secretary of Commerce Frederick Dent said Thursday.
Dent noted that April was the third straight month that exports reached new record levels, while imports declined for the second month.
But Dent said he could not yet predict that the nation is in a permanent trade surplus position.
He released the figures one day earlier than usual at a special news conference. It was unusual for the country's trade figures to be announced in this way. Usually they are announced in a Commerce Department press release.
Exports exceeded imports during April by \$19.3 billion. Much of the favorable shift in the trade balance resulted from a decline in imports from Canada.
Dent said the trade figures indicate that the two evaluations of the U.S. dollars in the past two years "are having a stimulating effect on sales of U.S.-made goods."
Other factors, he said, are an economic boom abroad and a slowing of purchases of foreign products.
The United States had a trade deficit of \$9.3 billion in 1972 and a deficit of \$2 billion in 1971, the first trade deficits in recent American history.
Dent noted that despite the April surplus, the trade deficit for the first four months of the year was at an annual rate of \$1.9 billion, meaning that if the performance of the first four months continued throughout the year the year-end deficit would be \$1.9 billion.
The last previous monthly surplus was in September of 1971 when it was \$308 million.

Midwest Flood Effects Told

The floodwaters of the Mississippi River are receding at Ste. Genevieve, Mo. Townspeople find their lives slowly returning to normal, and downtown, business is almost as usual.

But less than four blocks from the town square, the skeleton of a sandbag dike remains, with plastic sheeting covering one of the remnants of the worst flooding in 30 years.

Many of the houses and stores along North Main Street and unoccupied, furniture and merchandise still resting on platforms intended to keep them from the water. Automobiles that were submerged by the river sit mired in the mud.

Highwater marks ring the buildings, some halfway up the first story, and the stagnant odor of mud and dampness hangs in the air.

"You have to wait and see what happens. What else can you do?" says Milbert Schirmer. Three weeks ago his home was filled with swirling water halfway to the ceiling. Now an inch of mud cakes the floors.

Schirmer, a resident of Ste. Genevieve for more than 25 years, looks at the three peach trees in his front yard, their leaves turning yellow after being inundated for so many days by the river.

"Boy, there ain't going to be no peaches this year, either," he says.

About 50 of 700 wild deer

trapped on Louisiana's Diamond Point, across the Mississippi River from Vicksburg, Miss., have died of starvation over the past month, despite efforts to feed them.

Their bottomland habitat was cut off by rising water, leaving them stranded on about 50 acres, with bobcats and a pack of the rare red wolves as unwelcome neighbors.

The hungry deer have eaten the poison ivy, vines and stripped the leaves from every tree and shrub as high as they can reach.

"I couldn't believe my eyes-- I looked upstream and saw this house floating down. It was the first time I ever lifted the bridge without getting a foot."

Everett Kronable is bridge tender of a highway liftbridge spanning the Illinois River at Hardin, Ill. At the peak of the flood, there was only a 4-foot clearance under the lift span.

"I'm probably the only bridge tender in the country that had to lift one to let a house go through," he says. "The problem was that it had to be guided through, like a barge. We got a couple of boats out there and got it through then moored it. The house had four rooms with an attached sun porch -- is still tied up and unclaimed."

The water still stands a foot or so deep in the Mississippi Delta town of Holly Bluff. The local postmaster, W.C. Sharrow Jr., attends to his rounds by boat, and the local bank is operating under a sign that reads: "Open for business -- Boat or Boot."

Before Kaskaskia Island in Illinois was completely flooded, civil defense officials said 3,000 men and women students from Southern Illinois University volunteered to fill sand bags for the levees.

The dikes eventually failed, but the volunteers left a reminder of their effort.

"We were not prepared for nature's call," says an official. "There were no toilet facilities. Straw was used to build small huts and huts. So, when the water leaves the island and several strange-looking straw things are seen in the open field you'll know they played an emergency part."

Three Office of Emergency Preparedness centers set up in Louisiana to aid flood victims close today.

George Hastings, regional director, says 6,710 families received direct disaster assistance since 25 counties were declared disaster areas.

In addition, emergency housing was provided for 487 displaced families, food stamps worth \$840,000 were issued to 8,400 families, disaster unemployment checks went to 1,782 persons and the Small Business Administration processed 3,200 applications for disaster loans.

The members of six families in Tomato, Ark., (pop. 150) have refused to leave their homes despite being surrounded by floodwaters. One, A.J. "Slick" Mithrison says:

"The only way I will leave here is for the water to get into my damn bed. Even then I'll just take my wife and come back. I love the place. I love to sit in my living room and watch the boats go by. The boats look like small cities floating down the river..."

Bonnie And Clyde Car To Be Auctioned Off

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - A car which cost possibly \$1,000 new, which has earned an estimated \$10 million and still has a possible value of nearly a quarter of a million dollars will go on the auction block in July.

It is the 1934 deluxe Ford in which notorious outlaws Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow were killed at a police ambush near Arcadia, La., May 23, 1934.

The vehicle has been owned since 1952 by Ted Toddy of Atlanta, a former movie producer who said he bought it in connection with a picture he was producing and "found out I had a car that was worth more than the picture."

It will be auctioned at the Bay State Antique Automobile Exposition in Princeton, Mass., July 28.

"It will be put up for auction on the condition that the price is right," Toddy said. "I turned down \$180,000 for it two years ago."

Toddy estimated that the car has earned about \$10 million in fees at exhibits since Bonnie and Clyde were killed in 1934.

The car has been involved in extensive litigation with others exhibiting vehicles billed as "the true Bonnie and Clyde death car."

In a suit in U.S. District Court in Atlanta in 1969, Toddy won a ruling from U.S. District Court Judge Sidney O. Smith Jr. that his is the original Bonnie and Clyde death car.

The judge noted that a 1934 deluxe Ford was purchased March 15, 1934, by Jesse Warren of Topeka, Kan. It was stolen and the following May Bonnie and Clyde were shot to death in a 1934 deluxe Ford with the same serial number -- 64018.

The judge also noted that Toddy's vehicle was identified as genuine by Ted Hinton, a former Dallas, Tex., deputy sheriff and the only surviving member of the group of six officers who fired more than 200 bullets into the car.

The car now rests on a special movable platform and Toddy said it is exactly as it was when he purchased it. "There's never even been a wheel turned," he added, and no part of any kind has been replaced.

He also said a brown stain remains on the upholstery which he said a doctor identified as blood.

Despite several hundred bullet holes, Toddy said the car is in virtually mint condition.

Toddy said he decided to put the car up for auction "because frankly, I'm getting along in years and ready to slow down."

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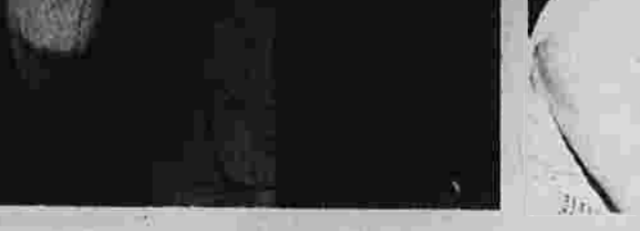

No Place in 500 Race For Loser

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The Indianapolis 500 mile race "tears your belly up, leaves you a basket case," says driver Bobby Unser. "But there is no place in it for a loser."

Unser, 39, starts Monday's 57th running of the \$1 million classic from the No. 2 front row position. He fully expects to go from there to victory lane and earn about \$50,000 in prize money.

Unser, who won this race in 1968 and has since erased just about every speed record in the books, took time out Thursday to evaluate the 33 starters who will line up at noon EDT Monday and run for the biggest pot of gold in motorsport.

He had just posted a practice lap at 128.564 miles per hour in Dan Gurney's Olonite Eagle during "carburetor" testing. It was the last time he and the other drivers will get on the 2.5-mile oval until race day, and his was the fastest speed of the day.

He named 15 other starters he said would have a say in who would be the eventual winner.

Among them he listed four "chargers" he said probably would try to lead the early part of the race.

Referring to Johnny Hutherford, who won the pole position at a record four-lap speed of 128.413 m.p.h., Unser said:

"Johnny likes to go like the wind. I expect him to lead in the second row."

Of Mark Donohue, the 1972 winner who has the other front row position:

"Mark is an extremely cautious driver. But he can go when he wants to, and he's one of the best for picking an opening, or taking advantage of an opportunity."

About Gary Bettenhausen, who occupies the middle of the second row:

"Gary is a good, very sensible race driver. He likes to pick his spots, then take advantage of them."

Of Mario Andretti, the 1969 winner who starts sixth: "There's a race driver for you. He's a real winner. I wouldn't be surprised to see him lead all the way until the first pit stop."

Unser also listed his brother, Al, a two-time winner, as well as Gordon Johncock, Lloyd Ruby, Billy Vukobrat, Jerry Grant, Mike Mosley and Joe Leonard as drivers who should be factors in the race.

Then he said, "And I don't have to direct your attention to the rear of the pack, back there where old A.J. Foyt will be sitting at the start."

Foyt starts 23rd, his poorest in an Indianapolis field since he first arrived at the old brick oval in 1962.

"Old A.J. wants to win his fourth one badly. And what Old A.J. wants, he usually gets," Unser said.

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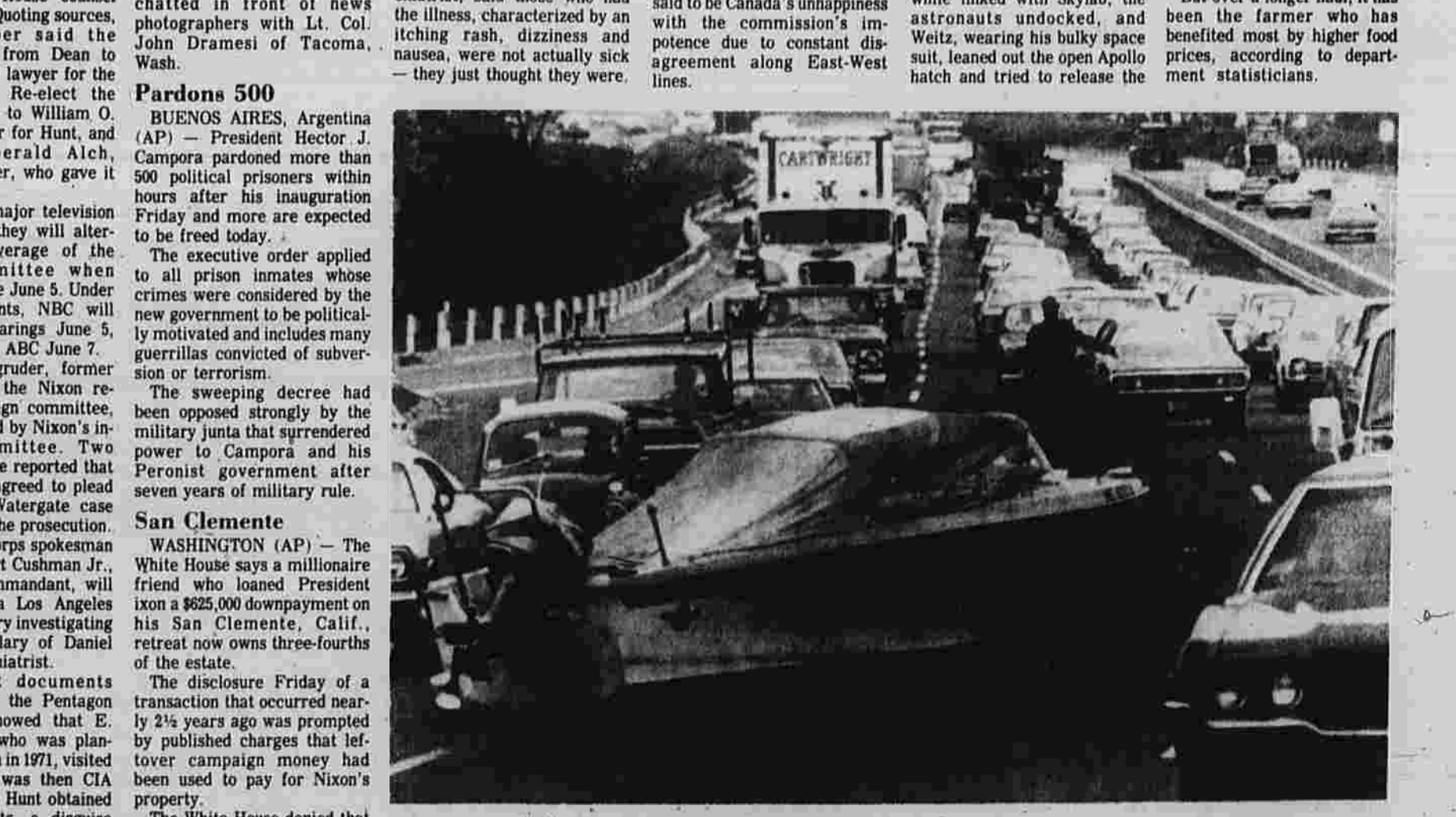
