Midwest, South Hit By Tornadoes

Nixon - Pompidou Talks To Cover Several Topics

PARIS (AP) - President Georges Pompidou will have two major preoccupations when he meets President Nixon in Iceland Thursday and Friday.

He will want "explanations and clarifications" of Washington's European policies, as outlined in Henry A. Kissinger's speech last month calling for a new Atlantic

And he will tell Nixon that Western Europe will find it difficult to accept new rules for world trade in the Nixon-round talks next fall without an assurance that the permanent crisis in the world monetary system can be resolved in the not-to-distant future.

That depends largely on the health of the U.S. dollar, French officials say.

Pompidou in particular will express concern over what Europeans see as an implied threat in Kissinger's belief that transatlantic political, economic and military problems are linked and should

be considered as a whole. French officials stressed. however, that Pompidou would not be acting as a spokesman for Europe. He would be talking

again of the French view that the solution of the world monetary crisis depends largely on the "good will" of the United States. He will restate the view agreed upon at the Common Market summit meeting last October that what is needed is a return to fixed but adjustable parities and general convertibility of currencies above all of the dollar, whose role as a reserve currency must be reduced.

French officials cautioned against any expectation of a solution's emerging from the meeting in Iceland. They hope instead for a "common will" to resolve the crisis based on

Ex-POW Leader May Bring Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pentagon officials expect a former U.S. POW leader to file aiding-the-enemy charges soon, perhaps today, against a small group of soldiers and Marines he commanded in a North Vietnamese prison.

Unless he changes his mind, Air Force Col. Theodore W. Guy's filing of formal charges against seven to 10 Army men and Marines would be the first such action against any of the 566 returned military POWs.

Besides aiding-the-enemy charges, military sources said Guy would accuse the soldiers and Marines of disobedience of orders and disrespect to superior officers.

More than a month ago, the 44-year-old Guy denounced

Seeks Asylum

BONN, Germany (AP) - The West German government today is considering an application for asylum from a young Soviet pilot who parachuted from his plane moments before it crashed.

A spokesman said the government was investigating the motives of Lt. Yevgeny Lvoich, 21, who asked for asylum after his SU7 fighter crashed Sunday about 23 miles inside West Ger-

many near Brunswick. Asylum is granted routinely to run-of-the-mill defectors. But Lvoich is the first Soviet pilot known to have defected since 1967, when the pilot of a MIG17 made a wheels-up landing in a Bavarian meadow and asked for asylum in the United



The Bicycle Boom

Henry Ford, who rode a bicycle he before he put America on automobile wheels, kept his personal bike at his River Rouge estate to ride for fun and exercise - a precept being followed today by a rapidly growing number of adults and children.

More than 14 million bicycles were sold in this country last year, and the Food and Drug Administration says an estimated 40 million are in use. Some bike promotion groups estimate

One thing troubles both the FDA and the bike riders. Riding bikes isn't safe on our streets and highways. Of one million accidents a year, involving the two wheelers, says the FDA, "38,000 involve automobiles and more than 800 result in death." Obviously, a 30 lb. bike isn't going to win a round with a 3,000 lb. automobile. So what can we

The FDA maintains "in many cases the bicycle itself is a major cause of these accidents." So it is rolling out a list of new safety standards which may help but misses the biggest safety move of all - the separation of automobile and bicycle traffic, just as we build sidewalks for pedestrians.
