

He has a point, that's for sure. It's a bit difficult to convince us that the press is doing a greater job than say even in the 1960 campaign when there were a number of "lost and destroyed ballots" in Illinois, Texas and Missouri. At any rate, an office side kick says don't worry about missing television coverage of the Watergate hearings. There will be reruns in 1976 when we elect another presi-

While still on the subject of politics, some inside the Democratic National Committee don't feel that Sen. Ted Kennedy will seek the 1976 nomination of his party. Some Democrats feel, that due to Watergate, the issue in 1976 is going to be morality. They have doubts that Kennedy can run on a morality platform after Chappaquid-

Perhaps of interest locally is that the Pennsylvania Labor Relations Board has ruled that admitting the press to cover negotiations between the teachers union and the school board constitutes an unfair labor practice. The Labor Board says freedom of the press means only to express opinions, not a right to information. The Bethlehem, Pa., School Board says it intends to appeal the finding, including the narrow views of the

The new regulation requiring all food service establishments to be graded "good, fair or poor" for health standards has its good and bad points. True, it perhaps goes a long way toward protecting the

freedom of the press.

On the other hand, we have lived in other states that have a similar regulation and observed certain pitfalls. We have seen conflicts between a restaurant operator and an inspector, where regardless of what the operator did it was seemingly impossible to achieve a high rating. We have also surmised that by greasing the inspector's palm, a restaurant could come in with a high rating. The regulation would go into effect one year after it is published in the Connecticut Law Journal, whenever that

With Watergate, we doubt if Congress will get around to taking a look at the GI Bill of Rights but it should. After World War II, millions of veterans financed their education under the GI Bill. Many, including this writer, couldn't have gone to college or technical school or into apprentice training without it. The bill was a tremendous

Today, considerably less than half of our Vietnam veterans have ever made use of the bill. The big part of the reason seems to be inadequacy of the GI benefits today. The present educational allowance of \$220 a month is too low. It is so low that most veterans cannot afford to use it. Just as the United States took care of its World War II veterans under the GI Bill, so should it take care of its Vietnam veterans under a new GI Bill, which should be better and stronger than the present one.

According to a recent article in Connecticut Education, school officials throughout the state find themselves with a problem that really pains them. The problem is vandalism. The damage that vandals did during the past school year esulted in a dollar loss to Connecticut of nearly \$3 million. Bridgeport led the list in 1971-72 with a total loss of \$887,000 and set fires alone cost \$800,000.

Window breakage cost the state's taxpayers over \$677,-000; burglary and theft cost the schools at least \$328,575. Now a number of districts are installing electronic alarms and a number of other protective measures. The estimates to protect Connecticut schools is nearly \$500,000. The magazine says add that money to the dollar losses sufered from vandalism and theft and you get enough money to build a splendid elementary school for 1,000 kids. 



Q. I work at a department store and I have no plans to retire. My earnings have been averaging about \$3,000 a year. Now that I am 62, can I get any benefits from Social Security? A. You might be eligible for some retirement checks from Social Security. It will depend on the amount of your monthly benefits. Under the present law, you can earn \$2,100 without losing any benefits. You lose one dollar in benefits for each \$2 of earnings over \$2,100. With earnings of \$3,000 you would lose \$450 in Social Security benefits for the year. Contact your Social Security office for

No matter how much you earn before you retire, you can still receive Social Security benefits for any month you neither earn wages of \$175 or less nor perform substantial work as a self employed person Q. I am 63 and have been receiving monthly Social Security benefits of \$387 a month for my wife, and our two children. I have been offered a job which will pay \$6,500 a year. If I take it will I lose all my Social Security benefits? A. No. The 1972 changes in the Social Security law allows you to earn \$2,100 without losing any benefits. Above \$2,100 the low is \$1 in Social Security benefits for each \$2 of earnings If you earn \$6,500 and over \$175 in each month of the year your earnings above \$2,100 would be \$4,400. You would therefore lose \$2,200 in Social Security benefits for the year. The total amount of your Social Security benefits for 12 months is \$3,644. As your loss of benefits are only \$2,200, you would still be en-



BOSTON (AP) - A sevenstory glass-walled pyramid will be the focal point of the \$27 nillion John F. Kennedy Library, according to plans unstreet from the Harvard University dorm where Cennedy lived as a student, will be surrounded on three sides by another long, low structure of brick and concrete When it is finished in 1976, the complex will hold presidential

Kennedy School of Governmodel of the 12-acre complex was attended by the late president's daughter, Caroline, and his brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass. Construction, scheduled to begin next year, has been long delayed by controversy over relocating a subway repair yard

The plan, said Sen. Kennedy captures the magic, beaut and sense of grace that were so much a part of President Kennedy's life." The complex will stand just off Harvard Square, one of Cambridge's main shopping districts, and face the Charles

Kennedy acknowledged growing local concern over traffic and congestion problems anticipated when the library People "have expressed some legitimate concerns," said Kennedy, and the library trustees "continue to work with

them so that we can resolve the concerns in a speedy and satisfactory way."

The library's architect, I.M.
Pei, discounted the traffic problems and said the low structure surrounding the pyramid will blend with the nearby university buildings. Pei called it "a very complex, multipurpose and multifaceted development." He emphasized the open courtyard that will surround the pyramid. Planning for the complex began before Kennedy's assassination, and library spokesmen complain that the delays and rising costs have forced them to scale the buildings to about half its in-




