Rail Roadbeds Sad

So bad is the deterioration of tracks and roadbeds on the nation's railroads that the ride quality of several Amtrak routes has declined to the point where "almost the only people who will ride trains are pass holders. railroad enthusiasts and those with an absolute mental or physical aversion toward air travel."

And presumably one other category - members of the National Association of Railroad Passengers whose chairman, Anthony Haswell, made the above charge at NARP's annual meeting a few weeks ago.

He cited a number of important routes - Chicago-Louisville, Chicago-New Orleans, Chicago-Denver - that are plagued by stretches with "slow orders" limiting trains to speeds of 30 miles an hour or less.

Passenger train schedules over these routes are significantly slower than in years past. In some cases, far

If tracks were in good enough shape that freight trains could move at 60 m.p.h., the association notes, then passenger trains could be operated at 80. This could be increased to 90 or 100 with improved locomotives with a "feather touch" on the track. It is interesting that at a time when

tracks and road-beds are in a sad and worsening state there is growing talk of having the government take over the railroads' rights-of-way (and the responsibility for maintaining them) as a solution to the railroads' troubles that does not go as far as outright

Should this happen, both railroads and erstwhile railroad passengers change: They could both blame Uncle Sam for the bumps.

'Federal Spending Clock'

For the first time in history, the rate the government spends money is being clocked, literally, by a "Federal Spending Clock" located in the national headquarters of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

Every 1.2 seconds a dial indicates the expenditure of another \$10,000, the average annual income of an American family. Every 12.6 seconds a light flashes, indicating the spending of another \$100,000. And every two minutes and six seconds, a "beep" is heard, signaling that the federal

government has just dropped another million smackeroos.

The "beep," incidentally, goes off about 700 times a day. By the end of the current fiscal year, the rapidly changing digital figures on top of the clock will have registered a total of

Point of the Game


The point of the game is to trap the other person's king. You do this by moving your chess pieces in such a way that the king cannot escape being taken. This is called "checkmate." Your opponent, of course, is trying to capture your king at the same time, so you must defend your king against his pieces.

Beginning Hints


You should learn the names of the pieces. Each piece moves differently, so you must learn the directions in which they can go. You should also learn a few good opening moves that will help you control the game. As is true in all games, good sportsmanship is important. Dad might be learning, too, so you might want to get a book for beginners or ask someone who really knows chess to teach you. Some schools offer chess lessons, so maybe you can teach dad what you learn.


Why Play?

A chess board has 64 squares with 32 light and 32 dark squares.





Bobby Fischer: World Chess Champion


On September 1, 1972, Bobby Fischer won the world chess championship by defeating the Russian title-holder, Boris Spassky. The match was not only a victory for the 29-year-old Fischer, but also for the game of chess itself. By making so many demands for more money and better playing conditions and causing so much trouble, both Fischer and the game of chess received worldwide news coverage. Chess fever spread throughout the country.

Bobby Fischer was born in Chicago in 1943. He later moved to Brooklyn. His sister bought him his first chess set when he was six years old. He later began to play with the Brooklyn Chess Club. By the age of 12, he was a member of the Manhattan Chess Club. News reporters called him "The Sweatshirt Kid." At the age of 15 he became the youngest grandmaster in history.

Though he made good grades in school, studying did not interest him and he left high school in his junior year. He is known as a loner and plays chess by himself for hours. He has little personal life, but he does enjoy bowling. Fischer says he would welcome another chance to play Spassky.


