Supeme Court Upholds Saden Remap Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court today upheld the Saden reapportionment plan for the Connecticut legislature by a 6-3 vote, assuring continued Republican control of the current General Assembly.

The plan, which previously had been ruled unconstitutional by a federal district court after a Democratic challenge, was used as the basis for last November's legislative election. The election gave the Republicans control of both branches of the legislature.

If the Supreme Court had found the plan unconstitutional, an emergency legislative election might have been necessary. Legal opinions differed about whether a finding of unconstitutionality would have invalidated the acts of the legislative session that concluded

The plan was developed by a panel of three state Superior Court judges, headed by Judge George A. Saden. It was overturned by a U.S. District Court in March 1972 in a case filed by state Democrats. The lower court said the plan violated the "one-man, one-vote" principle of the U.S. Constitution.

Democrats had claimed that the plan was also politically gerrymandered in favor of the GOP. But the lower court paid more attention to the "one man, one vote" issue than the question of political advantage.

"It is quite possible that if the sole question were political gerrymandering, it would be non-justiciable (outside the court's jurisdiction)," the court said at the time,

Four Men Trapped On Ocean Floor Off Florida Coast

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP)- amassing carbon dioxide. The Navy divers raced against time today to rescue four men, their air supply dwindling rapidly, trapped in a midget submarine 351 feet down in the Atlantic.

At first, Navy officials believed the men, whose research sub was wedged in the wreckage of a World War II destroyer, had enough air to last them until noon, EDT. But later a spokesman said "now, it looks like it may be even shorter than that."

Among those trapped was Clayton Link, son of of the sub's designer, Edwin Link.

Two of the trapped men were in a front compartment of the the sub. The other two were in a rear compartment.

Rescuers were faced with the prospect of having to draw on the vital oxygen supply to increase the temperature in the submarine and enable chemical cannisters to absorb more carbon dioxide

Asked about the buildup of carbon dioxide in the back section of the vessel, a Navy spokesman described it as " baby putting a plastic bag over its head and slowly being strangled."

Shortly after daybreak Cmdr. William Smith said there had been radio contact with two men in the front of the sub and they had reported the men in the rear were still breathing.

Adm. John Maurer, commander of Key West Naval Station, said two teams of divers had been down, one to within 10 feet of the sub. But "neither one was able to completely reach the submarine because of the wreckage involved and they were in danger of entangling themselves.'

The elder Link was helping to direct the rescue attempts 20 miles east of Key West.

Link, who was aboard the Sea Diver, mother ship of the minisub, alerted the Coast Guard to the emergency Sunday

The first attempt to lower an air compression bell chamber with two divers aboard in an effort to free the craft believed trapped in cables dangling from the wreck of the USS Fred T. Berry failed.

It was the first operational test for the bell, an aluminum chamber topped with a plastic bubble designed to give the divers a panoramic view of the situation

The submarine became trapped about 10 a.m. Sunday while it was on a fishing research expedition for the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. The trapped men, in addition to the younger Link, are Archibald "Jock" Menzies of Scotland, the sub's pilot-commander, and Robert Meek, 27, a marine biologist from Santa Barbara, Calif., and Albert Stover, a diver and submarine pilot from West Palm







Tackling Inflation

Presumably there are a number of members of the federal bureaucracy busily engaged in hammering out Phase 4 controls for the American

The question appears moot as to whether the economy should be controlled. The issue facing the Phase 4 planners is one of how this should be

Obviously, from the overall aspects of the current 60-day Phase 3, the desire of the President to move the federal government out of the control picture almost entirely has been thwarted by his political opposition, the complexities of the economy itself, and international considerations.

As hard as it is to accept, the role of government in the economy, not as a regulator or watchdog but a participant, must underly any Phase 4 plan-

It would appear to us that in this context, the President is quite correct in his attempts to bring under control and eventually balance, the federal

This can be accomplished in two ways. The Congress and the Administration can reduce spending to income levels or increase tax revenue to meet appropriations.

The President has indicated he would prefer to avoid the tax increase route. But until Congress indicates a desire to hold down expenditures we fear this is a lost cause and a keystone in Phase 4 may have to be some form

of tax increase affecting all of us. The inflationary pressure of recent months has been the result of increased disposable income for most people in the nation, including Connecticut. The freezing of prices for the next two months will further increase this disposable income.

It is a situation which could lead to black and gray market activities which were experienced in the World War 2 rationing and price-control

The recent trial balloon to increase the federal tax on gasoline indicates a strong opposition to a tax increase in a selective form at least.

It would appear that should a tax become necessary to cool the inflationary heat, the form will be restoration of the federal income tax

So before the year is out, the tax relief we all enjoy from state tax law changes may be canceled out by a

The decision facing the Administration and Congress is not an easy one since 1974 will be an election year. The crux of the issue is whether the people really want to control and end nflation. The irony is that if we are to iltimately free the economy from direct federal controls we, as a people, may have to accept tougher controls and make some substantial

sacrifices in the interim. The days ahead will be a challenge to leadership to rise above slogans, illmade campaign promises, and partisanship.

A sound economy is vital to our state and our nation. Inflation must be curbed to prevent the cruel erosion of the living standards of those on fixed incomes and those earning low in-
