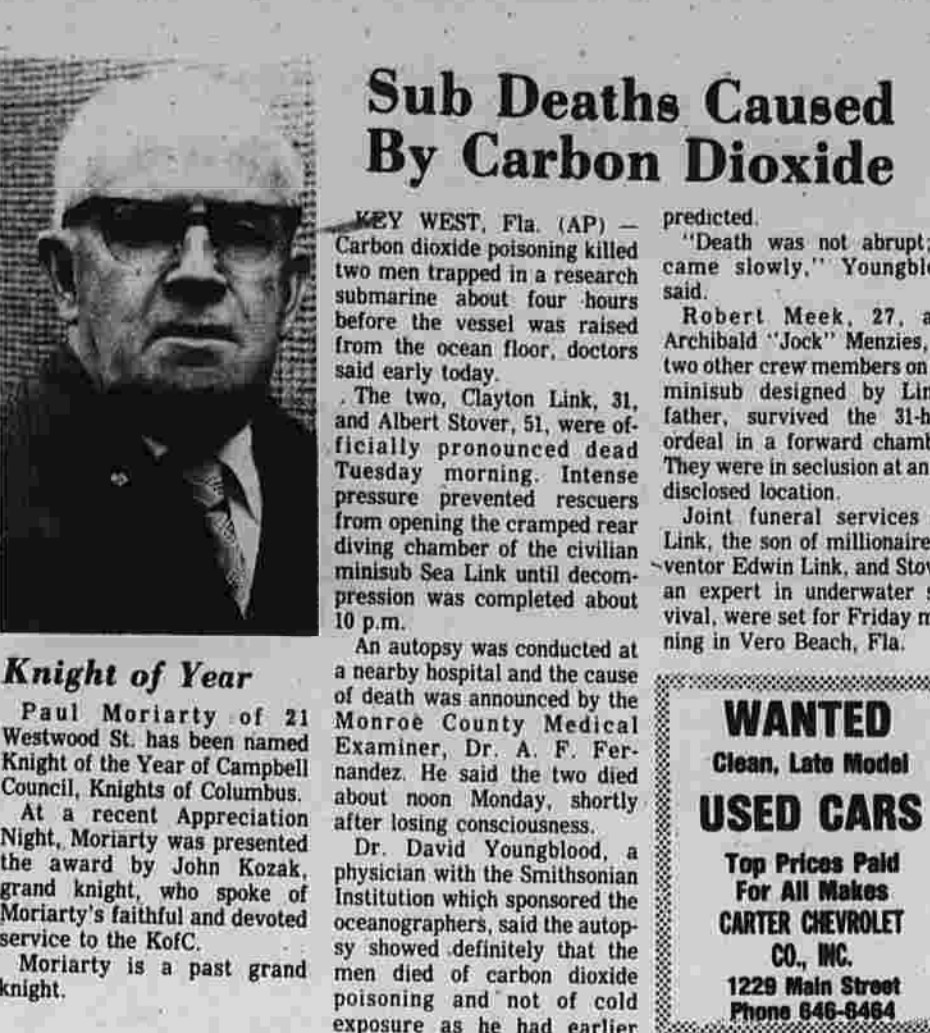

## Guidelines Urged For Institutional Stockholders

NEW YORK (AP) — Almost nobody denies any more that the big institutions have created serious problems for the stock markets. One of them is to secure the wits out of small stockholders and send them scurrying for cover.

Instinct tells the little investor that the risks serious injury participating in the sporting events of the elephant walking first insisting that a spirit of civilized restraint and equality be agreed upon.

So he has been popping up now and then, but only to watch the behemoths—some with assets of a billion dollars or more—knocking prices about like a ball.

There is a lot more to the institutional problem, of course. One particular negative is the tendency of these funds and trusts and insurers to concentrate on certain companies, ignoring the shares of others and leaving them flailing their ability to raise capital.

But any solution must have a beginning, and Paul Kolton, American Stock Exchange president, has been selling congressmen and regulatory officials and institution managers that they must institute rules of civilized competition.

During the past month he has repeatedly urged steps in four areas, avoiding the specifics as not to distract from the principles involved, but insisting that his ideas are not just suggestions but proposals for action.

TRADING: Institutions must develop guidelines for trading, because the demands they make on markets are often greater than the markets can supply.

For example, when an institution has spent months acquiring a large position, it is reasonable to expect the public, the specialists or other block traders to absorb the entire position in a few minutes or hours.

## Witness Admits Perjury

BOSTON (AP) — A defense witness, Alfonso Smith of Springfield, testified Wednesday that he lied under federal grand jury when he implicated Sylvio Grasso of Hartford, Conn., in a narcotics case.

Grasso, a ball bondsman, is charged in U.S. District Court with distributing a quantity of cocaine in Springfield and Bridgeport, Conn., in April, 1972.

Smith, a co-defendant with Grasso and four other men in the case, said he lied to the grand jury because he feared for his life. He said he feared federal narcotics agent John O'Brien would kill him if he did not implicate Grasso.

Grasso is being tried separately from the other defendants.

In his earlier testimony for the prosecution, O'Brien said he had acted as an undercover agent and made eight transactions involving cocaine and heroin with Grasso or five other men between December, 1971, and April, 1972, mostly in the Springfield area.

### ICC Judge Rejects Line Abandonment

HARTFORD (AP) - An Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) administrative law judge has recommended rejection of Penn Central's proposal to abandon a 14.7 mile freight line between Simsbury, Conn., and Westfield, Mass. James F. Shugre, deputy state transportation commissioner, said Wednesday that the recommendation now goes to the full ICC for consideration. Gov. Thomas J. Meskill has urged that the abandonment application be denied. Judge James Anton, in his report to the ICC, said the area served by the freight line is "unquestionably growing and abandonment would affect the industrial growth of these communities." The judge also said there could be an adverse environmental impact if the abandonment of the rail line. He said abandonment would result in increased motor vehicle traffic on already congested highways in the area to fill the void created by the loss of rail freight service. It was not known how soon the ICC would act on Judge Anton's report.

### Chancellor Given Pay Raise

HARTFORD (AP) - The Commission on Higher Education has voted a \$3,200 pay raise for Chancellor Warren G. Hill, giving him one of the highest salary classifications in state government. The new pay raise takes effect Friday, boosting Hill's annual salary from \$30,500 to \$33,700. The commission's action June 5 during a closed-door meeting was disclosed through release of a letter from commission director W. Robert Bokelman to state Personnel Commissioner Edward H. Simpson. Hill, a member of the Personnel Policy Board, had proposed pay raises earlier this year for all state commissioners and their deputies. The pay hikes were approved. However, rank-and-file state workers were denied an across-the-board pay raise in favor of a \$200 "surplus-sharing bonus" proposed by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill. At his new salary level, Hill will be making \$7,000 more a year than Meskill, \$5,670 more than state Supreme Court chief Justice Charles Hise and \$100 more than Glenn W. Ferguson, the newly appointed president of the University of Connecticut. The only men in state service paid more than Hill are several department heads at the UConn Health Center in Farmington.

### Highway Vigilance Urged

HARTFORD (AP) - Motorcyclists and motor vehicle operators were urged again today to "be more vigilant" in light of the increased number of motorcycle accident deaths this year. Twenty-six cyclists have died in Connecticut so far this year compared to 34 during 1972, State Police Commissioner Cleveland E. Fussenich said. Motorcycling is "a sport enjoyed by many but it can be extremely dangerous if due caution is not constantly exercised," he said. He reiterated a plea issued earlier this year for motorcyclists to keep their cycle headlights on even during daylight hours "to be better seen." Cyclists should wear multi-colored protective clothing and helmets and should practice defensive driving, Fussenich said. He also urged motor vehicle operators to use extra caution because "even a small driving error can cause injury" when a motorcycle is involved.

## Brezhnev 'Best Politician' says Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP) - "He is the best politician in the room," said an expert, Richard Milhouse Nixon, in a room full of the species. "But I am not dangerous," said Leonid Ilyich Brezhnev to assembled members of the capital Congress. What Brezhnev may have meant by "dangerous," in a town where definitions lately have been blurred, was lost in the banter Tuesday at the signing of four new Russo-American agreements in the Benjamin Franklin Room of the State Department.

What was increasingly clear, after two days of summitry, was that the leader of Soviet Russia has impressed Washington as a man of skill, force, confidence, warmth, humor, ham and tempered spontaneity. A kind of housebroken Nikita Khrushchev. Unlike his predecessor, who brought a new level of show biz to summitry in 1959, Brezhnev is not likely to pound the table with his shoe or stamp the floor petulantly if he can't go to Disneyland. But he does have his moments of whimsy. One such produced the President's review of the Russian's political talent. The treaties had just been signed and the champagne poured when Brezhnev reached for a napkin that wasn't there, spilled his champagne, and finally, to applause and laughter, pretended to hide behind a napkin while he drank and the cameras rolled.

Brezhnev and the President sat side by side during the ceremony and, curiously, it was the visitor who appeared more relaxed than the host. Students of both agreed the difference was probably more a matter of personality than recent events. "If the senators won't come to me, I'll come to them," Brezhnev said, quickly joining the legislators in a cluster of toasts and small talk. For a moment, the President appeared alone, outside the circle, looking for a way in. Later, the summit was delayed 40 minutes while the Russian leader took a three and a half hour lunch at Blair House with members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He delivered a low-key speech for an hour and a half and fielded questions in a soft, almost cooing voice. "You got the impression he is determined not to come across like Khrushchev," said Sen. Vance Hartke, D-Ind. "He walks a fine line between his natural spontaneity and sense of propriety. You got the feeling he'd much rather be uninhibited and not have to worry about each word being measured." Where Khrushchev might have blown his stack, Brezhnev fielded the sensitive question of Jewish migration from Russia with quiet patience.

Neighbor's Kitchen By Vivian F. Ferguson. From Your...

Now and then, you may hear someone refer to blueberries as huckleberries. The huckleberry, the blueberry, the bilberry and the cranberry are a large family of edible berries, all closely related.

The designation "blueberry" is a New England designation. Actually, the blueberry and the huckleberry are interchangeable. There are many varieties of both. If one wishes to be technical, only the huckleberries of a bluish color should be called blueberries.

While researching old recipes for the Manchester Sesqui-centennial Program, I found several on blueberries. Muffins and pie are all-time favorites. There is also a recipe for upside-down cake, blueberry bread-and-butter pudding and of course, blueberry slump and blueberry grunt.

Democrats Reach, Lose Quorum

Manchester Democrats, who have been unable to come up with a quorum at recent town committee meetings, finally made it Wednesday night — on the third try.

And even then they had to adjourn when only part-way into the business of the meeting — discussion and action concerning proposed rules changes.

The paper-thin quorum of 37 (the minimum acceptable under present rules) was shattered when two persons left at about 10:20 p.m. The meeting started late — at about 9:45.

As a consequence, the committee will meet again July 9 at 7:30 p.m. — to continue studying, discussing and acting on the proposed rules changes.

Its first order of business July 9 may be action on a rules change to reduce the number needed for a quorum.

Rules changes by town committees become effective 60 days after they are filed with the secretary of the state. A rules change regarding quorums, even if approved until July, would not be in effect until September.

Because caucuses for Democratic Town Committee members will be held in Manchester near March 15, any rules changes which concern those caucuses must be filed with the secretary of the state by Jan. 15.

And because endorsement for local offices will take place in August, and because September, October and part of November will be allocated to the campaign and election, the town committee doesn't have as much time as originally estimated for discussing and adopting rules changes.

The major proposals concern the number of town committee members and the formula for choosing them. Present rules state that the members shall be chosen from seven voting districts, on the basis of 1 to each 140 registered Democrats or fraction thereof in the district.

Summer Comes, Sun Faithful

Summer officially arrived in the northern hemisphere at 8:31 a.m. in each time zone today and there were no signs of an energy shortage from the sun.

At this time of the season, the days are the longest of the year and the nights the shortest — and that means the northern hemisphere is receiving more energy from the sun.

Southern California didn't have to be told summer had come. It is locked in the nation's biggest heat wave. For the third straight day the mercury sizzled to 106 in Los Angeles Wednesday.

There may be an energy shortage but not as far as the sun's rays are concerned today, said Jim Seever, assistant astronomer at the Adler Planetarium in Chicago. "The rays are striking the northern hemisphere more vertically now and delivering more solar energy per square foot."

The seasons are determined by the position of the earth in its yearly path around the sun. Earthlings do not feel the earth's orbital speed of about 18 1/2 miles-a-second, but they do notice the sun apparently changing its position in the sky from season to season.

Technically, this means that at the summer solstice the noon sun reaches an altitude of about 72 degrees above the southern horizon.

By comparison, at the winter solstice—Dec. 21—the sun peaks only 24 degrees over the horizon—and that is when persons shoveling snow realize the sun's energy shortage.

UNKNOWN SOLDIER BRIGHTON, Mass. (AP) — A living "unknown soldier" has lived at the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital here for 28 months, his true identity unknown.

Charles A. Jameson, unverifiedly registered — arrived at the marine facility in an ambulance on Oct. 10, 1945. He was unconscious and near death. When he finally spoke, he didn't know who he was or where he had come from.

The only thing found in the seaman's possession was a piece of paper, on which had been scribbled: "Charles A. Jameson, 49; religion — Catholic; citizenship — American," and after that the name of a ship, the USS Stark. All efforts to get further information have failed.

Shrapnel wounds and a severe bone disease have left him paralyzed from the waist down. Today he speaks infrequently, usually simply nodding his head, and saying, "Yeah," to any question put to him. He speaks with a distinct British accent.

Colonial Crafts Show Sunday at Homestead

Visitors to the Cheney Homestead during the Open House on Sunday, from 1 to 5 p.m., will have an opportunity to watch eight local craftsmen at work and to talk with them about their methods, materials and products.

A "Colonial Crafts Show" will be a special feature of the Open House, which is being held by the Manchester Historical Society as a part of its contribution toward celebration of Sesquicentennial Week.

The show will be held in a spacious tent pitched on the lawn adjacent to the Homestead, and will be included in the Homestead tour without additional charge. However, it will take place on Sunday only, although the Homestead will be open every afternoon during Sesquicentennial Week.

Prominent among the displays will be that of Mrs. Raymond Woodbridge of Manchester, who will demonstrate the weaving of a colonial-style coverlet on a four-foot floor loom. She learned her craft, which she has been following for 35 years, from Margaret Oberberg of Colchester, a weaver whose work has been displayed at the Smithsonian Institution.

Beside the work in progress Mrs. Woodbridge will display many examples of handwoven textiles, including a sheet and pillowcase from the Watkins family.

Mr. Jan McCulloch of Willington will demonstrate her skill at painting on tin and wood. Working with acrylic paints, she specializes in decorative scenes of old New England houses and typical country vistas.

Peter Aucoin of Manchester will be working at a potter's kick-wheel, and will have many products of his skill on display. Currently a student of Wesleyan Pottery, Aucoin will be assisted on Sunday by John Hull, who holds a master of fine arts degree from the University of Hartford.

Rudolph Swanson of Manchester learned his particular skill from another Manchester man, Robert Gordon Sr., who will be showing how to cut a chair seat, and will have finished work on hand as well to illustrate variations in technique.

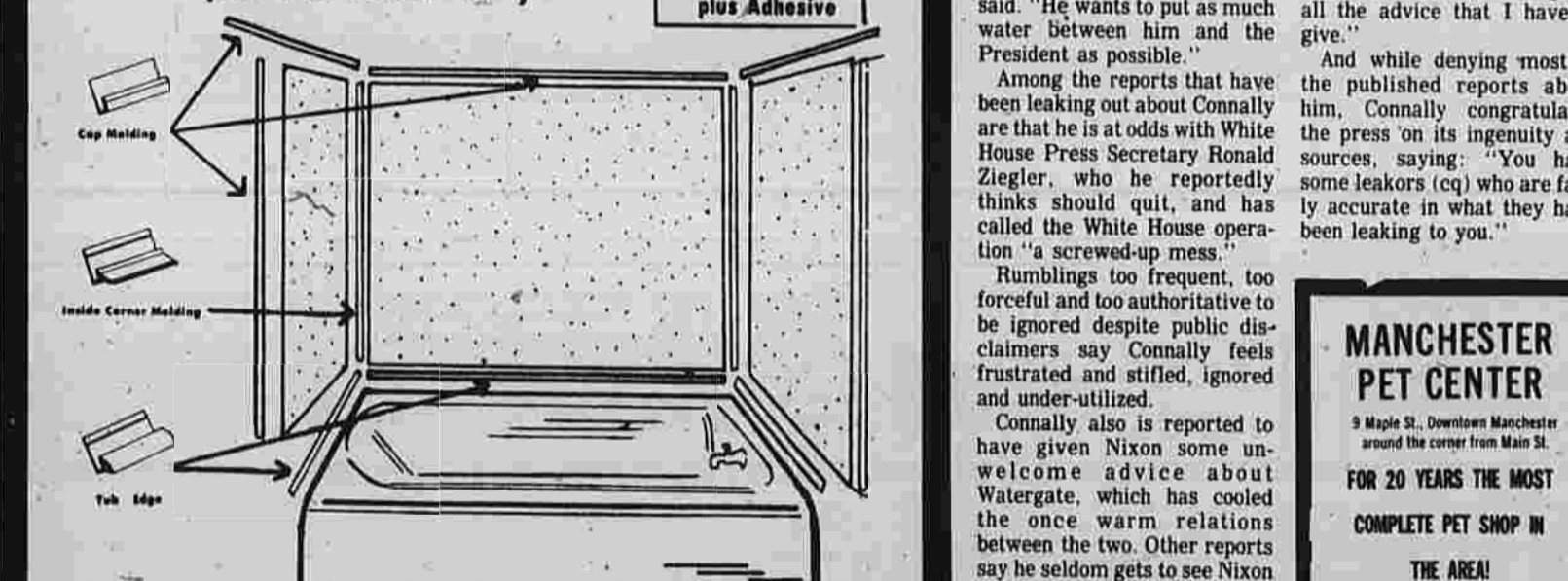

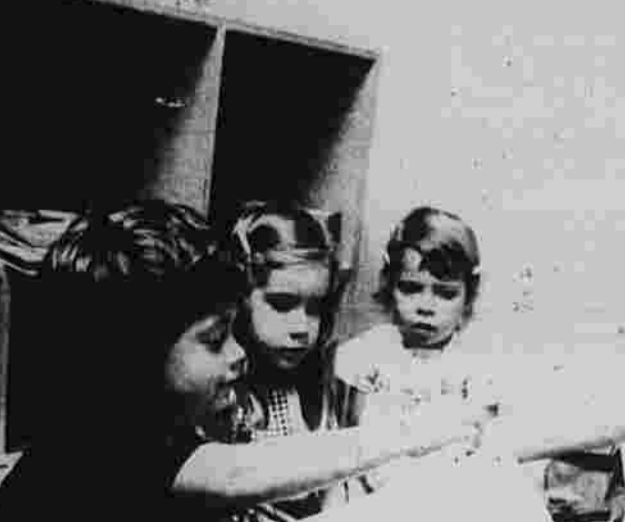

A skeleton of an idea developed into something more substantial for fourth graders at the Avery St. School in South Windsor. Using tissue paper and straws, students in Donald Morissette's class constructed models of a glider.

The most realistic one chosen was reproduced by the twenty-four students on a larger scale with sheet plastic and bamboo, two lightweight materials enabling a glider to remain airborne.

Following several aerodynamic attempts to sacrifice speed for height, the students managed to launch the structure by using just enough pull on the ropes. Finally, the low-flying glider spliced through an overcast sky to remain in the air for several minutes.

The structure is composed of a fuselage, wing and tail which can be taken apart for storage and traveling.

The success of the flights apparently can be measured not only by the sight of the soaring glider but also by the equally soaring spirits of the young pilots when they see their project take flight.

**Rye-Oyster Bay Bridge Plan Abandoned**

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller announced Wednesday he has dropped his plan to build a bridge over Long Island Sound between Rye and Oyster Bay. Rockefeller, a likely candidate for a fifth term next year, had pushed the \$300 million bridge project in the face of near-unanimous rejection by the state legislature.

Two county boards of legislators, environmentalists and even the federal government.

This has not been an easy decision, the Republican governor said. "There are strong arguments for the bridge, and I have vigorously supported this proposal."

"It is part of a long-standing plan to link Long Island to the mainland and to enhance the role of the island in the commerce and industry of the state."

"However, in recent years the people of our state and the country have gradually come to adopt new values in relation to our environment and evidenced a willingness to forego certain economic advantages to achieve those values."

The Rye-Oyster Bay Bridge has become a lightning rod in this period of evolution.

David Sive, chairman of the Environmental Planning Lobby, said environmentalists greeted Rockefeller's announcement "with unabating enthusiasm."

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**Teacher Evaluation Under Study**

The administration of Rham High School has presented to the Board of Education for its consideration copies of proposed procedures for teacher evaluations, proposed job descriptions for departmental coordinators, and maintenance and custodial personnel and job descriptions.

Teacher evaluation procedures, which were completed with the participation of school administrators, departmental coordinators and the teachers, will be brought before the board's next meeting for approval. A board policy will also be written on the subject.

Job descriptions for departmental coordinators also will be considered at the next meeting.

The job descriptions for maintenance and custodial positions were presented for review by the board. For these positions, the administration has developed a job description for the head maintenance man identifying major areas of function and responsibility and a job description for the chief custodian.

Grant

The board approved action by the administration to apply for a grant from the state for a career guidance specialist.

According to Dr. Richard Zanini, assistant superintendent, funds have been made available for the creation of positions of career educational specialists and career guidance specialists.

Dr. Zanini explained that the position of educational specialist is mostly at the elementary level, whereas the career specialist would assist with careers outside the high school, follow up with graduates, and have contact with outside agencies as well as identifying youngsters and designing programs for them.

The amount of the grant applied for is \$22,500 over a period of three years with the board having to commit \$2,500 each year.
