



Why Not Serve Up a Good Game: Play Tennis



The forehand - notice the grip and the position of the feet.



The backhand — again, notice the grip and feet position.

Tennis is becoming more popular every year. By the end of the 1960's, the ten million tennis players in this country outnumbered the golfers by a million.

Here are some pointers for beginners:

1. Be alert and ready for shots. Keep your eye on the ball. Keep your knees bent and lean forward a little, so your weight is on the balls of your feet.

2. As soon as you see in what direction the ball is coming, swing the racket back, keeping the face perpendicular to the ground.

3. Step into the direction you wish to hit the ball.

4. For the forehand, contact the ball beside the forward foot with the racket perpendicular to the ground.

5. For the backhand, contact the ball in front of the forward foot with the racket perpendicular to the ground.

6. Carry the ball on the racket face as long as possible toward the target.

7. Follow through high with an upward and outward movement still keeping the racket face perpendicular to the ground.

The Grip


There are three types of grips commonly used. They are the western, eastern and continental. The most common are the eastern forehand and backhand.


For the forehand grip, you simply shake hands with the handle held in a perpendicular position. For the backhand, you turn your thumb slightly under the racket for about one eighth of a turn to the right.

The ready position keep your eye on the ball, knees bent and lean forward on the balls of your feet.
