Shortly before the Watergate revelations cast doubt on whether he would serve out his constitutionally and electorally alloted "four more years," President Nixon suggested to Congress that it might favorably consider an amendment limiting future presidents to a single term of six There is at least one group still ac-

tively campaigning for repeal of the 22nd Amendment, which limits a president of two four-year terms (or years of the term of some other person who had been elected president). It has been charged that the 22nd Amendment was passed by a Republican Congress in 1947 as a sort of postmortem revenge on Franklin

D. Roosevelt, the only man to have

been elected president more than

In the light of history since then, it may not be unreasonable to suggest that FDR's successors, both Democratic and Republican, as well as the nation itself, might have been better served had Congress seen fit to limit each president to just one tour of duty - either the four years to which he was elected in his own right or, if he succeeded from the vicepresidency, to the remaining term of

his predecessor. With the exception of John F. Kennedy, who did not live to run for re-election, every president since FDR scored his greatest successes in his first term, whether it was of shorter or longer length, only to see his second term blighted in one way or

First was Harry S. Truman, who between 1945 and 1948 presided over the conclusion of World War II, the rebuilding of Europe through the Communist takeover in Greece. Then explosion of an atom bomb, influence peddling scandals in Washington and allegations of high-level treason, the dismal war in Korea and its accompanying inflation.

The second term of the immensely popular Dwight D. Eisenhower was pretty much four blah years, and when he retired to make way for his successor, it was after a campaign in which the Democrats hammered on the theme that the country had fallen ehind in everything from missles to space exploration to education to racial progress to economic growth. Both Lyndon B. Johnson and Richard M. Nixon achieved historic accomplishments in their early presidential years, the one on the mestic front, the other in international affairs. The woes that later befell both are too fresh in memory to

The really interesting thing is that Truman, Eisenhower, Johnson and Nixon were all either elected or reelected by impressive margins and toral victories, the more precipitious their subsequent fall from popularity

to get married. This contract becomes null and void immediately if a woman teacher "All school employes are not to leave town at any time without the permission of the chairman of the school board.

"(The teacher) agrees not to smoke cigarettes. "This contract becomes null and void immediately if the employe is found drinking alcoholic beverages. "Women teachers are to dress and conduct themselves in a puritanical manner as follows: not to dress in bright colors; not to dye her hair; to wear at least two petticoats; not to wear dresses more than

two inches above the ankle; not

to use face powder, mascara or paint the lips. "Men teachers may take one evening a week for courting purposes, providing they attend church regularly or teach a Sunday school class. "(The teacher agrees) t keep the classroom clean, to sweep the classroom floor a least once daily, to scrub the classroom floor once a week with hot water and soap, to clean the blackboards at least once daily and to start the fire at 7 a.m. so the room will be warm at 8 a.m. when the patrons arrive; to carry out the ashes at least once daily and

Gypsy Moths

NEW HAVEN (AP) — Scientists are trying to duplicate nature to confuse the mating instincts of the gypsy moth, the leaf-eating bug that defoliated thousands of acres of the Northeast last year.

Drs. Charles Doan and Ring Carde will conduct a test using a deriviative of an artificial chemical similar to the natural one the female moth emits to attract the male for mating.

But the researchers will be using a chemical that inhibits, rather than stimulates, the mating instinct of male moths.

Doane and Carde will conduct a large test of the inhibitor this month to see if mating is efectively blocked.







Red Sox Getting Pitching

NEW YORK - "There's nothing wrong with our pitching, it's our hitting that hasn't been holding up," Manager Eddie Kasko of the Boston Red Sox said before Wednesday's second game of the five-game set against

"Our pitching has been good. I don't know where all those stories originate from that say our pitching hasn't been good. Our pitching and Orlando (Cepeda) have been holding us together. That Cepeda has really been amazing. I don't know where we would be without him."

The big Cuban refugee from the National League, Boston's No. 1 designated hitter, has personally accounted for the winning run in 10 of Boston's first 73 games this

Kasko got excellent pitching Tuesday from Marty Pat-tin, despite a 3-1 defeat. He made just one bad pitch, Ron Blomberg depositing the ball over 400-feet into the upper rightfield deck with two mates on base. He allowed just three other harmless singles. In the series opener Monday night, John Curtis was

brilliant in hurling a 1-0 shutout. Pitching was the key again yesterday as first Ray Culp, with ninth inning help from Bob Veale, and Rogelio Moret stopped the Yanks in two great efforts by 2-1 and 1-0

The pitching did the job, more than the hitting, just as Kasko said, as the Red Sox cut the Yankees' first place margin in the American League East to just two games. Following Tuesday's Yankee success, it gave the club a 4½ bulge, the biggest lead in 10 years, or the last time a New York club went on to win a championship.

### Trail By Four Games

Going into today's series finale, Boston is just four games behind the Yankees and only one game in the lost column, New York having played six more games.

"Last year we were 61/2 games behind in mid-August," Kasko added. "I feel that we have an excellent chance to win. It's going to be a five-team race right down to the final week. I don't think any one of the five teams is stronger than the other. Milwaukee and New York each enjoyed a big winning streak. I just hope that we can do the

"I'm not worried about pitching. It's as good as any in our league. I just hope some of our guys will start hitting. A few more base hits and we'd be right at the top." Beating the Yankees in three of the first four games at the stadium is no easy trick. After all the Yankees had a 13 for 14 streak going at home before the Boston visit. Boston apparently has the number of the pin-stripes this


