GAO Pegs High Prices To Wheat Exports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Last year's massive sale of U.S. wheat to the Soviet Union nearly doubled the domestic price of the grain and caused U.S. food prices to rise, according to a report to Congress.

The General Accounting Office (GAO) said Monday the wheat sale increased prices for bread and other flour-based products, and beef, pork, poultry, eggs and dairy products, because it caused higher feed grain costs.

"Congress should consider requiring that agencies develop definitive ground rules so that expected benefits from exports can be appropriately weighed against their impact on various segments of the domestic economy," the GAO report said.

The domestic wheat price jumped from about \$1.88 a bushel in July 1972 to \$3.14 in May 1973 because of the \$700-million Russian sale, the GAO said. The sale also severely disrupted transportation facilities, creating higher costs, shortages and delays.

### Shell Pushing Plans For Oil Refinery

NEW HAVEN (AP) — A Shell Oil Co. executive said Tuesday that Shell was stepping up plans for major expansions and the construction of a new east coast refinery. Herbert H. Hewitt, Hartford district marketing manager, told the New Haven Rotary Club that the East Coast is the logical place for new refinery construction. "The East Coast consumes about 40 per cent of all U.S. petroleum products, yet its refineries represent only 12 per cent of the total domestic capacity," Hewitt said. He said that the U.S. will need an additional 10.5 million barrels per day refinery capacity by 1985, and that 40 per cent of the capacity will have to come from new refineries. "Everybody wants the products of a refinery, but nobody wants the refinery itself. Even today, despite the energy problem, there is not a single refinery under construction," he said.

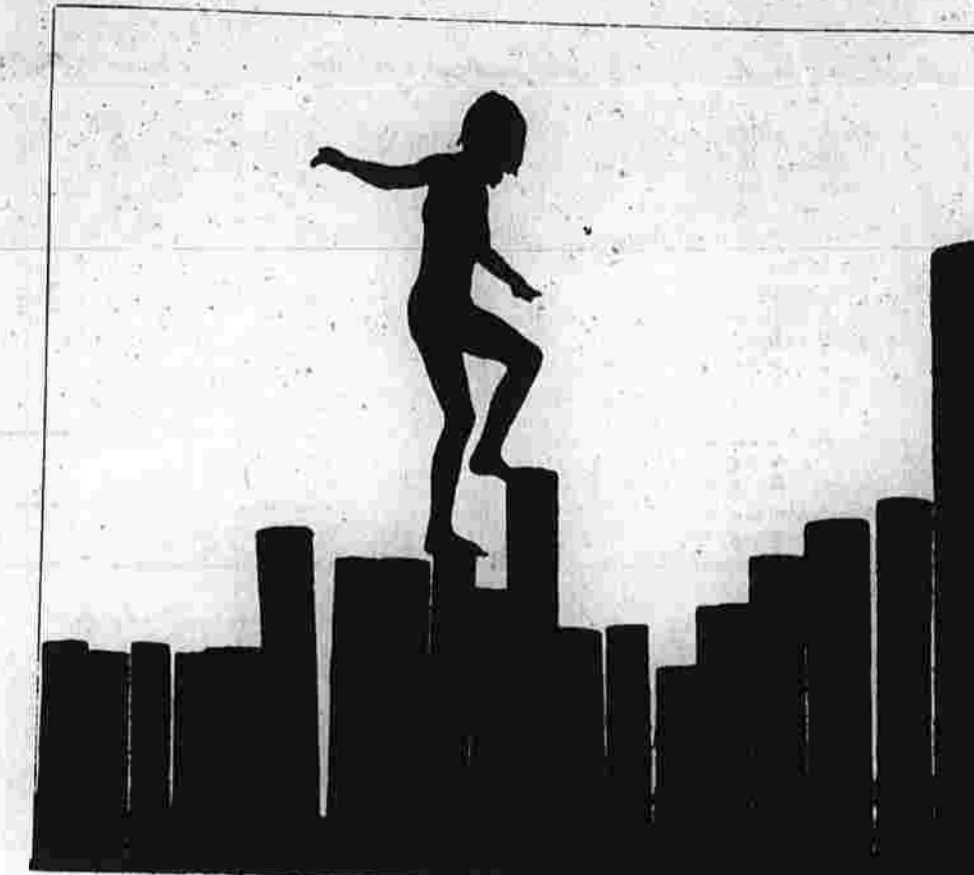

### Today's Peace Corps Stresses The Practical

By JOHN LENGEL Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — At \$75 a month, the pay is no different than during the Kennedy Administration when the Peace Corps began, but today's volunteers are expected to have practical skills along with idealism. Today's corps of 6,800, half the mid-sixties strength, includes everything from agronomists to zoologists in some 60 countries. Less than a third are liberal arts graduates. Four-hundred volunteers are 55 or older. And, if a volunteer does not have a needed skill, he is taught one, in addition to the language and customs of his prospective host country. Niason Davis, the corps spokesman, says the emphasis in today's corps is on filling the specific volunteer requirements set by a country, rather than the 1960s approach of suggesting what expertise a country may need. In this way, the corps met Ecuador's request for zoologists to find ways to protect the Galapagos Islands' turtles. And Costa Rica got a

State Health Department Issues Report HARTFORD (AP) — The state Health Department said Tuesday that a Stamford woman had contracted a case of amebiasis, a disease of the large intestine. Officials said it was the 19th reported case in Connecticut this year, five more than for the same period last year. Amebiasis, or amebic dysentery, is an intestinal infection caused by amebic organisms that enter the digestive system in contaminated food or water. The disease may be present in a person for long periods with little apparent damage, officials said. Most cases of amebiasis are found in tropical countries. Officials said that for the week ending last Saturday there were 18 new cases of syphilis, compared with 16 the week before. Acute gonorrhea cases dropped to 142 from 170; measles fell to 21 compared to 42 for the previous week; and viral hepatitis cases rose to 21 from 17.

## An AP News Analysis Heath Faces Sticky Summer

GAVSHON Associated Press Writer LONDON (AP) — A sinking pound, runaway prices, threats of industrial strife and scandal in public life are giving Edward Heath his stickiest summer in three years as Britain's prime minister. The British leader, 57 on Monday, is doing his best to play it cool. With a majority of 26 in the 50-member House of Commons and two years to go before he has to call an election, he is not likely to be driven from office. But the morale of his followers is sagging, and newspapers that usually support the Tories are accusing the government of inactivity. Heath was elected in 1970 on a promise to bring down prices "at a stroke." As things have turned out, prices have climbed 2 1/4 per cent since then, inflation is running at nearly 10 per cent a year and the value of the pound in terms of other major currencies has declined 18 per cent since the Smithsonian Agreement of December 1971. Health blames rocketing food prices on world shortages. Maverick Tory Enoch Powell says they are due to a government policy of over spending and over inflating. The Laborites attribute them to Britain's joining the European Common Market, which has led to policy favoring the French and West German farmers, and to government mismanagement. Health's aides offer several reasons for his government's failure so far to check inflation and strengthen the slowly sinking pound. One is a spillover from Washington is preventing President Nixon from dealing effectively with the dollar's troubles and from providing the political and financial leadership the world so badly needs from its most powerful nation, they say. The fate of the pound is bound up with that of the dollar, they argue. If the dollar were to perk up, the pound also would strengthen. But the state of the pound and rocketing prices are only part of Heath's problem. Powerful union leaders have warned of a fight to the finish if, in Phase 2 of the government's incomes and prices policy, Heath does anything more to help the lower paid and to stabilize things. Those threats have further shaken an already weak stock market. There also have been disclosures suggesting corruption and worse in some of Britain's city administrations. Britons' confidence in some of their political and business leaders already has been shaken by other developments in recent months. These things have contributed to the buildup of a climate of mistrust, cynicism and disenchantment with Britain's leaders that could have devastating consequences.

## Archeologists Explore Gay City

Buttons and bones, hooks and eyes, Pitkin glass, fabrics, nails, clay pipes and even a pair of old spectacles are few of the items a group of archeologists and students from Eastern Connecticut State College have uncovered among the deserted ruins of three buildings in Gay City State Park, Hebron.

Representatives from Sturbridge Village have visited the site to try to get some ideas for a mill village that is planned for Sturbridge.

The group is working on only three of the buildings now—the woolen mill, a private house and stables.

The back wall of the mill still stands, revealing where the canal came in to turn the water wheel and work the machinery, and then proceeded out through the front of the mill.

Each area is marked off in eight-foot squares using the remaining stone foundations as dimensions. Some of these stones weigh at least one ton and it is presumed they were moved by ox-drawn sleds.

Work at the mill area, although only having progressed about two inches below the present ground level, has already revealed evidence of burnt soil verifying that the mill did burn.

The upper section of the area above the water wheel and where the machinery was housed was reached by an old road, still recognizable, leading to the entrance of the mill. According to Mrs. Meek, this was used as "dump area."

However, the archeologists have found dozens of scraps of cloth, including netting and veiling, hooks and eyes, buckles, food bones, and buttons of glass, wood and metal bearing marks from London, Paris and Calcutta. Mrs. Meek assumes that perhaps a tailor worked in this area.

**Career Switch Is Profitable**

**NEW YORK (AP)** - For author Robert Kimmel Smith, 39, is a lucky number.

Smith, a related, talkative, 42-year-old, recalls that despite a successful career in advertising he decided the year he turned 39. "This is it. I've got to see if I can sit at a typewriter and create something from my own thoughts."

Getting out of the ad agency that he operated with a couple of other men, Smith says, "I decided to take a year and see if I could write. I had a wife and two children, but I also had a little money set aside and I'd go back to do work if I had to."

Eleven months later, Smith had finished and sold his first novel, a suspense story called "Ransom." The blackbearded, middle-aged writer says, "The book sold okay and with the money I got from it I kept on going, kept on writing."

Smith wrote a children's book next - "I didn't make much money" - then turned to another suspense novel, going so far as to research and plot before deciding "I didn't want to write about the dark side of human beings, I'm an outgoing, happy person."

An aunt who liked to knit gave him the idea for his next and latest novel, "Sadie Shapiro's Knitting Book." Smith describes the oddly-titled book as "an offbeat novel about a 72-year-old woman who isn't sure she is the world's greatest knitter and the world's slowest jogger."

"After having her knitting patterns published, Sadie gets on a TV talk show and is an absolute smash. She's in such great demand that she becomes the world's first knitting superstar."

Smith, who spent about eight months writing "Sadie," says the book is selling well enough to go on writing.

# Time Schedule Projected For Highway Improvements

The consulting firm retained by the Town of Manchester for designing two highway-improvement projects estimates construction will begin near June 1 of next year. In addition, it estimates that the cost, originally placed at about \$200,000, actually will approach \$1 million.

Grissold & Fuss, in a progress letter to Town Manager Robert Weiss and signed by Walter Fuss, projects the following time schedule for plans for improving W. Middle Tpke., from Green Manor Blvd. at Manchester Parkade to New State St., and Adams St., from Center St. to the bridge over the Hockanum River, north of Hilliard St.

Oct. 1, 1973 for town and state approval of surveys and preliminary engineering.

Nov. 28, 1973 for town and state approval of the preliminary design.

Feb. 24, 1974 for completion of the final design.

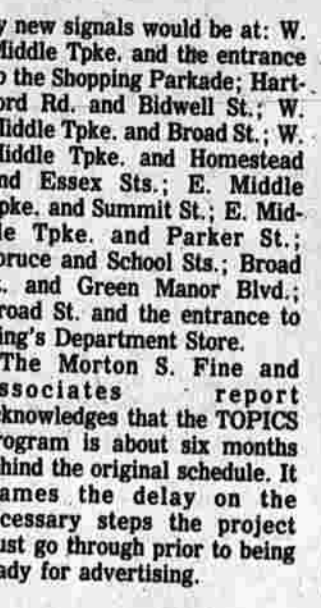
June 1, 1974 for processing of the final plans, bid advertisements and award of a contract.

The projects, under the Urban Systems Program, would be financed by 75 per cent federal and state funds and 25 per cent town funds. The \$1 million estimated cost would include engineering and construction costs, plus right-of-way acquisition, if required.

Morton S. Fine and Associates of Bloomfield, consultants under the associated TOPICS Program, which consists of roadway improvements and channelization at four intersections and signal-light improvements and installations at nine locations, estimates bid awards for October 1973 and work completion in April or May of 1974. These projects also would be financed by 75 per cent federal and state funds and 25 per cent town funds. A preliminary estimated cost of the TOPICS Program is placed at \$145,000.

The program calls for state approval of the preliminary design and channelization at W. Middle Tpke. and the entrance to the Shopping Parkade; Woodbridge and Mather Sts.; Parker and Woodbridge Sts.; Hartford Rd. and Bidwell St.

# Mitchell Defends President's Action

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — John N. Mitchell said today President Nixon has been "lowering the boom" on Watergate participants since April, doing exactly what he should have done.

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, said he didn't see much evidence the boom had been lowered on anyone except fired White House counsel John W. Dean III.

Mitchell had testified earlier that he sought to shield Nixon from word of Watergate involvement and other matters, but he had done nothing to take strong action and damage his own re-election campaign.

Inouye asked what strong ac-

tion Nixon took after he did find out. "I think he has done so by the appointment of a special prosecutor, removing the people from the White House that were involved in the activities," Mitchell said.

Inouye said that except in the case of Dean, fired on April 30, Nixon did not appear to have reacted strongly.

White House aide H.R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman resigned from Nixon's staff the same day, Inouye noted that the President had said he regretted that and considered them fine public servants.

"Is this lowering the boom?" Inouye asked.

As for presidential action to get rid of aides involved in Watergate, Mitchell cited the cases of Job Stuart Magruder and Egil Krogh.

Krogh, a former White House aide, resigned May 9 as an undersecretary of transportation. Magruder quit April 26 as policy director at the Commerce Department.

At the end of a long and acid exchange Wednesday with Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., Mitchell had acknowledged that he probably ignored his legal duty as a lawyer and former attorney general to cover up or wrongdoing he called "White House horrors."

Mitchell, once director of the Nixon re-election campaign, concluded that day of testimony with one, half-muttered last remark: "It's a great trial they're conducting up here, isn't it?"

The committee met for an hour in private this morning to discuss the President's refusal to appear in person or to produce his papers, but did not complete its discussion.

D-Conn. said the panel also would hear its list of remaining witnesses and planned another closed session in the early afternoon.

# Savings Bank To Improve Parking Lot

The Savings Bank of Manchester is planning to improve and beautify its rear parking lot on the west side of Purnell Pl., Everett Lively said, bank president, told the Mayor's Downtown Action Committee this morning.

The bank's proposal will include a separate building which will provide banking services such as drive-in and walk-up windows, Lively said.

"We have a green light from the State Banking Commission," Lively said, noting that bank consultants are working on plans for the new building and the parking lot improvements.

Lively didn't say how much the Savings Bank of Manchester was planning to spend on the project, but he did note that the project's cost would probably be "certainly more" than what the Town of Manchester is estimating for the Purnell Pl. roadway.

Town improvements to the roadway — drainage, lighting, and sidewalk relocation — are estimated to cost about \$50,000, Lively said.

The Savings Bank of Manchester recently completed a major renovation and remodeling of its main office at a cost of about \$500,000. The work included a new "back of

front" area, Lively said.

Lively said the bank's project, only involving the bank-owned parking lot on east side of Purnell Pl., would consist of new curbing, parking sidewalks, landscaping, and improved access to the Purnell Pl.-to-Main St. walkway already existing.

It is expected that several parking spaces in the bank's lot will be lost when the improvements and the drive-in window are added, Lively mentioned.

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# New Controls Nearly Ready

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — As planning for Phase 4 wage-price controls nears an end, not all economic officials in the Nixon administration are sure the controls will work.

One official who has participated in Phase 4 planning predicted the tough new system soon to be announced will not enjoy great popularity with the American people.

"People are going to be more unhappy," said the official, who asked not to be identified. "There will be disillusionment."

He predicted that this would help explain the administration's decision to drop wage-price controls relatively soon and return to a free market.

"Do you want to know what the real impact of Phase 4 will be?" he said. "Just compare the first freeze with the second, then compare Phase 2 with Phase 4. It will be about the same relationship."

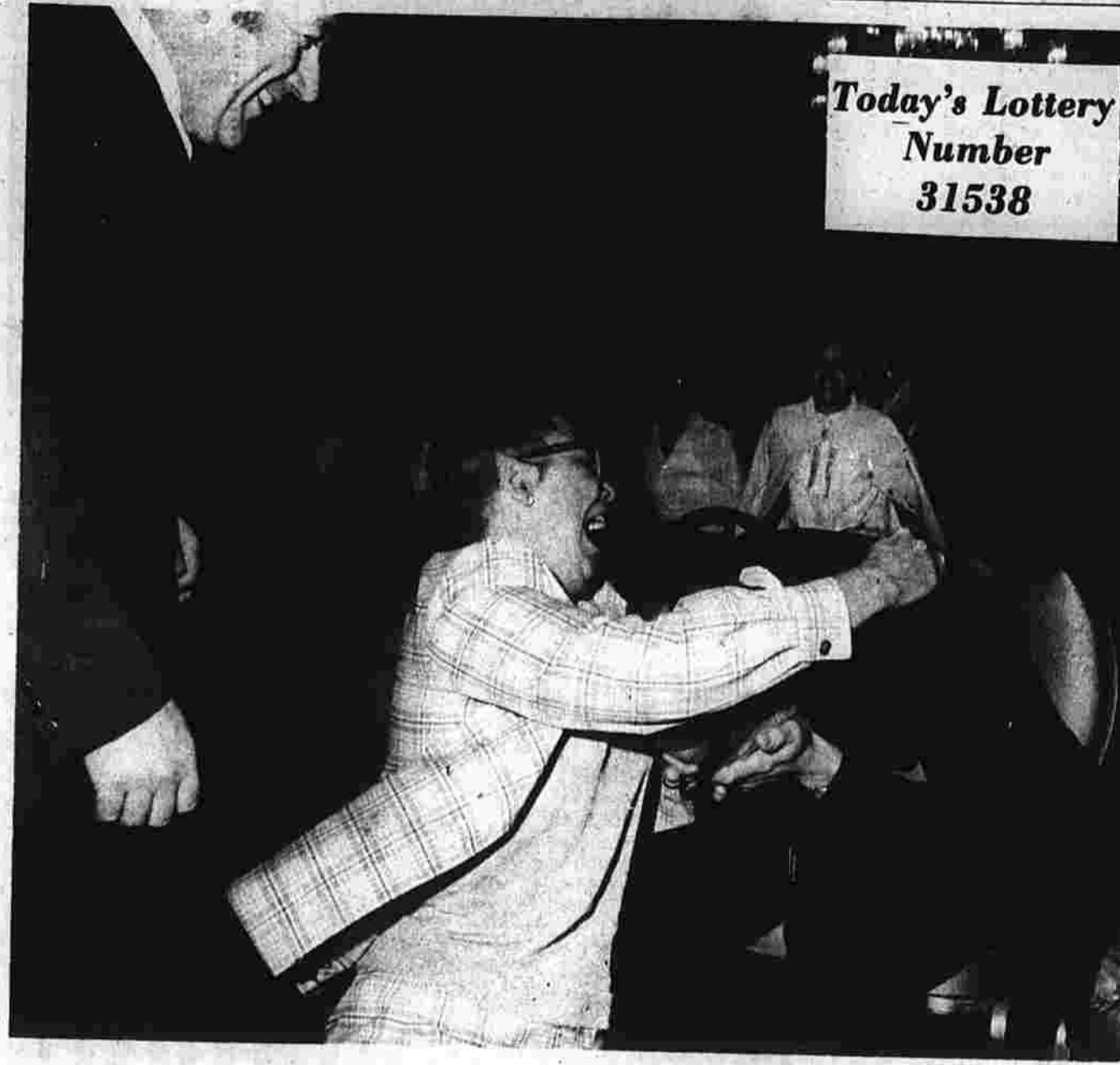
By that, he meant that the 90-day wage-price freeze system of controls that followed enjoyed general public support. But the recently imposed 60-day freeze aroused much less enthusiasm and led to reports of food shortages, killing of baby chicks and industry calls for relief.

The administration is pushing ahead with the controls system, and an announcement is expected soon, perhaps early next week.

Sources said it will be designed so that controls can be ended quickly. One source speculated it would not be as reasonable to think that Phase 4 could be dropped altogether this year, especially if encouraging new crop forecasts by the Agriculture Department are correct.

Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz postponed a scheduled trip to Japan this weekend to be on hand for final decisions. The White House said the announcement will be soon, but not this week.

The package may include new fiscal measures, perhaps a tax increase or new spending cuts, as well as changes in the fiscal year. Nixon has pledged not to seek new tax increases but the economic situation, especially inflation, may change his mind.

# Carlson Explains Campaign Fund For Meskill

**HARTFORD (AP)** — Gov. Thomas J. Meskill did not report thousands of dollars in funds contributed to his 1970 campaign by a secret Washington D.C. organization, according to Adolf G. Carlson, state commissioner of finance and control.

Carlson, who was finance co-chairman of the Meskill campaign, said he didn't think the funds had to be reported because they went directly to a Hartford advertising firm.

The Washington Star-News reported Wednesday that Meskill had received between \$80,000 and \$90,000 from a secret fund, reportedly run by Herbert Kalmbach, President Nixon's personal lawyer.

Carlson said he had talked to Meskill and had called to Glasson about our problems" in raising campaign funds and mentioned advertising bills.

Carlson said he had mentioned the agency, the former Graceman Advertising Agency, and said the checks from Washington had been sent directly to the agency.

If someone makes independent donations outside the campaign organization, the figures did not have to be reported, Carlson said.

The files show no listing for Meskill from any organization in Washington.

## PZC To View Hayes Subdivision

An on-site investigation of the proposed Richard Hayes subdivision on Plains Rd. will be made before the Planning and Zoning Commission comes to any decision on the matter, which was the subject of a public hearing Monday night.

In June last year, the PZC disapproved the proposed plan, because the eight lots were considered to be too close to the town dump. Hayes brought legal action against the PZC, claiming the decision was illegal, arbitrary and unreasonable. The appeal is still pending, but Hayes resigned for the subdivision.

Frances Funk, chairman of the Conservation Commission, summarized for the PZC a report from Thomas Holzer, geology professor at UConn, stating that the proximity to the dump seems to be of little concern, except as it might affect portable water supply for the houses in the subdivision.

Holzer said that wells driven into bed rock, rather than shallow, dug wells, are recommended.

No comments from residents were heard during the public hearing on Hayes' proposal, but several residents did express concern about a four-lot proposed subdivision on Parker St. in Coventry.
