In Tolland Woods Area Volunteers Search For Missing Child

More than 300 volunteers, headed by State Police from the Stafford troop, continued combing woods in Tolland at noon today for seven-year-old Janice K. Pickett who has been missing from her home since yesterday afternoon.



Janice, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Pickett of Anthony Rd., Tolland, reportedly told her parents she was going into the woods near her home to search for a butterfly. Her bicycle was later found on the side of the road and a searching party was set up to comb the woods in search of the girl.

The search continued late into the night and was resumed at dawn today. The State Police are being assisted by volunteers from five departments from as far away as Colchester. Also aiding in the search are members of the Civil Air Patrol, the Coast Guard and Explorer Scouts. The Mutual Communications Center has asked that food be provided for 350 workers and the Nathan Hale Chapter of the American Red Cross is standing by to offer aid. Contract Awarded For Rt. 83 Project

State Transportation Commissioner A. Earl Wood has announced the award of a \$68,594 contract to Arute Bros. of New Britain for relocation of Rt. 84 (Hebron Ave.) in Glastonbury. The project, which measures approximately one-half mile, is primarily an intersectional improvement with Rt. 83 (Manchester Rd.) and the elimination of a hazardous curve on Rt. 84. The project also includes reconstruction of approximately a quarter-mile section of Rt. 83. The project is expected to get under way this summer and is scheduled to be completed by late 1975.

Congressional Pay Raise

In 1965 congressional salaries were raised from \$22,500 to \$30,000 — and four years ago there was a 41 per cent jump to \$42,500.

Now a measure is halfway through Congress that will speed up a new pay boost (reported in excess of \$10,000) and similar increases for the federal judiciary, cabinet members, and other high government officials.

The rising cost of living affects those officials as it does everyone else. But are such massive salary increases justified? Are they consistent with the new Phase 4 guidelines and appeals for non-inflationary labor contracts? What would be their effect upon wage schedules in the private sector . . . and upon the inflationary spirit in general?

If the present bi-partisan effort in Congress succeeds, the new pay boost will be approved this year, reportedly to avoid political embarrassment in the election year of 1974 when it normally would come up for action.

The stepup already has been approved by the Senate; it is almost certain to pass the House also, but with opposition spearheaded by Rep. H.R. Gross (R-Iowa) and others.

The plan, with a "back door" feature built into the procedure since 1967 eliminating the necessity of a record roll call, works like this:

1. The report of the nine-member Commission on Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Salaries (submitted June 30 but still kept secret) would be acted upon by the President in January in connection with his budget for fiscal 1975.

2. But the legislation now in Congress — sponsored by Sens. Gale McGee (D-Wyo.) and Hiram Fong (R-Hawaii) would speed the President's recommendation to Aug. 31 of this year and require future salary commission proposals every two years instead of four.

3. The "back door" provision of no required Congress vote would be retained. After the President's recommendations are in, Congress has 30 days to act — or rather, not to act. If the solons sit tight and do nothing, the pay raises go into effect. To reject the boost, the Senate and House must specifically pass a bill turning it down. Under the McGee-Fong bill's timetable, Congress would have until Oct. 1 (a month subsequent to the President's recommendations) to effect any raise — or allow it to take effect.

We believe pay raises of the dimension proposed by the salary commission are ill-advised at this time when Americans are being asked to tighten their belts. We suggest also:

— That the salary commission's report be made public at once, with all its recommendations.

— That President Nixon weigh the board's proposals carefully in the light of inflationary implications before making his own recommendations.

— And that steps be initiated to eliminate the "back door" maneuver in favor of full debate and a record roll call. As Rep. Gross, who would like to force a roll call as he did once before, said: "If members of Congress want a pay raise they should stand up and be counted."

As for moving the salary question to non-election years, we don't see why solons should worry if proposed raises are moderate and justified.

We must expect to pay our senators, representatives and other high officials adequately, of course. But raises should be accomplished in a highly public way with opportunity for citizen input; on a scale that the country can afford; and in keeping with non-inflationary policies. In the practice of sound economics, Congress should set the example.

Contrary to the reams of news copy indicating otherwise, the deputy director of CIA marched right over to the FBI and tried to get the investigation stopped. Only later did the CIA decide not to play.

The Watergate team broke into the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist and then, if we are to believe Charles W. Colson, former special counsel to the President, attempted to conceal that attempt by giving it a security classification—"classifying" the Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

The then head of the FBI, L. Patrick Gray, Jr. burned key legal evidence about Watergate on White House orders.

By noon two of the fellows had enough (not gam) and headed back to the farm house to get dry. Soon after that O.C. saw a rabbit scurrying under a tuft of bog grass and was able to put his foot on it before it jumped. That one was also pressed on the spot and loaded in with the other.

Soon after that we all went home. Four men, all day, four rabbits before we went home dry and comfortable, the four rabbits probably have been forgotten among the many more like it. But that one has been recalled and enjoyed many times over the years.

Vernon Nutmeg Village Allowed Additional 148 Units

The developers of Nutmeg Village, a new luxury apartment complex on Rt. 33, Vernon, have been granted permission by the Zoning Commission to build an additional 148 units in the same complex.

Also voicing objection to the additional units was James O'Neill of Wellwood Circle who also cited the additional traffic as his main objection.

Melvin Steinman, developer, referred to one of the main concerns mentioned by the Zoning Commission, that the building might be in the flood plain area of the land. Steinman assured the commission that none of the buildings will go into that area.

Concerning traffic and the extra sewage the additional units will create, it was explained that the state is planning to reconstruct the highway from Vernon Circle to past the apartment. Plans are to widen the highway to four moving lanes of traffic and the work is to start next month.

The state has ordered the town to update the sewage treatment plant and preliminary plans for this project are now in the works.

The new apartment units will be of similar design to the ones now under construction. Steinman said plans are to start

Father-Son Team Keeps Tower Clocks Ticking Despite Bees, Bats, Hornets

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP) — The Archambaults are in a line of work that has unusual hazards—bees, hornets, bats, pigeons and over-protective mother starlings.

They repair and maintain the tower clocks of New England. The Archambaults—father Edward, 66, and son William, 41—operate Tower Clock Specialists in Waltham, a two-man company set up to service New England's approximately 80 tower clocks.

"I wouldn't call it a dangerous profession, but there are some hazards," William said. "I've been attacked by a starling that was protecting her nest. And then there are pigeons. They're a special nuisance, especially for clocks. The pigeon white mixes with the clock oil. One pigeon can ruin a clock." And bats, said Edward. "There are no as many as there used to be in the old days, but they're there. You have to ignore them to a mean, if there's a bunch of bats there, you walk right in and let them peep all they want."

The Archambaults say maintaining these often ancient time pieces high in the towers of mills, churches, libraries, town halls and schools is a commitment to preserve "one of the few links that we have with the past that are still in actual, working use today."

They are one of the things that we have left in New England that has anything to do with our heritage," he said. "The hitching post is gone, the ice truck is gone, the vegetable vendor coming through the streets, he's gone. The lamplights are gone."

"What I'm looking for is to try to preserve as much of this New England heritage as I can," he said.

The Archambaults make service calls all over the region at prices ranging from \$30 for a simple inspection to more than \$1,000 for conversion of a mechanical clock to an electric clock.

William said, "Today you couldn't buy even one of these clocks, but if you could it would probably cost you \$3,000 or more."

"We tell some of the town officials this," he said, "and they say, 'Gee, if it's worth that much, then let's get it cleaned up.' In many cases, they'd even have the clock insured."

About half the tower clocks in America are in New England, thanks to sea captains who popularized the practice in the last century.

"These captains would come home after years at sea, saving all that money, and the first thing they'd see would be the tower of the church or meeting hall in their port town," Edward said.

"So, naturally, since they had the money, they decided to put something in that tower that they could see when they came home, as a sort of personal memorial to themselves."

Maddox 'Prudent Diet' Is Sensible Heart Care

By GAYNOR MADDOX
A diet and coronary heart disease research study was established in 1956 in New York by Dr. Norman Jolliffe, an expert in public health nutrition. Only one factor was to be investigated: the relationship of diet to coronary heart disease. Now, 14 years later, the final report is being made ready.

Iva Bennett, home economics and health education specialist, worked with Dr. Jolliffe from the beginning. She continued with Dr. George J. Christakis, now with Mt. Sinai (N.Y.) Medical School, and also with two other medical supervisors.

On advice of leading medical people she and an associate have written the entire program in terms understandable to the layman. Their book, "The Prudent Diet," explains a medically based diet using very good food. Marsha Simon, also a specialist in dietetics, is the author of the book. ("The Prudent Diet" by Iva Bennett and Marsha Simon; David White publisher, \$7.95.)

"The word 'prudent' in the diet means sensible or wise. It is designed to prolong the vigorous span of life," Mrs. Bennett says.

"It curtails excessive eating of fat meats, high-fat dairy products, eggs, hydrogenated shortenings and foods containing any of these ingredients. It encourages eating more fish and certain shellfish, substituting polyunsaturated vegetable oils and margarine for butter, lard and hydrogenated shortenings and other saturated fats. Note the diet does not advocate excessive use of complete omission of any one food."

The diet fulfills all requirements of the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council. It is based on the knowledge that saturated fats raise the cholesterol level of the blood. Some examples of sources of saturated fats are beef, lard and pork, whole milk, butter and egg yolks. On the other hand, polyunsaturated fats lower the cholesterol level. Some polyunsaturated foods are fish, certain shellfish, liquid vegetable oils and whole grain foods.

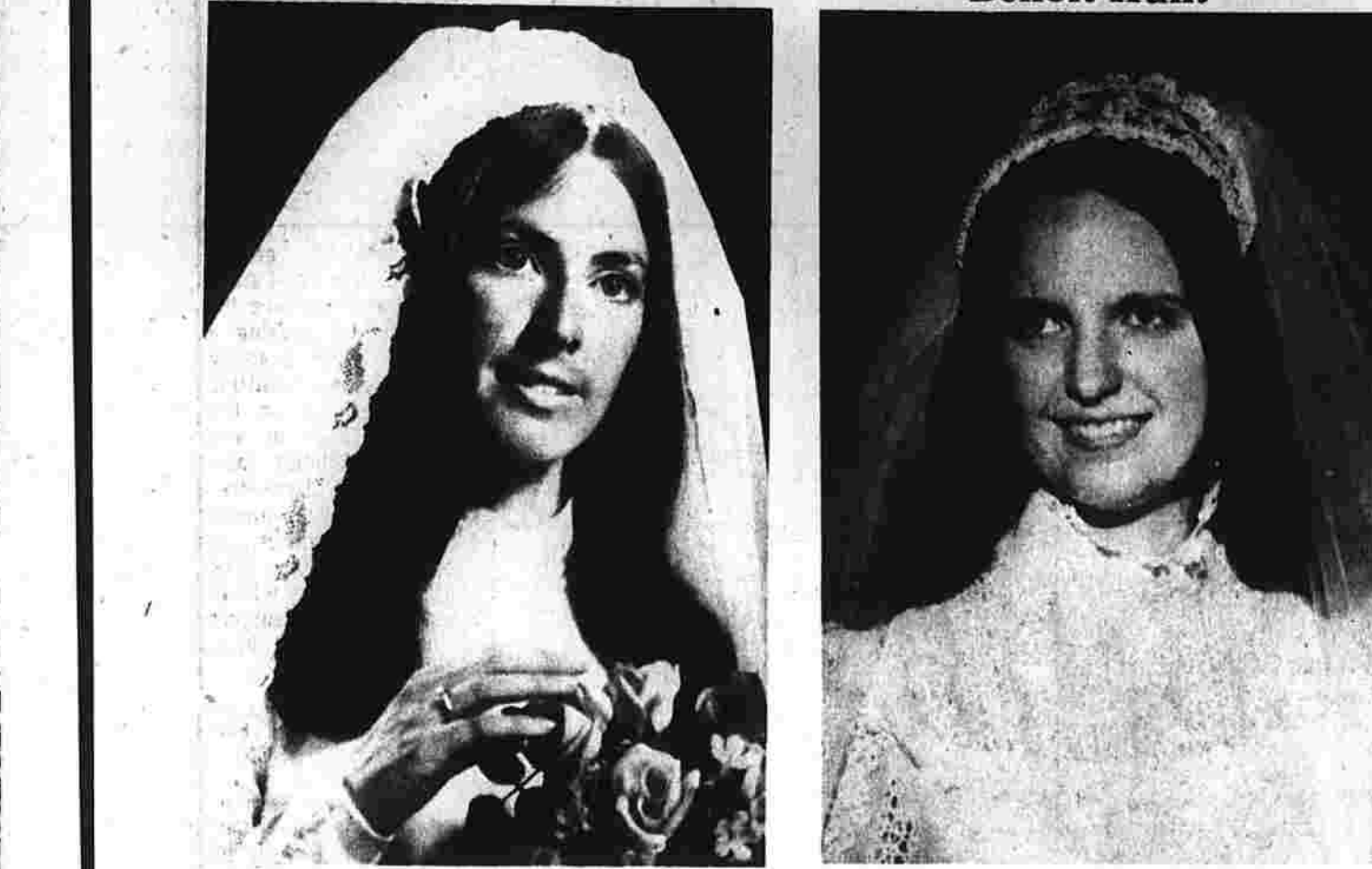

Liberated Scientist Juggles Two Jobs and Home at the World's End

HARBERTON FARM, Argentinians (AP) — Women's liberation has at least one advocate on the southern tip of the South American continent.

Here in Tierra del Fuego — Fireland, as it was named by explorer Ferdinand Magellan — lives a U.S. woman who manages to juggle a career as a scientist, writer and housewife in an area so remote it is accessible only by a 20 minute flight up Usumana, the nearest town.

Natalie Prosser de Goodall, 35, came as a tourist to Harberton, the first sheep farm established on the island, some 10 years ago following a teaching tour in Venezuela.

At Harberton she met the farm's manager, Thomas Goodall, a great-great-grandson of the Rev. Thomas Bridges who settled by the Beagle Channel in 1871 to teach the now extinct Indians of Tierra del Fuego.

"I meant to visit Harberton for one day and stay for one month," Mrs. Goodall recalled. Six months after their first meeting, Tom Goodall traveled to the States to marry Natalie and bring her back to Harberton as his wife.

Country life came naturally to Natalie Goodall who grew up on a farm near Lexington, Ohio, but ever a U.S. student, Harberton is an enormous piece of land.

The sheep farm has 40,000 acres of land with four mountains, 48 lakes and 9,000 sheep. While her husband managed the farm, Mrs. Goodall, who graduated in biology and art from Kent State University, began exploring the archipelago's plant and wild life, history and geography.

In the past decade she has become an acknowledged expert on Tierra del Fuego, publishing a book on the island which she wrote and illustrated. Her research has been backed by grants from the National Geographic Foundation and her next publication will be a field guide to the plants of Tierra del Fuego.

Mrs. Goodall, a shy woman with blue eyes and gray-flecked black hair, explained how she feels about living so far removed from telephones, newspapers and television. "I've never been much interested in politics or world events so I don't feel left out of the news. At first I did miss life in the States, but not so much any longer. We have been back to Ohio every three years or so."

"I get an idea of what's happening in the States from visitors who come here," she added. The farm and guest house at Harberton are magnets for visitors. "I've heard about the women's liberation movement from several visitors from the States. Mrs. Goodall said, 'and I guess you could say that I am an example of a liberated woman because I so often go off on scientific excursions to nearby islands leaving our two daughters with my husband.'"

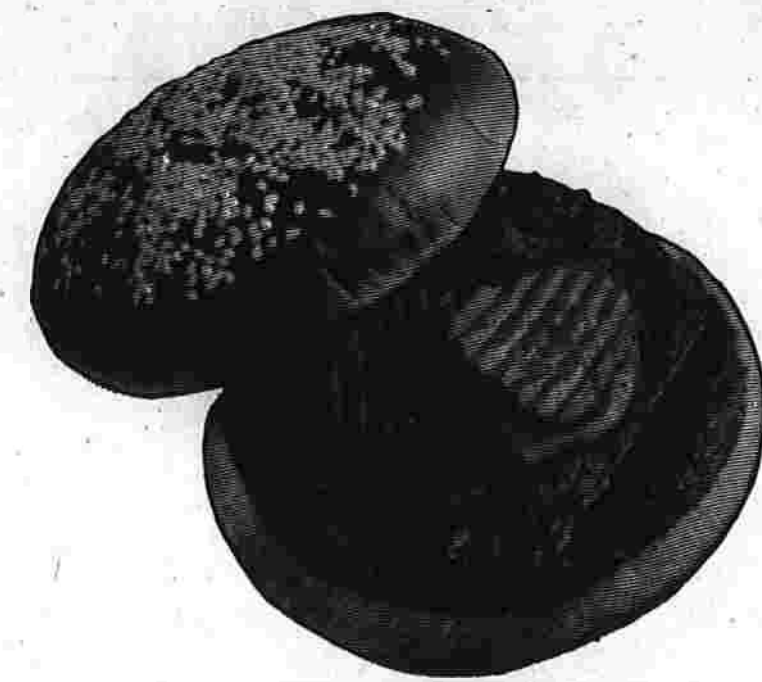

Anyone who becomes interested in bonsai plants and expects ever to take a day off during the summer season, much less a vacation away from home, must be sure he has a reliable plant sitter. These purposefully dwarfed little trees with their shallow roots confined in pots must be watered every day, unless it rains.

Natural Rock Container
A bent trunk is a requirement for one kind of bonsai, the cascade form, which must droop over the side of the pot, and some plants grow naturally in this shape.

Bob Linton has a prostrate juniper purchased at a nursery, still in its first season as a bonsai, which he has planted in a natural depression on top of a chunk of rock he picked up on the coast of Maine. The rock and the juniper are naturally suited to each other, he thinks.

There are strict and detailed rules for developing a bonsai plant, established over centuries by the Japanese, who may bequeath a fine plant from one generation to the next so that some of those in existence are hundreds of years old. Starting just five years ago, Bob Linton regards himself as a beginner in this horticultural specialty. He thinks of his plants also as in their primary stage of development, needing both more time and more careful shaping. Bonsai is regarded as a combination of horticulture and art, and Bob learned one a book he found valuable, "Bonsai-Indoors and Out," by Jerald P. Stowell (D. van Nostrand Co., Princeton, which gives this definition: "In maturity, a bonsai is something of nature evoked in miniature. It is to be appreciated in some home or garden like a piece of sculpture, which indeed it is."

Most American bonsai plants start their lives in local nurseries and many of them are species of Oriental origin, but Bob Linton is attracted by Mr. Stowell's notion that there might well be an American style of bonsai, based on the Japanese style but using native American materials.

This week, he and June were planning a hiking trip in the northern New York mountains where they would look for potential bonsai plants. I can imagine them making slow progress over a mountain trail, while they examine the underbrush on both sides for just the right small tree. It would then have to be carefully dug to preserve the small feeder roots and kept moist somehow in a back pack.

Some remarkable finds have been made by local bonsai enthusiasts. We wrote in this column last year about an arbutus found on a small island, mostly rock, in Lake George by Dr. Robert M. Fitch of Coventry. He thought it was then 25 years old and he had kept it for 15 years. The large roots that are exposed on the surface of the rock as the plant sought moisture added to its value.

Bob Linton says his interest began with a bonsai exhibit at the Plaza Garden Fair in Hartford in 1968 and I remember two plants from that show because of their unusual history. One was a hemlock found growing on top of a small stump and the exhibitor had dug it, stump and all. The other was a nursery-grown evergreen with a curiously bent and twisted trunk. It had been run over by a truck and the nursery was glad to give it away.

The Nike Complex: A Big Potential

On May 1, 1970, the Town of Manchester acquired a section of land formerly owned by the United States Government called the Nike Site.

The Nike Site is located in the South West Corner of Manchester at the end of Garden Grove St. which is off Keeney St. This area cost Manchester \$50,000 with the promise to develop it into a recreation area within five years.

The 36.80 acres have great potential as a recreation center. Eight buildings, originally barracks, are being restored. The recreation department headquarters building has been in operation for the past two years along with the teen center which has been running for the past year.

The latest addition to completed buildings is the new Rifle Range which will be used by the high school's rifle teams and the police department.

The other buildings will eventually contain a Cultural Center (music, sculpture, painting, arts and crafts and theater), a Community Center (live stage and theater, child day-care center and assembly hall), Theatrical

Workshop and Equipment Storage Shed.

With Manchester's population of 48,000 there is only five acres per 1,000 people of open spaces and park areas. The CHPA (Connecticut Recreation and Park Association) recommends 15 acres per 1,000 people which leaves Manchester at a low point. The Nike Site will add 36.80 acres to Manchester of undeveloped land.

Along with the basketball court which was left from the government and the recently completed softball field (dedicated July 24), Manchester will eventually have archery, camping, picnic areas, model airplane flying, kite flying, nature trails and horseback riding. The camping areas will be the next step in the development of the Nike Site.

The Nike Site has an elevation of about 400 feet above sea level, one of the highest points in Manchester. This viewpoint is a nice place for the picnics and camping with views as far away as Hartford.

Eventually the Nike Site will be the recreational center of Manchester with entertainment for the young and old.

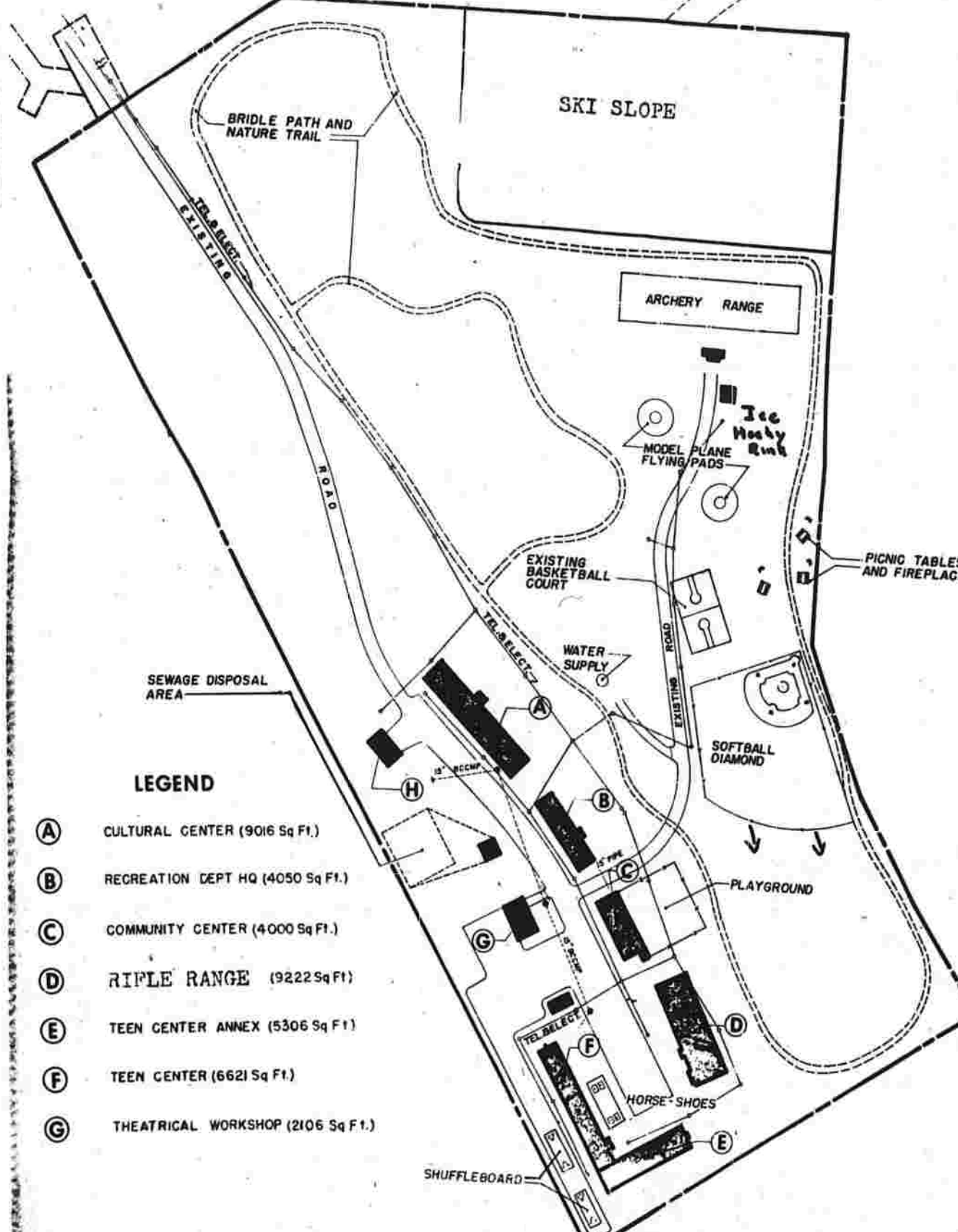

The Ear Here There Goes Rhymin' Simon

This is not one of those albums that is released as a home for the hit song, which happens to be in this case Kodachrome.

Voters Thursday night rejected a Town Council recommendation favoring the town's purchase of the Zollo property on Daly Rd. and Rt. 31. The vote was 39 in favor and 71 against the purchase of the 1.4 acres at a cost of \$58,000.
