After brief physical examinations, a space agency physician, Dr. Paul Buchanan, reported, "They are in excellent shape. They're eager to get started."

While they ate breakfast, a small leak developed in a fuel line valve that feeds the first stage of the rocket. A four-man team of technicians quickly repaired it without interrupting the countdown.

Technicians helped the astronauts into their white spacesuits with bubble helmets and the U.S. flag emblazoned on the sleeves.

As they left the crew quarters, they smiled and waved at a group of newsmen and space workers. They boarded an air-conditioned van for the short drive to the launch pad and rode elevators to the spacecraft level

Obituaries AEC Orders Nuclear Power ROCKVILE - Joseph Rakulski, 59, formerly of Waterbury, died Thursday at Plant Check

WATERFORD (AP) - The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) said Friday it has ordered an immediate inspection of nuclear power plants throughout the country because of a defect found at the Millstone I plant here.
An AEC official said

operators of atomic plants have been given until noon Monday to report the results of inspections and repairs where necessary to "hydraulic shock suppressors." The devices protect plumbing systems in atomic plants from damage by shocks such as earth tremors.

Plants with defects such as those found at Millstone I may have to be shutdown as a precautionary measure if repairs cannot be made quickly, the AEC official said.

The system is designed to prevent pipes carrying water to cool atomic reactors from being ruptured by earthquakes or tremors. If the pipes were damaged, it could result in the core reactor overheating, causing a "meltdown" that would release potentially harmfull radioactive materials, the AEC spokesman explained.

He said not all atomic plants have the same kind of system found at Millstone I, but all plants have been ordered to determine if they have such a component and to repair it as quickly as possible.

Millstone I, completed in 1970, has been shut down most of the time since last September when repairs were begun after seawater was found leaking into the cooling system. Meanwhile, the AEC conducted a pre-hearing con-

Skylab 2 29th Manned Space Trek

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) - Skylab 2 is the 29th manned space flight scheduled by the United States

On the earlier Mercury, Gemini and Apollo missions, 38 American astronauts logged flight time, with several making repeat trips for a total of 62 men in space.

Nine of those flights were to the vicinity of the moon and six achieved lunar landings, with 12 U.S. spacemen walking on the moon's surface

On the previous 28 launchings, the astronauts recorded a total of 11,514 hours, 51 minutes in space. Russia has had 18 manned launchings, all in earth orbit, with 32 cosmonauts logging 4,401 hours, 28 minutes flying time.

The longest flight was Skylab 1, which was concluded last month after 28 days, 40 minutes. Skylab 2 is scheduled for 59 days.

Like the milk memos, Nixon contends the Watergate-related tapes and documents are shielded by executive privilege.

DETROIT (AP) - General Motors has reported all-time record profits of \$1.6 billion for the first six months of 1973. more money than any corporation ever has reported for a

half-year period. Until Friday's announcement, the highest profits ever reported for six months was the \$1.4 billion posted recently by American Telephone &

GM, the world's largest manufacturer, said its \$1.6 billion profits for the first six months of the year compared with net income of \$1.3 billion for the first half of 1972, the previous high for the period.

The record income was based on worldwide sales of 4,795,000 cars and trucks, compared with 4,258,000 vehicle sales in the first half of 1972.

Income of \$797 million for the second quarter topped last year's second quarter income of \$723 million but was short of first-quarter income of \$817 million. Income as a percentage of

sales was 8.3 per cent, down from 8.5 per cent for the first quarter of the year. Record sales totaled \$19 billion for the first six months of the year, compared with \$16

billion for the first half of 1972. The half-year figure is based partly on second-quarter sales of \$9.6 billion, also a record over 1972's record second-quarter sales of \$8.5 billion. For shareholders, the record

six-month figures meant \$5.62 a share earnings and dividend payments of \$2.05. Last year, shareholders were paid \$1.95 a share on per share earnings of

A Well-known Pianist Talks to Kids About Jazz



Marian McPartland was born in England. She started playing the piano at the age of three. She came to this country in 1946. She has appeared on national television and has her own record company.

Marian McPartland is one of the outstanding jazz pianists in the country today. Since 1957, she has taken time from her busy schedule to go into schools and teach children about jazz... and something about themselves.

What's jazz? Jazz is a tune that you make up as you go along. It has a beat all its own. You change it around each time you play it. You improvise.

What does this teach kids about themselves? Mrs. McPartland hopes it will encourage them to do their own thing, just like the jazz musicians do. She wants them to feel free to do something in their own way, whether it's beating out a tune, or writing a poem, or painting a picture.

Though Mrs. McPartland wants children to do their own thing, she also wants them to learn to listen while someone else does his.

We asked Mrs. McPartland what's happening in jazz today. "All kinds of music are coming together . . . folk music, jazz and rock. Jazz musicians are using rock, rock musicians are borrowing from jazz. It's like one big musical melting pot!"

What's the difference between rock and jazz? Rock has a more definite beat that is repeated over and over again. Jazz has more variety. The main difference is that with jazz, you play anyway you want to. You improvise.

Although you improvise in jazz music, it isn't some kind of magic that you play just by picking up an instrument. You have to practice. And although many of the early jazz musicians did not read music, most of today's jazz players have studied it and can play other kinds of music as well.

Jazz is changing all the time, but under lying all of this music is a rhythm or beat which was originally brought to this country from Africa. Jazz is considered by many to be the only musical form that originated in this country. It is typically American.

Davis started playing the trumpet when he was 13. After finishing high-school, he studied at the famous Juilliard School of Music in New York. He is known as a real improviser. He became famous when he organized a band in 1948 and began making records.

Though most any instrument can be used in making jazz music, we usually think of the ones below as the most popular.

Drums
