Ethical Error Seen

At this stage of the Watergate investigation a pattern of philisophical and ethical error seems to be discernible. Both the Committee to Re-elect the President and the White House staff seemed to have thought that the end justified the means.

Recent testimony of John Ehrlichman has revealed a tendency to actively intrude on the rights of the individual for the desirable goals of political success and protection of the national welfare. And he seems to entwine these two matters.

The activities of the "Plumbers' were justified, he thinks, because they were trying to acquire information which would be helpful in preventing national security leaks.

A break-in to the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist was all right because it was serving the high goal of determining what type of man would make public classified information. No thought was given to the inviolability of matters pertaining to the doctor-patient relationship.

Although it is generally believed that he resigned because he could not stomach Meskill's seeming policy of denigrating higher education in Connecticut, he had too much dignity to lash out publicly at Meskill. Lawyers for President Nixon have filed their legal arguments supporting the President's refusal to give White House tapes to Watergate special prosecutor

In a brief filed Tuesday with U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica, lawyers for the President argued that the court lacks authority to enforce Cox's subpoena demanding the tapes of nine presidential conversations. The special prosecutor has called the tapes "important


