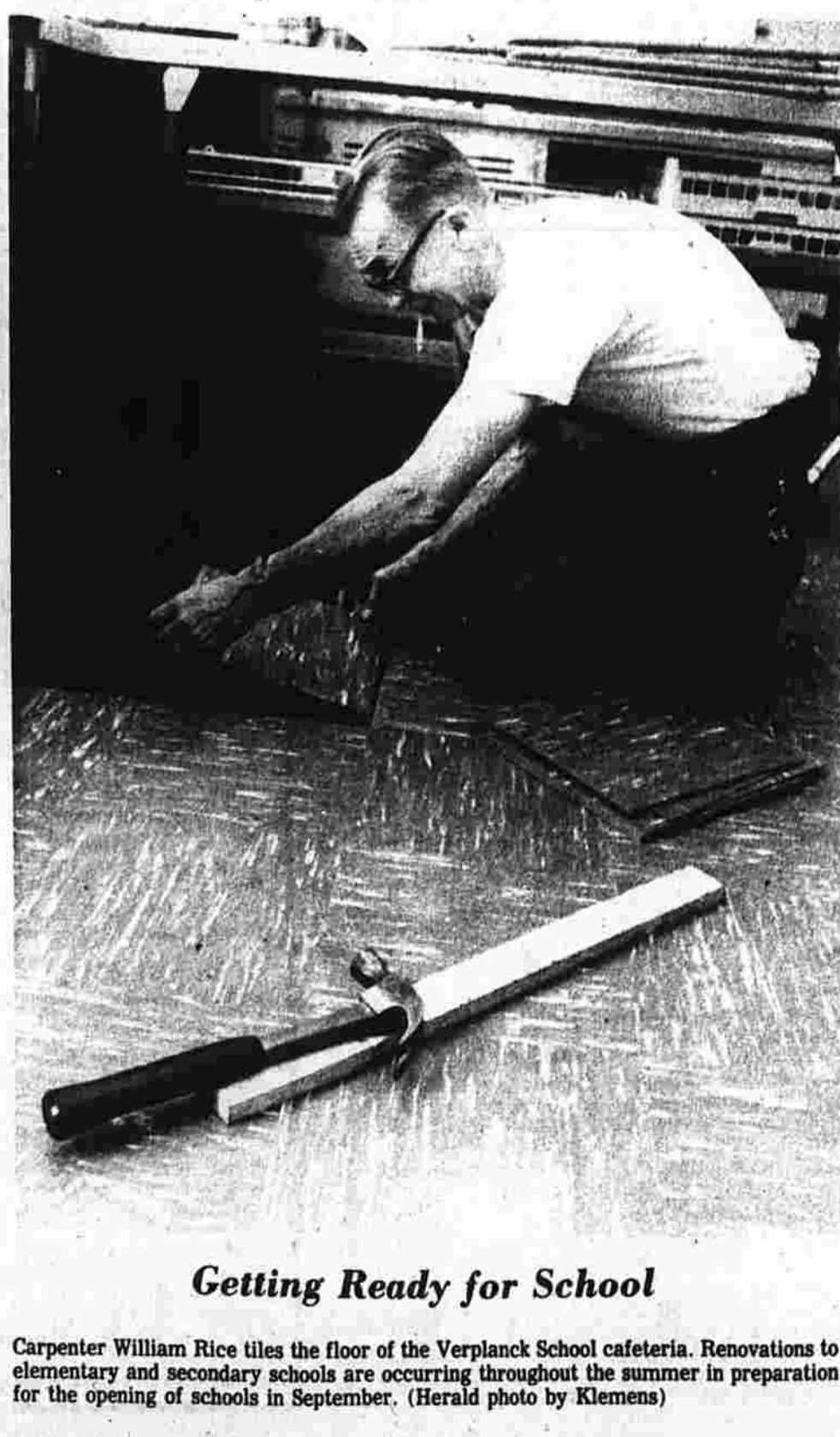

The White House brief rejected Cox's argument that the President had waived any claim of executive privilege.

The committee apparently decided to put off its lawsuit because of some concern that federal courts might refuse to accept the case on grounds that they lacked jurisdiction.

The committee decided to postpone filing the suit until the end of the year, after the committee has had an opportunity to ascertain and study the reaction of the White House attorneys to the motion for discovery.

The report was carried today by the Knight newspaper chain, which quoted sources as saying other prosecutors have been told that contractors paid Agnew \$1,000 a week over a period of years, and the \$50,000 sum with the first department.
