Ex-Nazi Returned For Trial

NEW YORK (AP) - Hermine Braunsteiner Ryan, a Nazi concentration camp guard who came to the United States and settled into a housewife's role 15 years ago, was returned Tuesday to West Germany fo

Mrs. Ryan was flown out of the country under a West German extradition warrant. She was returned to Dusseldorf where a bench warrant accuses her of helping to send more han 1,700 victims to gas hambers during World War II. She had been awaiting extradition in the Nassau County jail in East Meadow, where she was lodged after losing a five-year procedural fight to re main in the United States.

The charges against her were presented in a 30-page document from the West German foreign ministry to a federal judge here last April 9. The judge, Jacob Mishler of the U.S. istrict Court in Brooklyn, inerrupted U.S. deportation proceedings and allowed the German extradition request to

Mishler ruled that there was competent and sufficient evidence to establish probable cause to believe that Mrs. Ryan charged" in the Dusseldorf

Conviction in Germany could result in life imprisonment. Poland also has sought Mrs. Ryan for trial in thut nation, where crimes she is accused of carry the death penalty. Affidavits detail accusations of cruelty by Mrs. Ryan when she was an SS guard in the Lublin

Press Abridgement

In a recent ruling the Florida Supreme Court has decreed that newspapers must publish statements of persons who disagree with editorials published in the paper or opinions which are quoted in the newspaper from other individuals.

We have no doubt that this opinion will be overruled when the case is challenged in the Supreme Court of the United States as it surely will be.

The ruling is a blatant transgression of freedom of the press as defined in the First Amendment. It is an abridgement of the right of the press to publish or not publish what it

This is inherent and proper since the responsibility for publishing rests with the press not with the contributor or dissenter of its opinion. In a libel suit, it is almost always the newspaper which is sued, not the person who is responsible for a published statement which may be the basis for

A newspaper cannot exist unless it must present a news content which is lively and of interest to the reader who is the cornerstone of its strength.

This comes at a time when the Congress seems likely to remove the "equal time" burden of broadcasters so that they do not have to air every opinion which may arise in the campaign. Certainly the two are incom-

We have no doubt of the ultimate fate of the Florida decision. It is another example of the misunderstanding of the function of the free press.

The Beef Bungle

We have no idea what wellintentioned thinking was behind the continuance of the freeze on beef prices in the Phase 4 economic controls which went in effect July 18. Whatever it was it has been proven erroneous and disastrous. The net effect of the continuance has been to drive beef off the market.

Stockgrowers are withholding their beef until the Sept. 12 date for lifting the freeze. Wholesalers are not buying since they would have to pay higher prices than they can charge their customers and meat processing plants are shutting down on at least a temporary basis waiting for the cessation of controls.

The beef freeze should be lifted at once as was hinted by Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz. Nothing is to be gained by waiting until September except the further disorientation of the beef industry.

As anyone who has ever been in business knows, low prices are not achieved in a business which is operating in a chaotic condition. They come only when things are running smoothly with adequate supplies and smooth day to day operation.

Beef prices of necessity will be high


when the freeze is lifted, be it in September or tomorrow. An industry cannot be almost totally disrupted and then spring back miraculously with prices that represent efficiency.

This is another and disastrous example of the chaos which government creates when it meddles into private enterprise. The beef freeze should be lifted now and perhaps we will be well through the period of economic readjustment by the time September rolls around.

The situation has grown so bad that American beef is sold to Canadian buyers and then re-sold into the United States at high prices as there is no freeze on prices of imported

In California, housewives in the shouthern area are going into Mexico to buy beef which is reported plentiful there and back at the ranch the American meat producer is holding his beef cattle for higher prices which will certainly come after Sept. 12.

The mischief of the beef bungle should be undone now so that the industry may get back to normal operation and beef may again appear on the







Union Gets Access To

META organizers have been barred from the Windsor camp since July 18 when two of them were arrested for refusing to leave the property. The group has asked a three judge federal panel for a permanent injunction so it can organize a workers' collective bargaining unit to negotiate work contracts, wages, working con-ditions and benefits for the migrants. Presently the contracts are negotiated by the tobacco growers and the Puerto Rican Department of Labor. The tobacco growers maintain the camp is private proper-

ty and that access may be META has charged that the 650 migrant workers at the camp, most of them Puerto Ricans, are being denied their constitutional rights.


