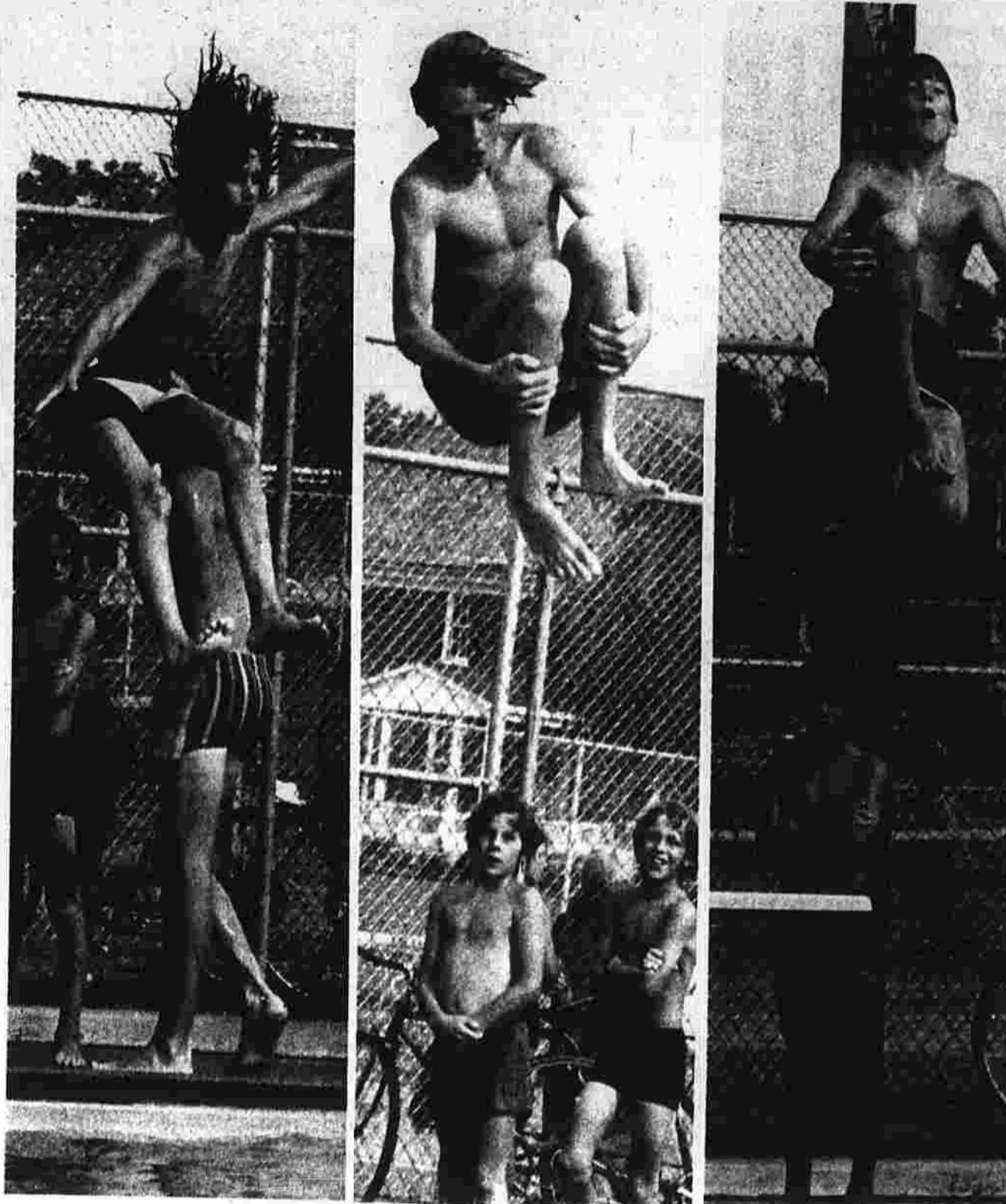

Cutoff By Turkey Won't Faze Opium

The much-heralded end to poppy farming in Turkey "will have virtually no impact on the amount of illicit opium or heroin flowing into this country," warns an internationally recognized expert on drug addiction and the world narcotics trade.
Southeast Asia and the "Golden Triangle" areas (Burma, Laos and Thailand) don't represent much now in terms of opium getting to the United States, says Dr. Maurice H. Severs, who was chairman of the department of pharmacology at the University of Michigan Medical School for nearly 30 years.
But when the Turkish trade is cut off, "there is tremendous potential for them to supply the demand," he says.
This will be the last year for Turkey's (legal) poppy crop. With a \$50-million subsidy from the United States to encourage its farmers to make the changeover, it is getting out of the poppy-growing business.

Seever's warning is backed up by a recently released report to the House Foreign Affairs Committee by a special narcotics subcommittee. A major share of heroin coming to the United States flows almost freely from Thailand, unhampered by corrupt Thai officials and meager U.S. antidrug efforts, the report charges.
But according to Severs, a large part of the problem lies in the fact that most of the world's illicit poppy farming areas are not under the control of any national government. The 200,000 hill tribesmen of northern Thailand, for instance, rely on poppies as almost their sole cash crop.
As he indicates, supply is only one part of the frightening drug equation. The other is demand. And in this regard, the attorney general of Mexico, whose government is actively combating the drug trade, especially in marijuana, has probably put his finger on the central issue.
The real problem, says Pedro Ojeda Paulilla, is U.S. consumption of illicit drugs and the tremendous prices Americans are willing to pay for them. As long as this demand continues, and profits are high enough to make drug-trafficking worth risks, the worldwide narcotics crisis will continue to be with us.

However, Turkey has always played a relatively small role in both the legal and illegal opium trade. Out of 1,400 metric tons of opium produced legally in the world in 1970, Turkey contributed only 150 tons. By comparison, the Golden Triangle produces an estimated 700 metric tons of illicit opiates each year.

I-91 Expansion A Must

The decision by the Meskill administration to abandon plans for the construction of I-291 around Hartford was a victory for environmentalists, but it still leaves the problem of traffic congestion in the Hartford area.
Much of the problem stems from the inadequacy of I-91 north of the capital. Two lanes of traffic are insufficient to handle the heavy volume of cars entering and exiting the city; as well as those already on I-91 or changing from I-91.
Construction in the Hartford area in recent years proved that much of the congestion can be eased by the addition of extra lanes of traffic as an alternative to construction of a brand new highway. Additional lanes on I-91 to the east of Hartford, in the Manchester area, have contributed greatly towards moving the traffic in

and out of the city. A short stretch of improvements in the West Hartford area, again a single lane, has helped ease traffic congestion on I-94 west-bound.
The continued growth of towns north of Hartford, along with the increased importance of Bradley International Airport, mandate that immediate steps be taken to improve the flow of traffic on I-91 north. This will have the side effect of decreasing the concentration of automobile emissions from cars now backed up on the highway, as well as allowing for the better flow of commuting and business vehicles.
The long-fought battle over I-291 is temporarily suspended, but Hartford still has its problems. Additional lanes on each side of I-91 north of Hartford would do much towards solving them.

Blatant Flummery

WASHINGTON — "Beat me around six months from now," Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger told a Senate subcommittee the other day in a plea for time to find a solution for the high cost of keeping 327,000 U.S. troops and 225,000 dependents in Europe.
The gentleman on Capitol Hill should tell Schlesinger to knock it off. In various paraphrases, successive administrations have been saying the same thing for more than 10 years while prices skyrocketed, the dollar was devalued and the atmosphere of only 41 per cent of its GNP on its own defense.
As his predecessors did, Schlesinger offered promises. He said he'd press our European allies to pay a greater share of the costs of keeping American troops on their soil. He said the U.S. should keep its forces intact as an inducement to the Soviet Union to cut its troop strength in Europe. He reminded his audience glowing of the opening round of East-West negotiations on mutual troop reductions slated to open Oct. 30 in Vienna.
What blatant flummery! There has been no indication Europe is interested in picking up its share of the tab. Even when we had more troops in Europe than we do today, Moscow balked at a meaningful reduction of forces. As for the Vienna talks, they probably go on for years. It takes the assistants six months merely to clear their throats.
This time, for a change, Capitol Hill had better listen to Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, who has called once more for a 50 per cent cut in U.S. overseas forces within three years. The Montana Democrat is talking money again, but now he's talking money in the context of the policies of the Nixon administration which are most unpopular with the constituencies of members of Congress.
Sounding like a man who believes his is an argument whose time has come, Mansfield is predicting that the advent of a new Congress will force Congress to enact its own policy on overseas forces. Mansfield speaks of the "impoundment by this administration of \$12-billion for domestic military spending of many U.S. military

Release The Tapes

To the editor:
It would appear to me that the entire "Watergate Scandal" isn't really a "scandal" in the contemporary sense. Watergate is perhaps the most controversial issue on the tongues of most "Street Intellectuals" and the contrary view of millions of people of both sexes who would rather spend an afternoon with the "Guiding Light" than observe history in the making.
To me, the Watergate process has been going on since before the days of F.D.R., but with this one reservation. I do not see in my opinion not to be proved or disproved. But simply to make a point. That political espionage is a part of almost every American and should be disposed of quickly and so should Watergate. But how can we dispose of the evidence in its entirety? Answer: We can't.
Solution: Pressure the administration into releasing the infamous White House tapes. The American people have a right to know how their employees are spending their tax dollars. And also an important curiosity concerning the operational organization of the office of the President. 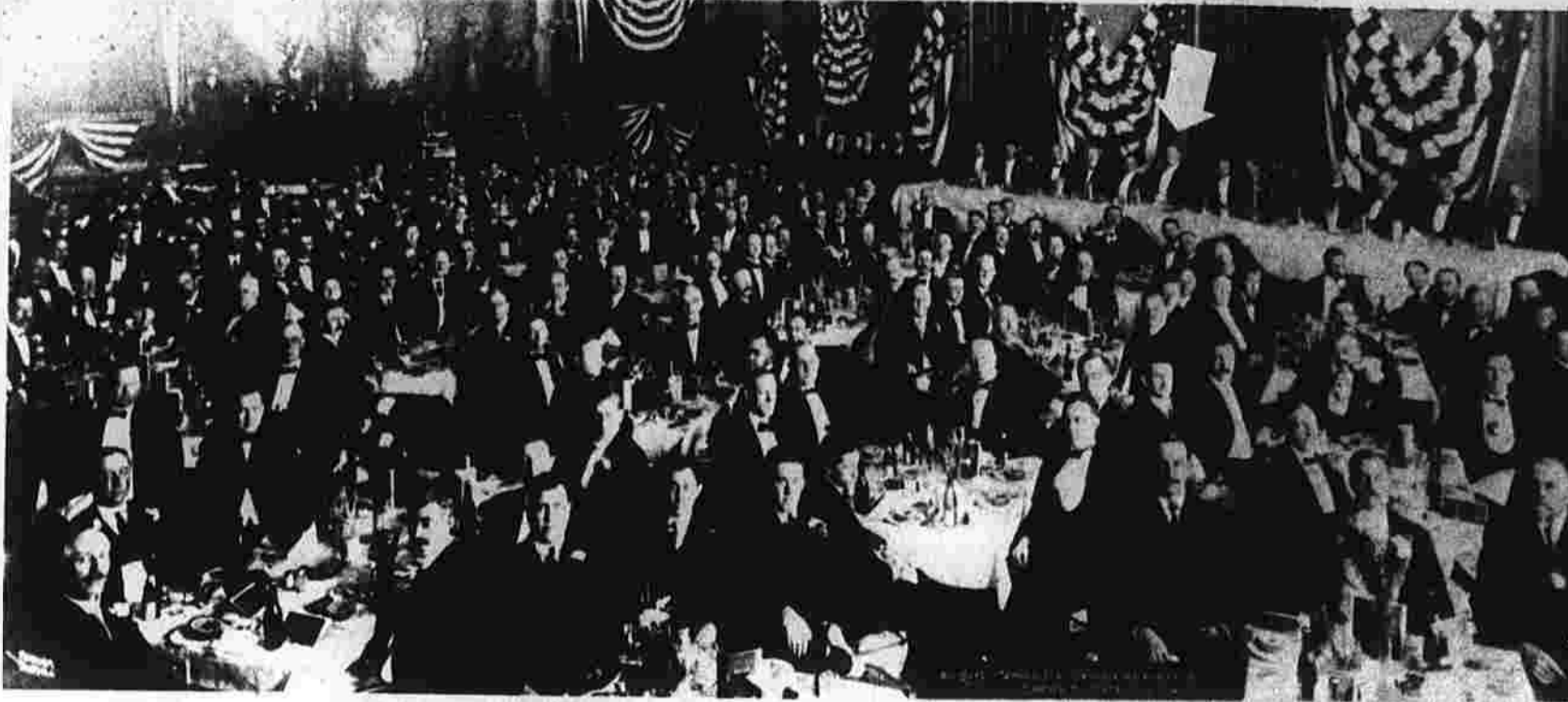

ficials showed records on file only go back as far as 1966, the year Agnew ran successfully for governor.

Radoff said because of the bulk of the records, the U.S. attorney's office was sending a man to the Hall of Records on Monday to examine the documents and to determine which ones will be taken by the attorney's office.

Radoff also said he is to appear Thursday before the grand jury to which U.S. Atty. George Beall is presenting evidence from his investigation of political corruption in Baltimore County and the state of Maryland.

Beall told Agnew 11 days ago that he was included in the probe of possible violation of criminal laws covering extortion, bribery and conspiracy.

Meanwhile, messages of confidence in Agnew were flooding his office, a spokesman said.

J. Marsh Thomson, Agnew's press secretary, said Friday that of the 500 telegrams received near the end of the work day, only 13 were unfavorable.

Agnew's Democratic successor as Maryland governor also expressed strong support for the vice president.

Gov. Marvin Mandel said at a news conference Friday that Agnew was being "tried in the court of public opinion before the grand jury has an opportunity to review the evidence."

"I would be greatly shocked and amazed if the allegations against him (Agnew) were true," Mandel said.

GOA Says Brazil Needs No U.S. Aid

its study of U.S. aid-to-education programs in Brazil. The report was distributed here this week.

"The basic goal of U.S. development assistance is to assist recipient countries to develop to a degree that external assistance is no longer required," the report said.

The report said Brazil's booming economy provides a good argument for setting a cutoff point for American aid.

Brazil's gross national product has grown at an average rate of 9.9 per cent since 1968, one of the fastest paces in the world.

The country has built up foreign currency reserves totaling \$4.2 billion and it has started its own program of foreign aid, making loans and building roads for other South American nations, the report said.

But living standards for most of Brazil's 100 million people are still not comparable with those in the major industrialized nations. The per capita income in urbanized southern Brazil was \$550 last year, and only \$180 in the country's vast northern jungles and plains, according to figures in the GAO report.

Two Face Charges In Sex Deaths

HOUSTON (AP) — Two teenage boys face a total of six murder charges after leading police to 23 mutilated bodies and telling a horror story of homosexual torture killings.

Police say they believe as many as seven more bodies may be found.

Murder with malice charges were filed early today against Elmer Wayne Henley Jr., 17, and David Brooks, 18.

They told police they had procured other teen-age boys for homosexual assaults by Dean Corli, 33. Henley told police he shot Corli to death Wednesday.

Henley was charged with two counts of murder for the deaths of Marty Ray Jones, 18, and Charles C. Cobble, 17. Harris County Asst. Dist. Atty. Michael J. Hinton said Jones was strangled with a cord and Cobble was shot to death, both on July 27.

Brooks was charged for the murder of William Ray Lawrence, 15, on July 10. Lawrence was strangled with a cord.

Jones, Cobble and Lawrence are the only victims who have been identified.

On Friday, Henley and Brooks were charged on three counts of murder in San Augustine County, in East Texas. Four bodies, including that of Lawrence, were found there near Lake Sam Rayburn.

The bodies of Jones and Cobble were discovered in a mass grave site at a Houston boat dock that contained 17 bodies.

The two youths also pointed out where two bodies were buried on High Island, near Galveston.

Houston Detective W.L. Young said Henley has admitted killing nine of the victims.

Five Injured In Accidents

Two accidents in town Friday sent a total of five persons to Manchester Memorial Hospital, all with major injuries, damaged a house and attached garage and three cars.

One crash was a one-car accident; the other involved three cars, but only two were damaged.

In the one-car accident, Mark Popik, 19, of East Hartford, was reported in satisfactory condition today at Manchester hospital.

A passenger in his car, Michael Smith, 19, of East Hartford, received emergency treatment and was released.

Police said Popik is charged with reckless driving. They said he lost control of his car while driving on Spring St. It left the road, struck a tree, and continued through the woods where it struck another tree. Smith was struck from the car, police said.

Popik was cut free of the car through use of a rescue saw, police said.

Court date is Aug. 21.

In the other accident, which occurred on Windsor St. Friday morning, four persons went to Manchester hospital and later were transferred to Hartford Hospital at their request.

Injured were Angelica Luyando, 37, Victor Carrillo, 16; Juan Flores, 24; and Enginio Feliciano, 34, all of Hartford.

The selectmen have called a town meeting for Aug. 23 to ask for an appropriation of \$4,500 for lighting in the primary area of Porter School and to appoint the school board as a building committee.

Town Sells Notes To United Bank

The Town of Manchester Friday sold \$300,000 in School Bond Anticipation Notes to the United Bank and Trust Co. of Hartford. The award is on the basis of 6.73 per cent interest, the lowest of three bids submitted.

The other bidders were Hartford National Bank and Trust Co., 6.77 per cent, and Connecticut Bank and Trust Co., 6.95 per cent.

The \$300,000 is being used to repay an equivalent sum received from United Bank and Trust on May 15, under a three-month sale. The interest to the town was 3.49 on May 15.

The \$300,000 is the state's 50 per cent share of the cost of 1973 additions and improvements to Nathan Hale, Keeney St. and Robertson Schools. The town borrowed the \$300,000 in May and again Friday because the town was

late in submitting its applications for the state share grant.

On Thursday, the day before the town sold the \$300,000 in notes, a check for \$150,000 was received from the state, with another \$150,000 promised for the fall.

Town Treasurer Roger Negro said he immediately invested the \$150,000 with the Hartford National Bank and Trust Co., at 10.40 per cent interest. He said the town was receiving 5 to 7 per cent on its bank investments in May.

Negro explained why the sale of \$300,000 in notes proceeded on schedule, despite the fact that the \$150,000 from the state reached the town the day before the sale. He said, when the town advertised the sale, it knew it had to meet an obligation on Aug. 15, but didn't know that a check for half of that obligation was to arrive in time.

Ancient Astronauts Land for Special

The theory that ancient visitors from other planets are responsible for various baffling phenomena of the past will be explored in the special "In Search of Ancient Astronauts," Thursday, Sept. 6 at 8 p.m. on NBC-TV.

Based upon the international best-seller "Chariots of the Gods?" by Erich von Daniken, the program offers many mysteries to support the theory. For example, a clay vase, which is on display in the Baghdad Museum, is also a 2,000-year-old electrical battery. Also, Istanbul's Topkapi Palace house maps, which date back to the 1st Century A.D., are uncannily accurate. According to von Daniken, these maps show the earth as it would have appeared to astronauts high above Cairo.

In Mexico, in Central America, in Italy and on a rocky ledge in the Sahara Desert, there are ancient drawings and sculptures depicting strange beings wearing what appear to be space suits, including helmets and antennae. Von Daniken suggests that if space travelers from another planet were to visit Earth, they would have found the environment hostile. They, too, would have had to travel in self-contained units and, in appearance, might have resembled modern astronauts.

Von Daniken also proposes that these ancient astronauts would have brought with them superior skills and may have been responsible for the accurate Mayan calendar, the huge carvings on Easter Island, Egypt's pyramids and Stonehenge in England. He also considers it significant that legends of various ancient peoples mention powerful strangers descending to Earth in flaming chariots.

The program presents some comments from several scientists including Dr. Werner von Braun and Dr. Harold P. Kluge, of NASA's Ames Research Center.

Mini-bike Sales and Accidents Zoom...Zoom...Zoom



This boy is doing a "wheelie." When you do this, the front wheel comes off the ground. It can be dangerous if you don't know what you are doing.

According to the National Safety Council, more than two million mini-bikes will be in use by the end of 1973, and most of them will be ridden by children from the ages of 10 to 14. The thrill of riding, its light weight and low cost are three reasons why the mini-bike is so popular. Along with the increase in sales goes the increase in mini-bike accidents. It is estimated that over 75,000 children will be hurt this year alone.

Where to Ride?
Mini-bikes cannot be ridden on streets, highways, sidewalks or on any public road. An owner may ride on his own property or on private property, with permission. Many accidents happen when mini-bikers illegally take to the highways.

The Cycle Park
Some cities are solving the "where-to-ride" problem by setting aside areas of land as supervised cycle park. Hazards are removed and trails cleared. Special areas are reserved for beginners. Owners carry their bikes to the park in cars or trucks.

Park Rules
Each rider must be wearing protective clothing. His bike must pass a safety inspection. Riders must register and receive a number that must be displayed on their helmets. Parents must sign permission slips. Mini-bikers must agree to abide by strict rules. Racing and horseplay are not allowed.

Mini-bike Safety
Places to ride, such as cycle parks, might help the mini-bike space problem. But, most important of all, the rider must realize that a mini-bike is not a toy. He has to be old enough and responsible enough to handle it. Mini-biking is not child's play. It should be taken seriously. A rider must know what he is doing if he is to get where he is going.

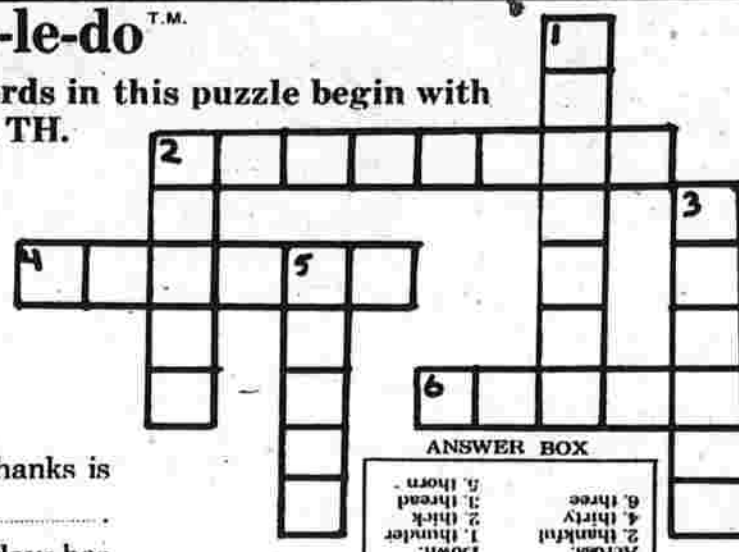

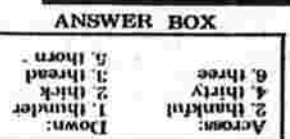

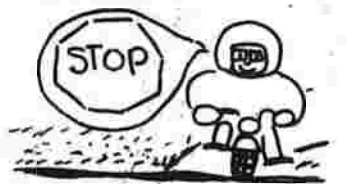

Mini Experiment: How Plants Drink

What you'll need:

- fresh celery stalk with leaves
- a small glass
- ink

What you do:

Step 1. Pour some ink into the glass.

Step 2. Put the cut end of the celery stalk into the ink. Wait for about one hour. Look at the leaves. What do you see? How did it get that way?



Answer:

If you will break the celery stalk in half you will find that there are many little tubes running from the bottom of the stalk to the top. They are full of ink. These little tubes carried the ink to the leaves. There are these kinds of tubes in the biggest trees. Water climbs from the soil to the leaves at the tops of trees through miles of these tiny tubes.

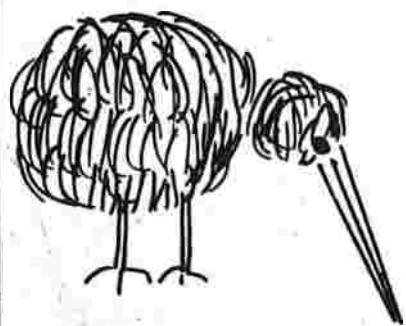
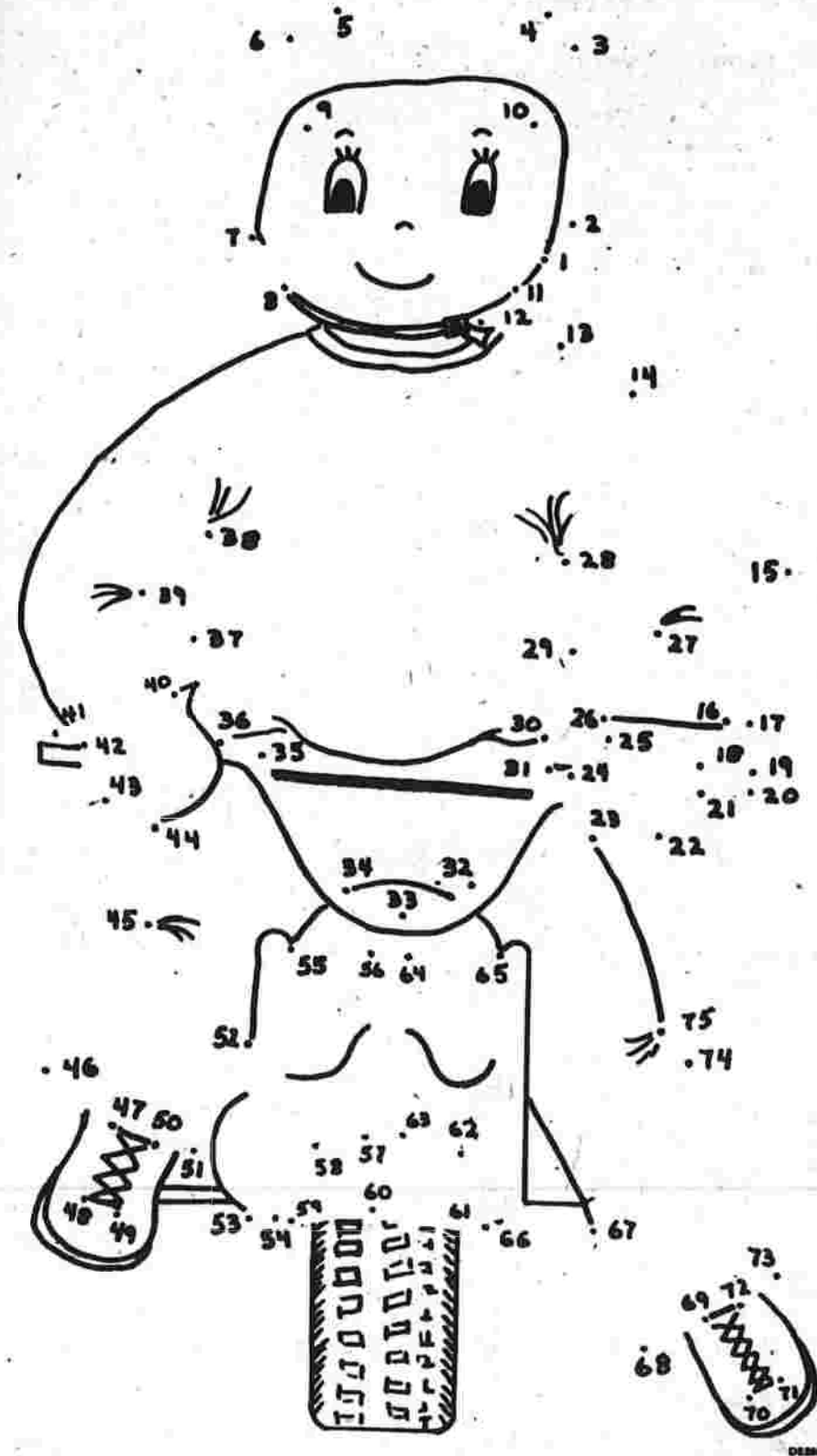

Famous Painting: "Soap Bubbles"

Do you like to blow soap bubbles? People 200 years ago did, too. The French painter Chardin painted at least seven pictures of boys blowing bubbles. Note the triangle formed by the top of the boy's head and his folded arms.

Jean-Baptiste-Simeon Chardin had little formal training. He won his fame as a still life painter. He painted "genre" scenes (scenes of everyday life). He is thought to be one of the finest painters of the eighteenth century.



Animal of the Week: The Kiwi
