# Nixon Meets The Press

of President Richard Nixon's Watergate press conference was not unexpected.

First, there is the expected obvious reaction along partisan lines that follows any presidential statement on any subject.

In view of the enormity of the Watergate scandal - it is almost obsession with too many people - we think the President handled himself extremely well.

Granted he perhaps did not answer some of the questions as explicitly as some would have liked; but on the other hand his questioners, as he pointed out, were rather narrow in their range of questioning by ignoring non-Watergate issues such as inflation, foreign policy, and the many vital bills now before the Congress.

It is our impression from the statements made by some Nixon critics is that what they want is not a press conference by the President but a public confession.

Our own Sen. Lowell Weicker seems to think the members of the press should have functioned as Special

In assessing the criticism in the light of the sources, we feel the President handled the matter extremely well in the context of the issue before the courts on executive privilege and the fact the Senate committee and grand juries are still in the process of interviewing people who may or may not be criminally involved in the scan-

ject will never be completely acceptable to all of his critics.

#### Today's Thought Presidential War Power

Next to the head-on clash between Congress and President Nixon over the Watergate tapes, the question of "war power" is the most crucial constitutional dilemma facing the nation at the present time.

The Constitution is clear about who may declare war. That is up to the Congress of the United States. But who may "make war"? The president, as commander in chief? Or it that, too, the prerogative of the legislative branch?

According to Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., the staunchest advocate on his side of the controversy, the answer is the president. Historical precedent tends to back him up. By his compilation, U.S. military

forces have been engaged in hostilities abroad - without a declaration of war - at least 199 times. Almost half of these military actions lasted more than a month and some 103 of them took place outside this hemisphere.

Moreover, recalls Goldwater, the Constitutional Convention of 1787 rejected a clause giving Congress the power "to make war" and substituted for it only the power "to declare war." From brief records of the debate, he says, it is quite clear that the framers at least had a purpose of "leaving to the Executive the power to repel sudden attacks."

There is agreement on the latter point from the other side. But says Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman, D-N.Y., "after careful study of the Constitution, I have concluded that the President lacks the power to begin or carry on a war without congressional approval for even one day, except in an emergency to repel an attack on this country. Nor should he have that

Rep Holtzman, who led an unsuccessful attempt to have the Supreme Court halt U.S. bombing in Cambodia before the congressionally ordered cut-off date of Aug. 15, voted against the House version of a war powers bill. This bill would terminate hostilities in 120 days unless the president received specific congressional

A Senate bill, sponsored by Sen. Jacob Javits, D-N.Y., passed in 1972 and again in 1973, would set a deadline of 30 days. Numerous critics of both bills argue


that rather than curbing presidential power in this area and hopefully preventing repetitions of the Vietnam and Cambodian experiences, simply attempting to "codify" the situations in which a president could plunge the country into a war would actually encourage more presidential military adventures.

To one observer, behind all the rhetoric seems to be an attempt to rewrite history by absolving Congress of any blame for Vietnam. But is is difficult to find any point in the long and sorry history of Vietnam where either bill would have made any difference. The Senate did, in effect, sanction this country's involvement with the Tonkin Gulf Resolution in

1964 by a vote of 88-2. The entire question may be academic in view of President Nixon's threatened veto of whatever compromise bill Congress finally passes. Yet in the wake of the Watergate-inspired reaction against the growth of presidential power, there is an outside chance that a veto could be overridden.

This may be another case where constitutional vagueness is the least of all conceivable evils.

Again, except in the event of an actual or impending attack against the United States (which no one argues about) no president should have the power to make war without answering to Congress and the nation - not in 120 days, not in 30 days, but instantly.

SIMSBURY (AP) - Connecticut's new environment chief has accused the American auto industry of being "utterly lax" in trying to solve air pollution

In only eight months the in-dustry was able to convert from peacetime to wartime operations in the 1940s, Douglas M. Costle said Friday.

'My question is where the hell are they today?" years after auto emissions became a recognized hazard, the 34-yearold California native said in an interview.

Costle, who was acting commissioner of the state Department of Environmental Protection since July 1, after the resignation of Dan W. Lufkin, was named commissioner by Gov. Thomas J. Meskill Friday. He serves at Meskill's pleasure. Besides blasting auto makers, Costle praised the response of Connecticut industry to pollution problems and portrayed the state as a national leader in the struggle

to preserve the environment. Costle, who was deputy commissioner of the department since January 1972, said "it would be easy" to blame pollution problems on industry, "but that's not entirely fair...people have to realize that we're all polluters, each in our own way, and our own assertion that we have to have our own steel box to drive to and from work in."

The American consumer is limited in his choice of cars and "it's an exercise in market absurdity" to say he can win the auto pollution battle alone, Cos-

He added that auto makers "have a lock on the market" and have been dragging their feet in reducing pollution from

their products. 'We're going to see across the country the federal government imposing transportation controls, saying essentially you have to limit the mobility of automobiles. So far, Connecticut has escaped the necessity of having to go to such extreme measures. But I don't preclude that for the future," the graduate of Harvard University and the University of Chicago

Law School said. Pollution from other sources being attacked successfully in Connecticut, Costle said.
