Aillon clenched his hands and shook his head several-times after the three guilty verdicts were announced by foreman William May Sr., a telephone technician from Milford. Aillon said nothing that could be heard from the press section.



### Storm Causes Outages

High winds and heavy rains hit Manchester Friday night causing power outages across town. Over 700 residents were without power in town at some time during the night, but all power, with the exception of a small area at Bissell and Spruce Sts. was restored by morning, according to Thomas Brennan, a spokesman for the Hartford Electric Light Co. Although some of the outages

were caused by power transformers being struck by lightning, the major part of the blackouts were caused by downed wires, either blown down by winds or hit with falling trees and limbs.

The National Weather Service at Windsor Locks said that the storm began at approximately 7:30 p.m. and dumped 1.72 inches of rain on the state before ending at 9:45. The weather service also said that there was an unconfirmed report of hail falling in Manchester.

A few minor accidents were reported on major highways surrounding Manchester, State Police said, but most were caused by slippery road conditions and no injuries or arrests were reported.

The Town Fire Department reported that they received about 20 calls between 8:30 and 12:35 Friday night, mainly

aow ned trees and oles, downed wires, burning transformers and poles, and some flooding in the Parkade area.

Firemen report that WINF radio at the Manchester Shopping Parkade was flooded when **Bigelow Brook overflowed its** banks.

The storm was caused by the moving of a "warm, humid air mass/' into the state, according to the National Weather Service, which issued "severe thunderstorm warnings, across the state.

Police said that "every alarm in Town went off" due to the power loss. Police explained that most burglar alarms are wired to go off if the power is shut off, to protect the store if burglars cut the alarms power lead.

The Town Fire Department said that two box alarms were triggered by the lightning. Police said that the HELCO power transformer on Olcott St. was knocked-out by lightning during the storm, but HELCO officials were unable to confirm the statment.

Local and area police said that there were few or no accidents in the area last night and said that it had been a 'quiet evening.

Manchester Police said that emergency power was used in the station for a short time last night but power was soon restored.

## **Manchester** Water Works Anniversary

Today is an important anniversary for the Town of Manchester.

Exactly 40 years to the day, the town purchased the South Manchester Water Co. from Cheney Bros., for the then staggering sum of \$1 million. The water system included Porter Reservoir, built in 1892; Howard Reservoir, built in 1902; and Roaring Brook Reservoir, built in 1925; plus 49 miles of various size pipes, and 287 water hydrants.

To sweeten the pot and to make the \$1 million sale price more inviting, the Cheneys threw in 515 acres of land in Manchester, 149 in Bolton and 1,930 in Glastonbury. The small Roaring Brook Reservoir is on the Glastonbury acreage.

Adding \$150,000, the town purchased the sewage system, also operated in the south end of town by the Cheneys. To finance the \$1,150,000 combined /became suprerintendent. He was purchase, the town assumed \$500,000 in old bonds sold by Cheney Bros. in a 1924 issue and sold an additional \$650,-000 in bonds in a 40-year issue. The 1924 Cheney Bros. bonds fell due in 1954 and were re-issued by the town, to 1974.

The last \$4,000 payment of the \$650,-000 in bonds sold in 1933 was made today. The last payment of the \$500,000 bond issue assumed from Cheney Bros. falls due Sept. 1, 1974. In 1956, the town-purchased from . Cheney Bros. its last water holdings -the Globe Hollow Reservoir, the 1,000-acre Globe Hollow Tract, the Cooper Hill Treatment Plant and many additional miles of pipe. It was at this point that Cheney Bros. went out of the water-supply business and became a town water customer. The 1956 purchase was considered a bargain at \$1,250,000.


Manchester's first superintendent of water and sewers was Fred Parker, who had been Cheney's superintendent and who was hired by the town in 1933. He retired in 1947, when Manchester adopted the councilmanager form of government. George Waddell, the first town manager, followed by Fred Thrall, Lawrence Wittkofske, Graydon Lockwood, William O'Neill and Jay Giles, the present superintendent.

Parker and Waddell are deceased. Lockwood is retired. Thrall works for the privately owned Manchester Water Co. Wittkofske and O'Neill work for Fuss & Griswold.

## Canadian Trains Rolling

TORONTO (AP) - The last oldout union in the Canadian rail strike ordered its members to return to work Monday night in compliance with Parliament's Sback-to-work egislation. But there were reports of resistance to the order from several locals.

Some workers reportedly continued to man picket lines in Vancouver, Thunder Bay, Ont., and Winnigeg, which remained a roadblock to transcontinental reight and passenger trains. In British Columbia, the country's westernmost province, rail traffic remained at a standstill.

D. N. Secord, president of the 18,000-member Canadian Brotherhood of Railway,

Transport and General Workers, said 96 of 120 union locals voted to obey the back-towork legislation. The law was passed Saturday by Parliament, which enacted similar laws to deal with rail strikes in 1950 and 1966.

Secord said, "Our members go back reluctantly, aware that heir fight for a fair settlement has once again been crushed by the combined forces of Parliament and the railway companies."

Trains rolled in the eastern provinces, and East Coast ferries went back into service during the weekend after the nineday national strike.

On the prairies, the Canadian National railway reported that operations west of Winnipeg had returned to normal and grain trains were being assembled.


