Medical authorities fear that many of the nations children are underimmunized because of the complacency of the past years which has seen dreaded polio reduced from its former epidemic proportions to 30 cases per year, although 20 of those were

Diphtheria, whooping cough, measles and other contagious diseases have also been contained.

Estimates by the Center for Disease Control indicate that as much as 30 per cent of the children in affluent suburban homes have not been properly immunized against polio. And the percentage runs much higher in city core children.

Disease with less dramatic results than polio such as rubella, measles, diptheria, whooping cough, etc., are also being slighted, the center fears. Rubella, in expectant mothers, particularly, is virulent because of it's

affect on unborn children. School registration procedures usually provide that the child's parents must produce proof of imdiseases. Oddly enough, smallpox vaccinations are not usually required since health authorities feel that the disease is now so rare that it is not


