Gardening
with **FRANK ATWOOD**

John Searchuk of Coventry, agronomist at the University of Connecticut, is interested professionally in plants. His hobby interest is history. He is combining the two interests in a collection of color slides and information on European plants brought to the American colonies by the first European settlers.
Mr. Searchuk has recently returned from a visit to Europe, his first since an involuntary trip to southern France as a member of the U.S. Army during World War II. His is on a six month sabbatical, and spent three weeks in Europe, traveling alone and seeing as many famous gardens as he could reach in a limited time. He spent his time in Sweden, Denmark, France, the Netherlands and England.
He was fascinated by the formal "parterres," or clipped hedge gardens at the French chateau of Villandry in the Loire valley, south and west of Paris where kings and their great lords built country palaces during several centuries before the French Revolution put an end to this style of life.
Most of the great chateaux are owned now by the government, but Villandry is privately owned. A visitor pays a fee to get in, and he sees in the garden, not the inside of the castle, but it is easy to imagine that the fees fall short of compensating the owner for the wages he must pay a gang of gardeners.
The clipped hedges, laid out in geometrical patterns, cover acres. You look down on them from the top of a high walk along one side. It is an excellent vantage point. You see the entire plan of this great garden, laid out, one must think, by an engineer. The hedges form squares and triangles. The lines are straight and the corners sharp.
No Weeds Allowed
The walks between the hedges are a coarse sand or a fine gravel, where no weed is ever allowed to appear. Inside the squares of hedge are fanciful figures also of clipped boxwood. Our picture shows one of four squares devoted to the subject of love. This one is "passionate love," with four hearts in a symmetrical design. Another has daggers and knives, indicating "dangerous love." One has fans and butterflies for frivolous love and the fourth is a puzzling maze which you are told stands for foolish love.
The taller plants, clipped in spool shapes, are yews. The areas inside the hearts are flower beds which are planted with tulips in the spring and other seasonal flowers later.
The kitchen garden, outside the range of the camera, is also planted in neat squares with a block of green carrot tops contrasting, for example, with a block of red beet leaves. On a higher level is the water garden, a pond made in the shape of a Louis XV looking glass.
It is all very grand, all built for show, a place where the lord of the manor could entertain his aristocratic friends. The garden is also very old, first laid out in 1532. One gathers that as the estate passed from one owner to another, there were times when it was allowed to deteriorate until the latest reconstruction by the late Joachim Carvalho who bought the property in 1906.
When my wife and I visited Villandry and other chateaux along the Loire in 1967 we were accompanied by our daughter, Christine, and her husband, George W. Mulford. George was then a graduate student and is now a teacher of French language and literature. Although no guide was furnished, he got essential information from a French-speaking visitor who happened to be there with us.

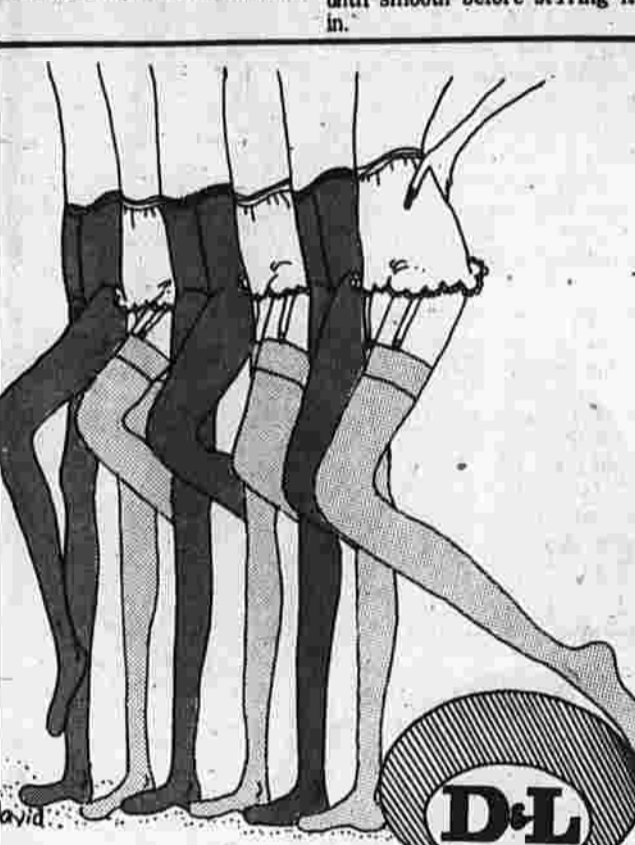
Newcomers Club members will be on hand to discuss club activities, and pamphlets on yoga and bridge will be displayed.

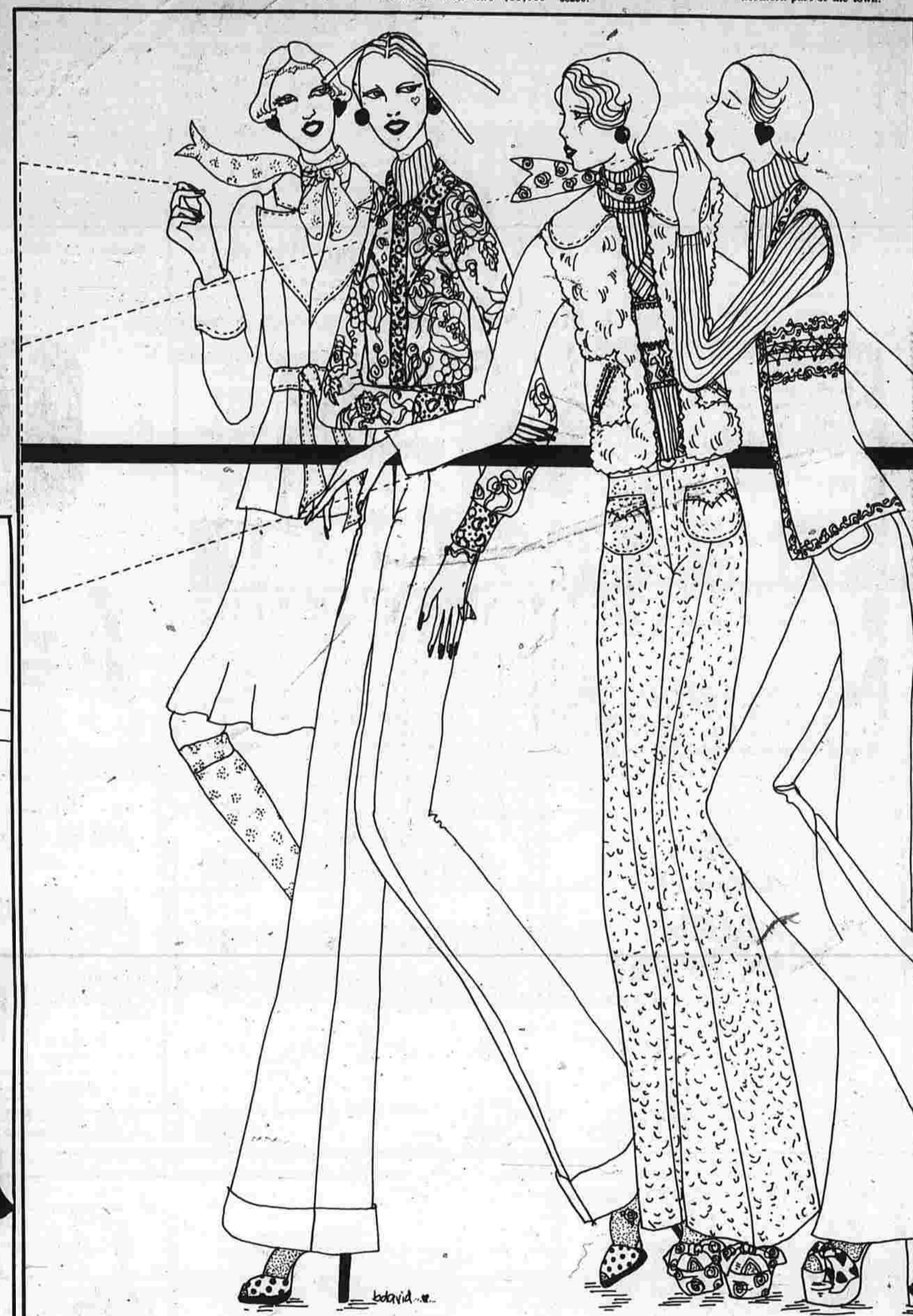
Milford Man Wins Top Lottery Prize

Towns Clear Tornado's Debris

(Continued from Page One)

by the town crews. I can only say, "They were wonderful!"

He added all debris left by homemakers and businesses at curbs is being picked up by town crews and taken to the landfill area.

With the exception of a few isolated areas, the 3,900 HELCO customers who were without service due to yesterday's storm had service restored sometime by 6 last night, Ray Norman, HELCO's district manager, said today.

The customers were in the area of N. Main St., to Tolland Tpk., and the Oakland St. area where the storm cut its path. Norman said at some time or other most all customers in the northern section of town were affected and without power for short times.

He said calls started to come in about 10:15 a.m. That was before the high winds hit the section. All of the customers had service by 4 a.m. today.

Norman said 15 crews were working in Manchester and five or six in the East Hartford area. He said Manchester had what would be classified as 18 outage areas.

John Hultine of SNETCO said there were still about 155 telephone customers out this morning. He said crews from Hartford and Windsor Locks are helping the local crews in the cleanup work. "The crews," Hultine said, "will work through the day and through the weekend, if necessary, to restore service to all customers as soon as possible."

He said what hinders the crews is the branches blown onto the wires. He said this was the cause of the service

outage, in most cases. There were some poles down also, he said.

Eighth District Fire Department dispatcher Rick Skooglund, telling what a tornado looks and sounds like, said it occurred about 11:05, when an Eighth District fire crew was returning from an unrelated fire call — to put out a fire in a transformer at Parker St. and Colonial Rd.

"We were just about to gas up the truck," he said, "when we heard a roar coming from the vicinity of Buckland. The roar grew louder and louder. We looked up and saw a dark mass moving at tree-top level. We quickly got back into the truck and drove back into the firehouse."

"Five minutes later, we got a call — telling us about a tobacco fire in a Haas Tobacco Co. curing shed."

Frank Mordavsky, the district's first assistant fire chief, was in charge of the Buckland fire operations.

"At first, we couldn't even get near the area," he said. "A tree was blocking N. Main St. at McCabe St. We turned around and went up Union St. A tree down blocked our way again. We turned around again to N. Main St., traveled over a lawn around the downed tree, then back to Hilliard St. and Buckland that way."

He said the fire occurred when the tornado blew the tobacco shed down onto two propane tanks being used to cure the tobacco. He said the relief valves on the tanks blew. The shed and tobacco were a total loss. However, the firefighters saved four other sheds, by turning off the propane tanks.

"Otherwise, we would have had a

lot more toasted tobacco there," he said.

Mordavsky praised the 23 volunteer firemen who helped fight the fire, and the crew from East Hartford that helped lay about 20,000 feet of hose. He thanked units of the Town Fire Department for standing by in district headquarters while the district's men and four trucks fought the blaze.

He said of his volunteers, "I'd say they did a fine job as a team. They worked hard and they knew it, and I don't mean only at the fire. I mean in helping in all kinds of tasks during the emergency."

One of their tasks occurred just after nighttime, when they went to the Colonial Rd. pumping station of the Manchester Water Co. to pump water from the company's reservoir system into its pressure system. The operation was necessary for supplying water to residents of the Forest Hills area and to the Crestfield Convalescent Home.

One of their other tasks was to give assistance to residents of Rachel Rd. and Tudor Lane.

Mordavsky and Skooglund both had the same observation — that it was a miracle nobody was hurt seriously.

At the height of the storm, lumber stacked in the Glenny Lumber Yard was observed being blown in all directions, helter-skelter — some of it landing on cars of employees.

A chain-link fence from the lumber yard was found twisted out of shape on Golway St. North St. and N. School Sts. also suffered considerable damage, losing many trees whose

aggregate age is many hundreds of years.

State highway crews and vehicles were out in force on N. Main St., Oakland Sts. and Tolland Tpk., all part of the state's Rt. 83. They cut those branches and trees that were dangling, hanging and leaning, and carted away the debris.

Yesterday's wind and rain orgy left a trail of twisted street lamps, ripped rooftops, uprooted trees, and debris.

This morning's clear skies and comfortable temperatures found Manchester's North End residents raking lawns, cleaning windows (that weren't blown out), and generally putting right all that was in disarray.

Businessmen were cleaning up their stockrooms and taking inventory of damaged goods.

Street and town highway crews, utility crews, were repairing downed power lines and clearing trees and branches from private and public properties.

At S & S Buick, Inc., on Adams St., the tornado force wind blew down several large trees along the edge of the parking lot. Several parked cars suffered severe damage as a result.

Two new cars ready for delivery, one a 1973 and the other a 1974, were only slightly damaged, said Bernard Conroy, sales manager, and can easily be repaired.

Three company cars were totaled. A large tree had fallen across all three cars denting the roofs so badly that they were almost equal with the car floors.

Two employees' cars were also damaged by fallen trees. One is declared a total loss.

other employees gathered inside the center of the garage. Moments later the windows shattered, and most of the ceiling sections were blown loose from within the salesroom area.

Melling said the most frightening experience was when he watched a truck trailer with 500 tires tip way over, "almost a 90 degree angle," and then right itself after teetering a few times.

At the Oakwood Apartment complex on Tudor Lane off Oakland St., amid the roof-torn apartments and debris scattered lawns, Miss Kay Rellly of 117L on her balcony was washing the sliding glass doors assisted by a friend. Miss Rellly was preparing a load of clothes to take to the laundry just before the storm reached its peak.

"I noticed that the sky was getting very dark and it was windy, but I thought it was just an ordinary storm," she said. "Then I heard an awful roar — like several airplanes." Her friend said it sounded like a freight train running close by. Then

Miss Rellly noticed the porch furniture on the balcony blowing from one end of the balcony to the other, and finally the wind just took the furniture out in the air. They had recovered a couple of chairs this morning and had them soaking in the bathtub, Miss Rellly said.

Miss Rellly was one of the lucky

At the Caldor Automotive Center at Burr Corners, the surging wind did about \$5,000 damage, according to Tom Melling, part owner and manager.

The seven large windows that were blown out were replaced within four hours, said Melling. He described the force which hit the large key holder on the service counter as being so strong that the keys were blown all over the plaza parking lot — "some as far as Everybody's Supermarket," at the opposite end of the plaza.

"Like schrapnel," he said. "We even found keys embedded in oil cans and metal bins," he said.

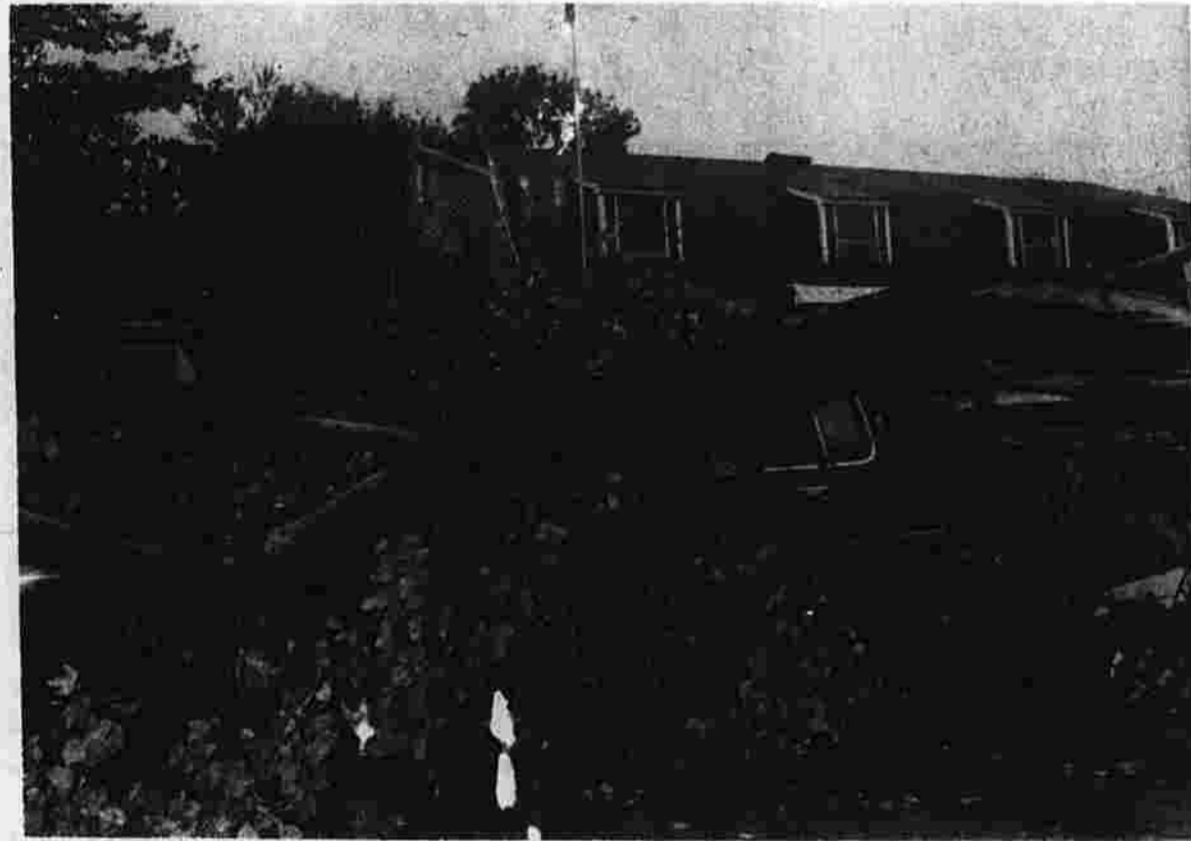

Melling described the beginning of the worst part of the storm as a "whistling noise on the roof." Then, he said, he noticed the large windows buckling and that was when he and the

Roofless House on Taylor St.

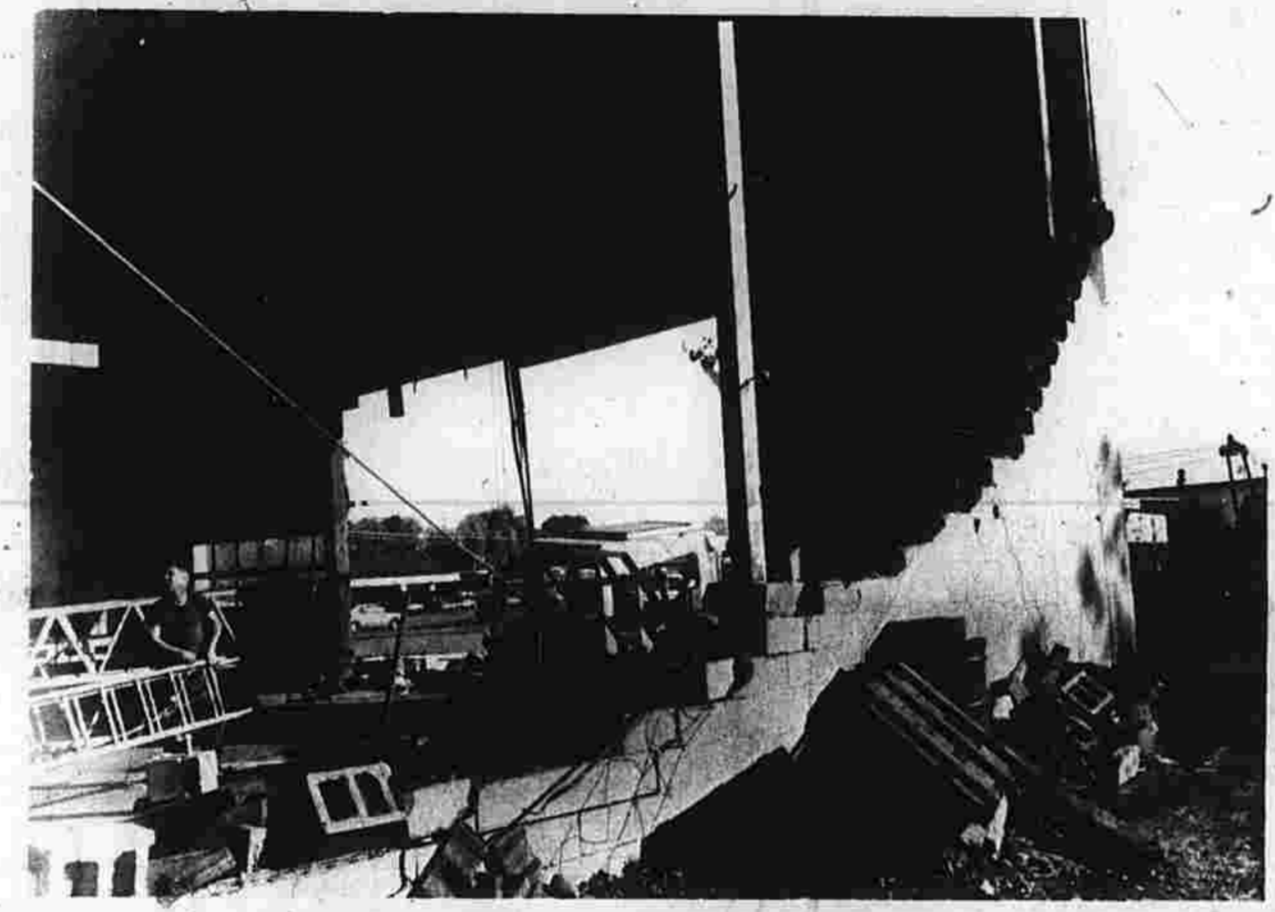

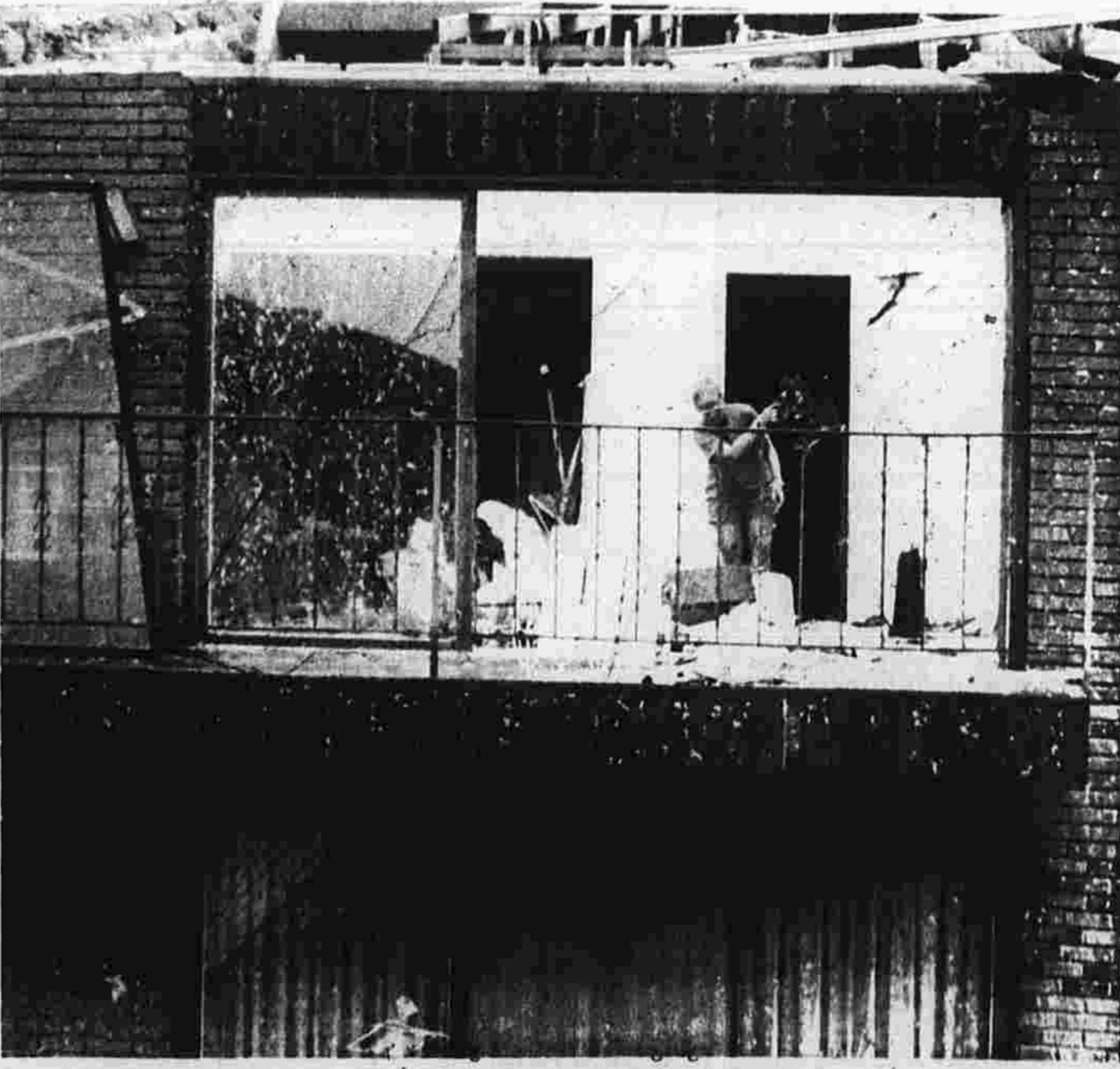

MHA Considers Raising Housing Income Limits

The Manchester Housing Authority (MHA) is studying the possibility of raising income limits for residents of its 275 units — an eligibility requirement for occupancy. An increase is being recommended by HUD (the federal Housing and Urban Development) as one means of raising rents to a more realistic level. Rents are based on a formula which takes the income limits into consideration. The MHA, in the spring, found itself short of funds to finish the fiscal year in the black and was ready to ask the Board of Directors for an appropriation, to erase the anticipated deficit. However, it weathered the storm and didn't have to ask for funds.

Vernon Walks Unfinished Police Aid Students

The town's sidewalk installation program in Vernon, designed to allow more children to walk to schools, is not yet complete because of getting rentals when vacancies occur. Estimates are that the list is sufficient to fill vacancies in the next 24 months and that raises in rents would have little impact for an equal period of time.

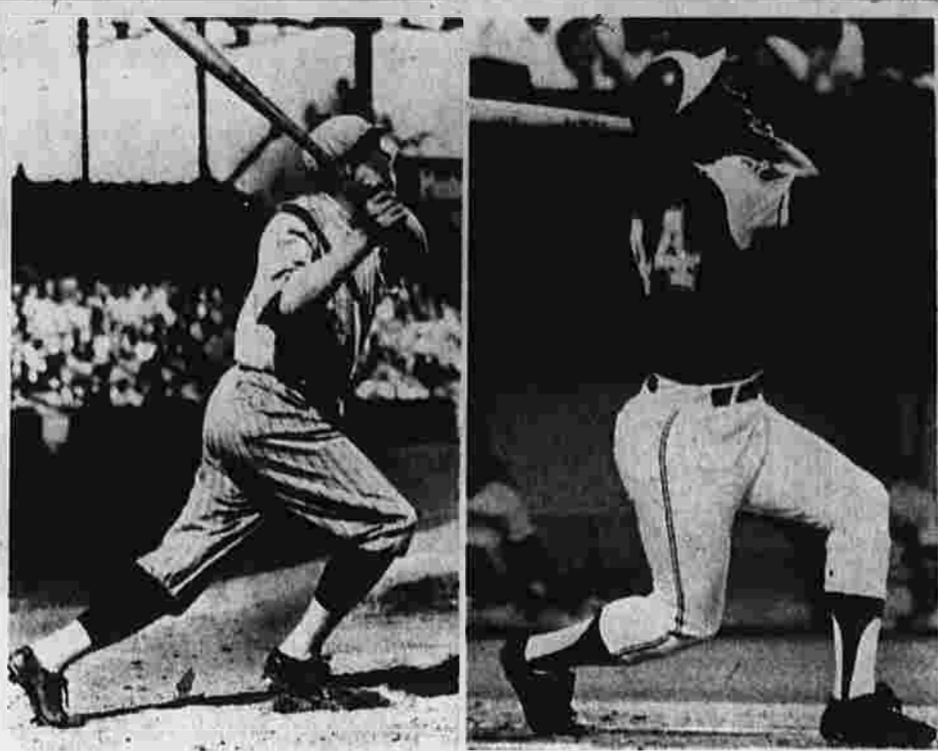
