Saccuzzo, there will be five hases to the program. Phase I would have each sixth grade class, as part of their

social studies program, being responsible for making an inepth study of at least two thnic groups of their choice. Particular emphasis would be made on the cultural impact these groups have had on the American way of life.

Under Phase II, each class, through their representative on a planning committee, would be responsible for arranging for peakers representing their hosen ethnic groups to speak at an auditorium program for the combined sixth grade

The third phase would have each participating class being esponsible for putting on a program which would portray cultural or other contributions of their chosen ethnic groups to our way of life.

Phase IV would cover field trips for small groups of selected students and Phase V would be an essay contest based on the need to eliminate racial prejudice.

Planning

A committee composed of one six grade teacher, one parent and four sixth grade students, one from each class, plus the principal, would arrange for the speakers and the field trips and would oversee the operation of the program.

One of the tastiest recipes I have encountered in the past year is Sicilian Beef Roll. It is eally "one spicy meatball" One of my teen-age children asked what my latest venture would be when I unwrapped the ground beef. "I'm going to stuff it," I replied. Next, I unwrapped the boiled ham and mozzarella cheese. They ought it was a put-on.

The beef is mixed with garlic, herbs, etc., then rolled up and baked in the oven with the ham and cheese inside. It's excellent erved hot and superb eaten cold. On a hot night, it's a pleasant surprise served with a nice crisp salad or fresh tomatoes. The recipe calls for "soft" bread crumbs. You won't find these in boxes at the store. Tax To Cool Economy Chilled By Congressmen

der consideration, Laird said the proposal was to impose a surcharge, probably of 10 per cent, so that a person who normally paid \$1,000 in taxes would pay \$1,100 instead. The extra \$100 would be refunded in two to five years, after inflation abated. "This is not the same as a tax increase," Laird argued, holding the plan would not violate Nixon's pledge against increasing taxes.

But most representatives and senators who commented didn't see it that way. "It looks like a trial balloon they are already backing away from," said Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., acting chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee

Throughout last year's campaign, Nixon promised spending control policies that would avoid the need to raise taxes. He said, for example, in an Oct. 7, 1972, radio speech, "America needs not a tax increase, but tax relief."

In his message to Congress last Monday Nixon said, "This administration continues its strong opposition to a tax increase."
