





Defense Department spokesmen inform Congress that the nation's military forces are in good shape, that they have all the weapons they will need for the foreseeable future, that there are no ominous Soviet developments on the horizon and yes, gentlemen, there is a good deal of fat that could be trimmed off the defense establishment - if that day should ever come, we will know that President Nixon's promised "generation of peace" has truly arrived.

Yet despite the ending of the Vietnam war, all the talk of detente and rapprochement between East and West and hopes for the SALT disarmament negotiations, one would think we/ were still in the dark, early days of the Cold War when the Communist threat to world peace and freedom was first perceived.

Melvin ("Gloom-and-Doom") Laird is no longer secretary of defense, but the new secretary, James R. Schlesinger, has effectively caught up the banner of national security and rapped it across the knucks of congressional budget-cutters, whom he follies" that would dismantle the nation's defenses.







Finesse Works

The finesse succeeded, and declarer took the ace of diamonds and the rest of the suit. This gave South ten tricks, and he scored game and rubber with an unspoken vote of thanks to West.

There would be no game or rubber if West simply played a low diamond on the first round of that suit. Dummy could win, or South could let the nine of diamonds hold the trick. Then West would be ready to play the queen of diamonds on the next round of the suit. Declarer

would take two diamond tricks — but no more. West's remaining picture card would act as a barrier against the rest of the suit.


luring the meal on the ever fruitfulness of good deed

In February of this year, Congress appointed a special committee to look into the illegal, improper and unethical conduct which is said to have taken place in the presidential campaign of 1972.

The committee has the power to investigate three things: the Watergate scandal, the "dirty trick" charges for all 1972 presidential campaigns and the collection and use of campaign funds.

The Committee must report back to Congress by February 28, 1974. It will only make suggestions and recommendations. It will not write any laws. This will be left to other committees.

The Mini Page talked with the vice-chairman of the committee, Senator Howard Baker of Tennesse.

Senator Baker feels that this public fault finding has shown the strength of the American government. 




