



### Tax Idea May Have Merit

It has been rumored that politicians, especially those in the White House, should be made to file flight plans for their trial balloons. Trial balloons, as you know, are

feelers put out to test public or Congressional reaction to a proposal "under study but upon which no final decision has been made."

In other words, the political winds are tested before a decision is made to go ahead with an idea, regardless of its merit.

It is a common practice and from a political point of view probably quite valid for nothing is more damaging to political ego, or fortunes, than to have too many proposals shot down before they even get off the ground.

The latest case in point is President Nixon's proposal via his front man, Melvin Laird, to impose a special 10 per cent income tax surcharge to help battle inflation. The idea is that these surcharge funds would be set aside and rebated to the taxpayer at some later date.

With federal tax income (individual and corporate income) about \$150 billion plus annually, 10 per cent would take about \$15 billion out of the economy. Obviously, to be antiinflationary, this must not be reintroduced into the economy via federal expenditures.

The plan, if it is to work, must actually set aside the surcharge collections and rebate them at a later date to the taxpayer.

The plan might be economically sound but politically, as already evidenced by Congressional reaction, it is too radical and too precedent setting for modern American political practicioners.

While the Old Testament suggested the Israelites fill their granaries in fat years to have something in store for the lean ones, this hasn't found favor in modern political circles and in essence this is what the Nixon proposal would have us do.

Right now we are in an inflationary spiral because anyway you slice it, chew it, grind it, or season it, there is too much money in the hands of the consumers to buy goods and services which are available.

The surcharge is one possible way to pare away some of this "fat" money in consumer purses for the lean years ahead which many economists already see in their cloudy crystal balls.

But unfortunately, however much trust we may have in our political leaders when it comes to many other things, this trust, we are afraid, doesn't embrace a taxpayer "savings account" of possibly \$50 to \$100 billion if the inflation control program required the surcharge to be continued for several years.

For it is sad to say that in political life today the existence of such funds in any amount would be a temptation that neither Congress or our bureaucracy could resist.

We believe the President's plan to keep the surcharge accumulations in a trust for rebate at some future time might be an innovative and sensible approach to the problem of reducing the money supply, or quickly increasing it should the economy cool too quickly, but alas it is doomed.

It is, we fear, another instance where economic common sense must take a back seat to political considerations so that instead of American taxpayers being "taxed" in a sense to fill granaries for the future we will continue to have what we are earning and whatever we can save voluntarily, of course, eroded five to ten per cent or more each year because of inflation.

For this reason we hope this latest trial balloon will be patched up quickly and given another chance. The proposal has too much merit to be deflated so soon without full administration and Congressional study of its merits and potentials.
