### Our Constitution

As the 1973 observance of Constitution Week draws to a close, we cannot help but be aware of the importance of this document drafted so many decades ago and how it has endured through the years in making America the oldest continuous modern

Today, particularly, we are aware of it because of the challenges in the courts over the document's separation of powers doctrine which established the co-equality of the executive, legislative and judicial branches.

In the light of recent events in Chile we, as Americans, can trully appreciate the wisdom of our forefathers who drafted the Constitution. The so-called "constitutional crisis" over the Watergate matter, for example, is being resolved by due process as defined in the Constitution and its first ten amendments, the Bill of Rights, and not by a military coup or some other form of violent change in our form of government.

While the Constitution was written many years ago, it was not a final document as its amendments over the years attest but a living document which the people can change to meet changing times if they so desire.

It was back in 1862 that Congress

It is in this respect that the Constitution of the United States is unique. It is not a basis for power of the state or its agencies but delegation of certain powers to the state to be used in certain ways, subject always to

The keystone today is the same as it was when it was drafted - whatever power not given government is reserved to the people.

Today, in these times of constitutional debate over interpretations of some of its sections, this reservation of power by the people should be remembered not only by the man on the street but by those engaged directly in disputes.

Presidential, legislative and judicial rights exist by the will and wish of the people, not to those whom we have, through our constitutional processes, delegated these rights in order to have a democratic form of

Screaming, delirious womens libbers lit up more brightly than he rocket-shooting Astrodome scoreboard Thursday night when Mrs. King showed the devastating swiftness that won her five Wimbledon titles in defeating self-proclaimed male chauvinist Riggs, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3 in the internationally televised battle of the

sexes tennis extravaganza.
"Bobby Riggs has just been flushed down the toilet," shouted omen's pro tour member Madeliene Regal of Sweden after Mrs. King's straight sets victory before 30,472 Astrodome fans and ns more TV viewers.

Mrs. King, one of the most decorated warriors for equal women's rights on the pro tennis circuit, said she had waited 18 years for this match with Riggs. "Ever since the day when I was 11 years old and wasn't allowed

in a photo because I didn't have a tennis skirt on, I knew then that wanted to change the sport," the 29-year-old Mrs. King said. Riggs, who claimed he would set women's tennis back 20 years against Billie Jean, looked every bit his age after the match.




