

Is A Vice President Needed?

While the President and vice president are heavily engaged in what might be the battles for their respective political lives, the Democratic National Vice Presidential Committee has been engaging in some lively debate in Boston as to whether the office of vice president should be continued, or if continued, what might be done to make the selection process more than a ticket-balancing political tightrope walking act.

The Democratic concern obviously stems from the unfortunate selection without thorough investigation of Sen. Thomas Eagleton as Sen. George McGovern's original running mate in the last election.

Republicans too should be concerned in the light of the yet-to-be proven but never-the-less politically damaging allegations against Vice President Spiro Agnew.

The sole function of the vice president is to preside over the Senate and be on tap in the event the president suffers death or some disability so he cannot serve.

The discussions in Boston would not leave us without a president if the vice presidency were eliminated. It is the of interest.

One has suggested no vice president and the presidential successor would be elected the Congress as an interim president. A president at the beginning of fils term could designate a temporary successor while Congress

made it up its mind. Another suggested the secretary of state be the successor but as we recall one of the arguments for changing presidential succession the last time was to insure as much as possible that the successor be an elective official

rather than an appointive one. In a lighter vein, this might be termed discriminatory too, since the constitution limits the presidency to native-born Americans and the incumbent Secreatary of State Henry Kissinger, being German-born, is not qualified at least on a constitutional

An alternative to avoid the Eagleton fiasco and Agnew embarrassment was a suggestion that more time be alloted for selecting a vice president and that a committee present conventions with a slate of acceptable (and presumably thoroughly screened) choices from which the successful nominee could pick his running mate.

While we don't expect there will be anything coming out of the discussions, other than possible suggestions which still would have to clear the Congress and be ratified by the states in the form of an amendment to the Constitution; the whole thing does raise an important ques-

Is the American vice presidency, as one commission member phrased it, "a way of tossing a bone to the faction that has lost the nomination," or it is necessary at all?

As with all things of this sort, discussion and debate will continue, perhaps for years, but with today's controversy involving the White House, it could be that changes may tion could solve the problem which every recent president has pledged to do something about but has always failed and that is to expand the duties of the vice president to better prepare him to succeed should it become

Maybe the interim answer would be legally defined functions of importance enough to make selection of the vice president as important as selection of the president.

While almost anyone can be a figurehead, which the vice presidency presently seems to be, the people expect and demand more of a president and his stand-by quarterback should be equally qualified and prepared for the task.
