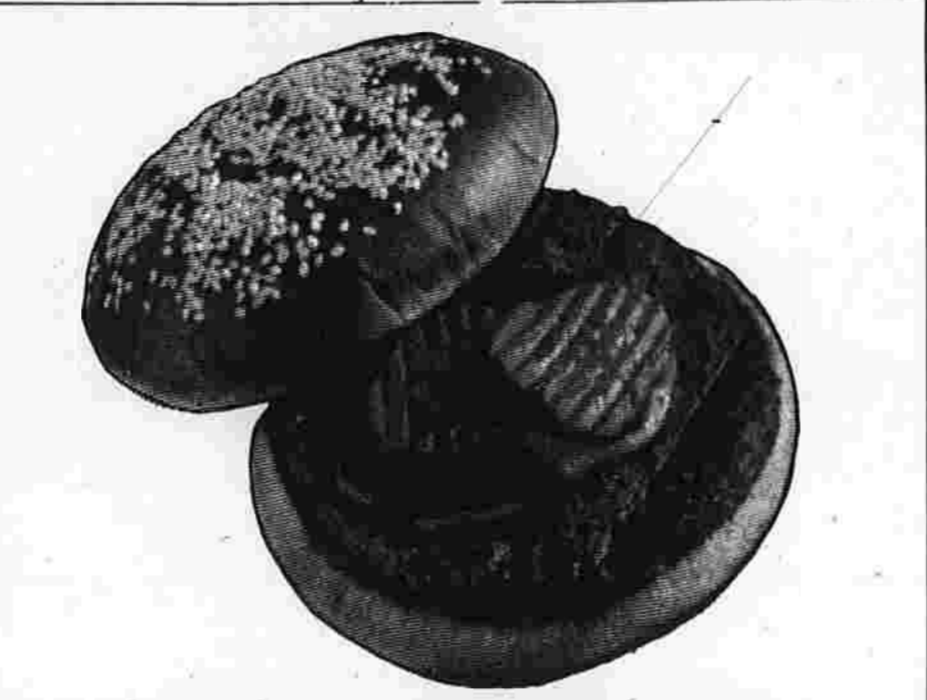

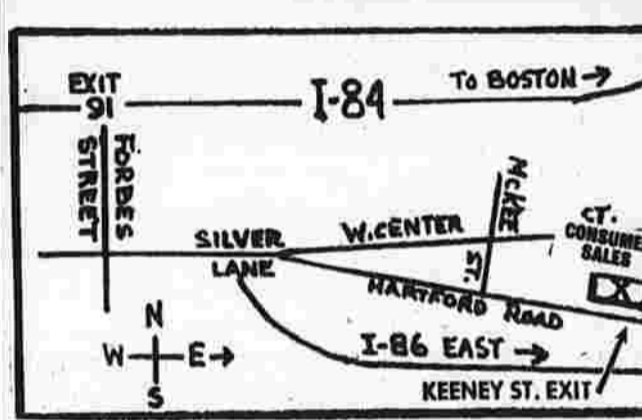

Coventry has an "almost-impossible" climate for growing grapes, says Gandolino Rossi. During the morning hours, on clear days, the sun shines directly on the grapes. They are easy to see, easy to spray if threatened by any disease or insect, and they will be easy to pick when Mr. Rossi decides to harvest them, any day now.

"I thought about this for 30 years before I built it," says Mr. Rossi, "and all it cost me was labor." A friend gave him the steel uprights. The cross members are side pieces from a discarded iron bedstead. Even the grapevine was given him by a friend.

He has had it for seven years,

He thinks, and each fall he has a crop which may be heavy, or light, depending on the spring and summer weather. The crop this year is no better than half what it has been in the best years.

These are Niagara grapes, meant for the table. The textbooks say the Niagara variety started as a seedling of Concord, our most popular New England grape. The Concord variety was named at Concord, Mass., about 1850, and seems to have been a cross between our wild "fox" grapes and one of the European varieties.

Descended from concord
It is our familiar blue grape, maturing early enough as to usually escape frost damage, and it is the principal source of our grape juice and grape jelly. It can also be used for wine production in the East.

Early attempts to introduce European grape varieties in the colonies along the Atlantic Coast led to repeated failures. The European grapes, sources of most of the world's famous wines, were first grown successfully in America by the Spanish missionaries who planted them in California. Now the bulk of American-produced wine comes from that sunny state.

When Mr. Rossi describes our climate as "almost impossible" for growing grapes, it is in comparing Coventry to the sun-baked slopes of his boyhood home near Asti, in northern Italy. Grapes grow on all the hillside there, while the flatter lowland was planted to wheat, sugar beets and other food crops. The higher one limbed up the hills, the more grapes there were.

Mr. Fred Ayers Verplanck, who was principal of the Ninth District schools and superintendent of schools for the Town of Manchester for so many years, did more than any other person to develop an honorable citizenry in the town. Fortunate indeed was the person who could know him intimately enough to realize his absolute honesty, his tolerance for other peoples faults and weaknesses, his love for good and hate for wrong. I think he was favored with more opportunities to know and be influenced by Mr. Verplanck than were most of the kids in town.

There was a fine elderly lady who had known Verplanck when they were both growing up down in Franklin, Conn., and who could only tell things complimentary to him at that time. She told of one episode that might illustrate a trait of his character.

He had been made a constable and made one arrest. While taking the culprit to be tried, Verplanck was tripped and thrown flat on his face. Before he could get up his man had escaped. Verplanck went right to the authorities and said that any man who could be so easily outwitted by one in his custody was not capable of filling the office, and turned in his badge. He was intelligent, well educated for his time, and physically powerful, but decided that law enforcement was not a career for which he was adaptable.

He went to Yale, graduated, taught school and finally came to Manchester where he spent the rest of his life in dedicated
