





The firms do not object to the goals of the plan which are to provide coverage of catastrophic illnesses. Under the plan, the federal government would pay bills over \$2,000 and provide some form of health insurance program for low-income families to cover the first \$2,000 of annual medical expenses.

The objection is that private firms, rather the federal government, should be the carrier of the over \$2,000 program. The argument is that the private insurance industry has the capacity, experience and the expertise, to best provide for the health insurances needs of the people.

We tend to agree that it would be unwise not to utilize this capacity, experience and expertise.
