

## Impounding By Inaction

The amazing thing about selfgovernment in a democracy is that we often find ourselves trying to march in two opposite directions.

Today, in Connecticut, there is a lot of talk about public education and its needs. There is draft of a Master Plan being reviewed. The mayors are asking the state to pick up more of the cost of education in the elementary and secondary schools. The colleges are not shy either in seeking more fun-

In the other corner is the state administration trying to hold the lid on expenditures which is a favorite partisan topic.

The community college system, of which Manchester Community College is a part, is more than concerned about just where the lines should be drawn in authority over the system's internal affairs.

Last spring, the regional accreditating agency quite bluntly stated the future accreditation of the system's 12 units was in jeopardy because of non-educational agency interference in the system's operations.

The adage of he who pays the piper calls the tune, seems to apply because the final say-so in financial matters, even after budgets are approved and funds appropriated, seems to lie in the hands of the finance commissioner.

While we believe there should be a balance between the colleges desires and legislative appropriations, it would appear that the finance commissioner is going beyond this and in effect, "impounding by inaction," as has been charged.

At issue is his inaction on the promotions of 50 people in the system last May, June and July. Until he approves the promotions, which the state trustees have upon recommendation of the various units, these people are not getting the pay the position calls for. Ironically, they are not getting the normal increment due them

even if they had not been promoted We appreciate thrift in government but we do believe the commissioner has overstepped his bounds in this case. The men and women who were promoted were recognized on the basis of their service and ability and the procedure was the same as used in the past. Budgets included funds for this additional cost. The state trustees approved the promotions. But now these are delayed because a non educational agency, the bookkeepers

He said that if the woman bought another vehicle with the Dec. 1, 1972 insurance settlement, no assessment was made of that vehicle until Oct. 1, 1973, and no tax will be paid on it until July 1, 1974.

Wednesday night it was Rusty Staub. He played with a sor right shoulder, without a sweatshirt and had three singles and a three-run homer as the Mets won 6-1. Thursday night it was Don Hahn, who keeps warm by playing with a sweatshirt. He had a RBI-triple in the Mets' 2-0

The triumph gave New York a 3-2 lead and hopes of ending the season Saturday in Oakland, where Tom Seaver, probably, and Jim "Catfish" Hunter battle in game No. 6. "I'm not unaccustomed to the hero's role," said Hahn, whose sixth-inning triple sent Jerry Grote home with an insurance run. "Remember I won the big game in Pittsburgh." After Joe Rudi made a lunging grab of Cleon Jones' drive to the left-field wall, Jerry Grote laced a single to left, bringing up Hahn. The Mets' centerfielder battered Vida Blue's pitch into the gap in left-centerfield.

#### Eight Die As Truck. **Bus Crash**

BORDENTOWN, N.J.(AP)-A tractor-trailer swerved out of control and across the busy New Jersey Turnpike, slam-ming head-on into a Greyhound bus. State Police said eight per-sons were killed and 13 others The brutal crash occurred Friday night on the busy

thoroughfare. Witnesses said it happened after a tire blowout on the truck. Police said they believe three or four of the dead were passengers in a private car that plowed into the wreckage of the bus moments after the initial crash. Witnesses told police the car was folded up like an accor-

Early today, hours after the 8 p.m. accident, the dead still were not identified, a state police spokesman said.

The silver and blue bus, which reportedly was carrying 16 passengers, was crunched to half its size, its whole front a tangle of twisted metal and blue vinyl seatcovers.

"It looked as if it was sliced off by a knife," a witness said. The truck, carrying a load of meat, bounced off the bus and flipped down an embankment spewing carcasses of beef along
