BORDENTOWN, N.J. (AP)—A tractor-trailer swerved out of control and across the busy highway, slamming into a Greyhound bus. State Police said eight persons were killed and 13 others were hospitalized.

The silver and blue bus, which reportedly was carrying 16 passengers, was crunched to half its size, its whole front a tangled mass of twisted metal and blue vinyl seat covers.
