



Open Season On Nixon

It is almost as predictable as sun up. There is no doubt there are men in Washington who want Richard M. Nixon removed from office. If they cannot prod the House into starting impeachment proceedings, they are ready to hound him out of the White House if they can via public opinion.

The increasing pressures of recent weeks (despite the headline grabbing diversion of the Agnew affair) have been subtly evident for behind the scenes a scenario was being laid out to direct blame for action or inaction on the President whatever happens.

Immediately after the Court of Appeals ruled the Watergate Tapes should be given to Judge Sirica, Nixon critics begin speculation whether he could comply with a "definite" Supreme Court order to do so, assuming he would appeal. The effort, apparently, was to force Nixon into a corner where he would pre-commit his obedience to a Supreme Court ruling knowing fully that, win or lose, the President could not delay Watergate by the appeal process without harming his already damaged

In other words, he had reached the stage where he stood to lose more than he could gain by appealing the wanted an appeal, not because they are basically concerned with over concentration of power in the presidency, but because they do not like this power being vested in Mr.

Mr. Nixon, no political novice, knows when to pull in his horns and the compromise worked out by him and Sens. Ervin and Baker, is essentially along the lines of one suggested several weeks ago by the Court of Appeals in its efforts to head off a constitutional confrontation.

In a nutshell, the President caught his critics by surprise and in doing so he had to make a big sacrifice. Fully aware the compromise would

not be universally acceptable, the President knew, and events tend to bear this out, that the critics only vehicle for their vendetta was Mr. Cox, who was appointed as an "independent" investigator of the Watergate affair. However, his independence, up to his firing, was pretty much a one-way street for while he was careful in not siding with the administration, his lack of attempts to point out instances of cooperation made him an adversary within the administration rather than an unbiased pursuer of truth which some would have us believe.

When all the allegations, oratory, etc. are swept away, the one fundamental issue remains. President Richard M. Nixon's power as president is no different than the power which reposed in all of his

Thus it is not a constitutional crisis of power usurped but rather a political and highly partisan debate over the use or alleged abuse of

The Congress has gone full circle from the hastily adopted Gulf of Tonkin resolution to the current much-debated resolution to limit presidential war-making powers.

When all the hue and cry dies down, the House knows that while it can bring an impeachment bill by a majority vote, the Senate can only do so by a two-thirds vote.

The inferences that the nation could not stand the ordeal of impeachment proceedings is an evasion for the truth of the matter; and, what feally should concern us as citizens, is whether the Congress could conduct impeachment proceedings without destroying what little aura of respect it still has after years of abdication to powerful presidential personalities.

The issue before us is not whether a president should be impeached but whether we have a Congress which could in good conscience do so and really sleep at night.
