Oil Threat Offers Challenge

We viewed the announcement of a 5 per cent per month oil cut made by the oil-producing Arab states as a weak threat to the United States. Nevertheless it is an indication of what might come in more drastic form if the Middle East should grow more tumultuous than it now is. If the Arab states were in dead

earnest about an oil boycott, would not an immediate 100 per cent cutoff have been more in order? Reduction of 5 per cent per month would take about 10 months for a 50 per cent

Fortunately, Arab oil represents only about 6 per cent of our direct oil imports. And if refined products from European sources, which started with Arab crude, are included the shortage would be about 10 per cent, if all oil from those sources were to vanish.

There is probably a good bit of selfinterest in the Arab announcement from Beirut. The black gold under the Arab sands have made the Arab countries among the richest in the world. Alaskan fields must be put on stream as soon as it is humanly possible. Oil shale development cannot continue to lag. And the development of nuclear plants, as well as other sources of energy must be pursued.

We are told that we have enough coal to last 600 years at the present rate of consumption. Are we then to be the victims of Arab blackmail, while sitting on such a trove of energy? We would think not. Our energy situation will never

be the same. We now know that we cannot depend on the Arabs for our needs. We must look to our own ingenuity or accept a perilous predica-And a priority must be established.

Energy must be produced as our most necessary goal. Protection of the ecology is desireable and should be a goal, but it is a secondary one.



PUD Would Offer Tight Land Control

MARGARET LACROIX (This is the second in a series of articles on Planned Unit Development, a type of planning tool being recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission)

The land squeeze of today has made land use control a very crucial issue. The adoption of Planned Unit Development (PUD) in South Windsor will give the Planning and Zoning Commission tight control of the town's land use. The commission favors this type of control.

Commission Chairman William Grace said that the PZC favors PUD because it prevents piecemeal development of the town. There are many small subdivisions in South Windsor that are each units in and of themselves. There is no thought as to how each affects the other. There is no continuity of development.

Planned Residential Zoning regulations allows the commission inout as well as control from the very beginning. This is the strength of the plan. It provides an orderly method for absorbing the natural growth of

The report of the Governor's Task Force on Housing also favors PUD. The report states that PUD can since large scale developing can reduce the cost of land acquisition and development. The developer's savings can be passed along to the consumer Opposition to establishing a PR zone comes mainly from residents

and homebuilders. Some residents believe that South Windsor already has too many apartments and the housing mix will only bring more. Homebuilders say that zoning regulations which sound good on paper can often bomb in the real estate game. Efforts to protect the town can produce a marketplace of housing that does not appeal to the house-

buying public.

Also, the cost of the housing may increase rather than decrease if the commission's demands on the developer are so rigid that he cannot cut the usual cost corners. For example, if a developer had 100

acres to develop into half acre lots, he could ideally have 200 lots. According to the PR regulations he must give 20 per cent of the acreage for open space and recreation facilities. This leaves him with only 160 lots. Already he has lost money.

Now that the plan is being considered by the commission, the final part of this series will discuss some of the ramifications of adoption.

You can help conserve America's limited sources of energy, and save yourself some money in the bargain, while you keep comfortably warm this winter . . . regardless of what kind of heat you have.

If your house isn't ready for winter, now's the time to

Insulation, for instance. Do you have enough? The National Bureau of Standards tells us that six inches of insulation over your top floor ceiling will pay for itself in fuel savings and your home will be more comfortable in summer as well as winter. (And, many times, installing it is simply a matter of laying it between floor joists in the attic.) Sidewall insulation probably requires professional installation, but it, too, will quickly pay for itself.

Seal off your house. Can you feel a draft around windows or doors? Weatherstripping and/or caulking is the answer here.

Storm windows and doors will reduce heat loss. They'll also reduce that drafty feeling you get when you're sitting or stanging near a window or door.

Keep your heating plant running efficiently. To insure dependable operation, have your heating system inspected and serviced annually by your heating

Don't block off your heat source. Be careful not to block radiators and registers with furniture or floor-length drapes. Let the heat circulate.

Seal off upper floors. Remember . . . heat rises. If you have a door at the top of the stairs, especially the stairs leading to the attic, keep it closed. Weatherstripping

Repair leaky faucets, especially hot water faucets. Even a slight leak can waste considerable amounts

Don't play with thermostats. Set your thermostat to maintain the lowest comfortable temperature and leave it alone. However, a six to eight degree setback at night may provide some small savings. Reduce thermostat settings if you are going to be away for a few days.

If you have a fireplace, use it wisely. Be certain to close the damper when the fire is completely out. Don't let your room heat go up the chimney.
