MEAs Backs School Issue Casino Night Planned

The representative council of the Manchester Education Association has unanimously voted to support the referendum question seeking additions to and renovations of the Iling and Bennett Junior High Schools.

At Bennett, the renovations will bring the school up to fire and safety standards. A much needed library-medical center and gymnasium facilities will also be added. Bennett currently has only one quarter the area it needs for library facilities to accommodate its student body.

Also provided will be an upgrading of classrooms and science labs, eliminating the use of substandard areas now employed for art, music, and physical education.

"If I filing, additions will allow all Iling Junior High students to be housed in one building. Additional facilities in such areas as science, business, music, and learning disabilities will be built. And, with the moving of the Iling Jr. High back to its own school, Manchester High School students will be able to take courses which have been unavailable to them due to lack of space.

"The MEA endorses the referendum in the Nov. 6 election as a vital step toward a complete education for students in all sections of Manchester.

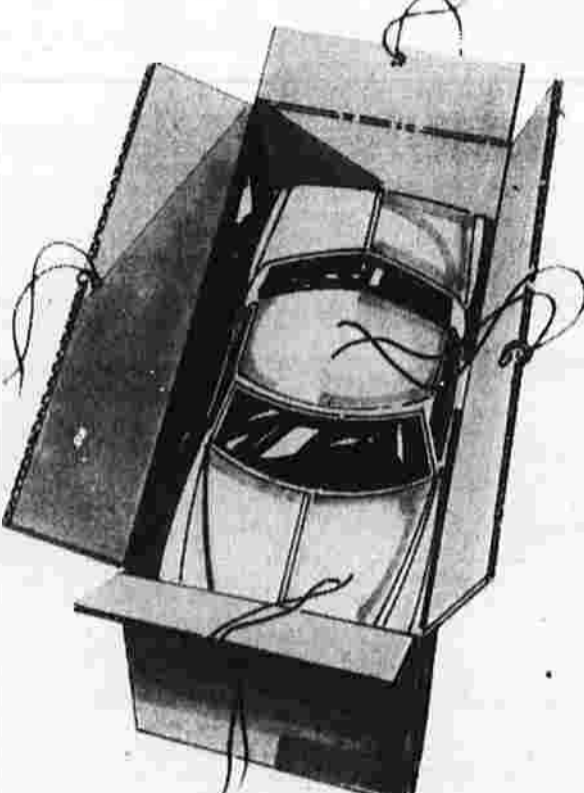

Nixon Confident Of Mideast Peace

Arab, Israeli Guns Silent

Arab and Israeli guns were silent today as U.N. peacekeeping troops continued to move into Cairo, Russia said on Friday it had sent "representatives" to the Middle East to observe the cease-fire.

In Washington, President Nixon told a news conference that the United States would use its influence to bring about a negotiated settlement in the Middle East.

Stock Market Bullish

NEW YORK (AP) — Optimistic investors have strongly boosted stock market prices today as the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials to its highest closing point since Feb. 13.

At the market's close Friday, analysts said the broad gains registered were helped by reports of lessened tensions in the Mideast and by a lack of unsettling news from other areas.

Also credited with helping the market surge was First National City Bank's reduction of its prime rate to 9 1/2 percent and the federal government's announcement that an extremely favorable balance of trade occurred in September.

The Dow averages, considered a general indicator of the market's condition, closed up 12.57 at 967.06, and 915 New York Stock Exchange issues advanced while 532 declined.

Despite the week's negative news, analysts said the market was not discouraged.

"We're in a reverse situation," said Alan C. Poole, head of Chicago-based Leo Burnett & Co., an advertising agency. "When the market refuses to do badly to bad news, then it does well with no news. I can't help but be bullish."

Tougher Air Pollution Rules Offered

WASHINGTON (AP) — New shopping centers, ball parks, highways, airports and anything else that attracts large numbers of cars or planes would be banned if they cause violations of clean air standards, under regulations proposed Friday by the Environmental Protection Agency.

EPA proposed state review of plans for achieving national air quality standards under a court order won by the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC), a citizen environment group.

Meanwhile, NRDC has renewed its legal attack by charging that EPA was moving too slowly and was being influenced and impeded by the White House Office of Management and Budget.

In a petition filed Wednesday, NRDC asked a federal appeals court to cite EPA for contempt of court for missing an Oct. 15 deadline to propose its regulations, and to enjoin the OMB from hindering EPA's issuance of further regulations.

At a news conference Friday, however, EPA administrator Russell E. Train denied that his agency's action was delayed by

Raise Oil Tax
CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Venezuela, the second largest exporter of oil to the United States, has increased the tax valuation on exported oil by 56 percent effective Nov. 1. The move, which is comparable with increasing the assessed valuation of real estate, will raise the cost of Venezuelan oil for foreign consumers. There was no immediate comment from the oil companies.

Alert Lessened
WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. nuclear long-range bomber, missile and air defense forces have been taken off alert while some military units may remain on that status even though the U.S.-Soviet crisis over the Middle East appears to be ended.

Resentment Stirred
WASHINGTON (AP) — Resentment has been stirred among many members of the Delegate Selection Commission by Democratic National Chairman Robert S. Strauss' recommendation that former New York Mayor Robert F. Wagner head a committee that will make sure states comply with revised federal rules.

Denies Wrongdoing
WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Buttz has denied any wrongdoing in his request that the Federal Trade Commission delay antitrust action against one of the nation's leading winemakers. The action came after the 1972 election and reportedly was being investigated by the campaign contributions task force of the Justice Department's special prosecutor.

Step Up Attacks
SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese and Viet Cong forces are stepping up their attacks and trying new tactics, a Saigon military spokesman said today.

France, Spain Raise Prices Of Gasoline
PARIS (AP) — The French and Spanish governments have raised the price of gasoline and other oil products because of increases announced by oil-producing countries.

The price of gasoline in France goes up to 10 centimes per liter — about eight cents per gallon — today. The hike brings the price of high-grade gasoline to 1.36 francs per liter, or about \$1.23 per gallon. Corresponding price increases were announced for fuel oil.

Increases ranging from nine to 18.5 percent effective Jan. 1 were announced Friday in Madrid. The largest hike is for high-octane gasoline, which went from 13.5 to 16 pesetas per liter, or from 91 cents to \$1.06 per gallon. Fuel oil will cost 200 pesetas — \$3.50 — more per ton.

Helpful Utility
GLENNVILLE, W.Va. (AP) — Residents of Gilmer County will not have to worry about turning their electric clocks back tonight when the nation reverts to standard time. It will be done automatically for them by Monongahela Power Co.

The utility announced plans earlier this week to install a new transformer near here and to load residents of the county the project would take an hour and before its inception, but it has slackened off since then.

Cease-Fire On Home Front May Prove More Difficult

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, in a wide ranging news conference, said he was confident that a "cease-fire" domestically may be more difficult.

In the 40-minute session with newsmen in the East Room of the White House Friday night, Nixon also got in a swipe at the news media and took an opportunity to praise his friend Charles "Bebe" Rebozo.

On the Mideast, Nixon said it was his closeness with Soviet Leader Leonid I. Brezhnev that averted a confrontation between the two superpowers and offered a promise of peace between Arabs and Israelis.

"I do not mean to suggest that it is going to come quickly because the parties involved are still rather far apart, but I do say that now there are greater incentives within the area to find a peaceful solution."

The President said the United States and the Soviets had agreed to use their influence more than ever to bring about negotiations in the Mideast.

Nixon said he ordered an alert of U.S. armed forces because the United States had reason to believe the Soviet Union was planning to send "a very substantial force into the Mideast, a military force."

But he said that situation has changed and the outlook for peace is the best it has been in 20 years.

"...because we had our initiative with the Soviet Union, because I had a basis of communication with Mr. Brezhnev, we not only avoided a confrontation but we moved a great step forward toward real peace in the Mideast."

As for naming a special Watergate prosecutor to replace Archibald Cox, Nixon ordered fired Saturday, the President said.

"Turning now to the subject of our attempts to get a cease-fire on the home front, that is a bit more difficult..."

Nixon said he would let Acting Atty. Gen. Robert H. Bork name a new prosecutor.

But later in the news conference, Nixon said he didn't want to leave the impression "that I don't respect the reports."

"What I was simply saying was this: that when a commentator takes a bit of news and then, with distortion of what the facts are, knows it viciously, I have no respect for the individual."

Asked about a \$100,000 campaign contribution from billionaire Howard Hughes which his friend Rebozo held onto for three years, Nixon said his friend is a totally "honest man."

But a federal agency is considering whether to suspend his as president of a Florida bank because of a \$100,000 loan. Bank officials have denied they knew the stock was stolen.

Nixon said that after Rebozo received the contribution, the Hughes company "had an internal fight of massive proportions, and he felt that such a contribution to the campaign might prove to be embarrassing."

Nixon said he thought Rebozo's handling of the Hughes company "is a pretty good indication that he is a totally honest man, which he is."

Following the news conferences, many members of Congress credited Nixon with diplomatic success in reducing tensions in the Middle East but said he failed to end suspicions about his willingness to permit a complete and independent Watergate investigation.

Vice President-designate Gerald R. Ford suggested Nixon name former Atty. Gen. Elliot L. Richardson to replace Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., said, "I do not believe his recommendations for a special prosecutor are adequate, and Congress will not accept them. We need an independent prosecutor."

"A year ago this time there were great newspaper ads, there were a number of public seminars run by the companies and the agents. Every service club in the state had a no-fault speaker," Maloney said. "It does make a difference."

"I have never seen such outrageous, vicious, distorted reporting in 27 years of public life," he said.

After Nixon bluntly singled out television news commentators for criticism, a network correspondent asked: "What is it about the television of these past weeks and months that has so aroused your anger?"

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School Bus Safety Vital

Plea Bargaining

WASHINGTON — Gully or innocent of the charges brought against him by witnesses seeking immunity, Spiro Agnew has put his finger on the weakness—and, yes, evils—of the so-called plea bargaining system.

In his farewell address, Agnew submitted no substantial defense on his record as a public office holder in Maryland and in Washington. But he did ask the question that has been asked by many observers of our criminal justice system, to wit, how much reliance can be placed on the testimony of witnesses seeking immunity from prosecution?

Agnew claimed the government's corruption case against him was based on statements of only four out of 200 witnesses interviewed by Justice Department prosecutors. The government has publicly acknowledged four witnesses against Agnew but has not indicated whether there are any others who accused him of taking bribes.

Well, four witnesses are not enough if their testimony can be supported by documentary or other substantial evidence. One witness is enough. But the circumstances also must be considered.

As in all plea bargaining cases, the accused of Agnew were also the accused. The government was investigating them for complicity in the so-called scandal that brought down a Vice President. It is not to descend to the depths of cynicism

to suggest that the pressure on these witnesses must have been strong to contribute to a strong case against Agnew in order to soften their own punishment. The record shows that individuals caught in wrongdoing frequently were perjured themselves to please a prosecutor seeking evidence against the Big Banana.

Agnew's defense is in the form of a question: "What is that makes my accusers—self-confessed bribe-takers, extortionists and conspirators—believable?" It is a question to which we are competent to answer. When a man is faced with 10 years in prison, it is understandable if Agnew's arraignment went further and called no co-defendant identical with a guilty plea.

Listeners Give Views On Nixon Press Session

Kipp, the retired engineer, downed a bourbon-and-coke at the club bar and said: "Seeing him on television tonight has gratified my respect for the man and what he has gone through. It must have been a very troublesome week. I think he's out of the thick of it now."

Kipp was one of only five persons who viewed the conference at the club. As the President began to speak, one member called to a friend across the bar: "Harry, do you want to watch Nixon or play cards?"

"Hell," replied his friend, "let's play cards." With that, they adjourned to the card tables.

At the Steel Workers Bar, most of the dozen or so patrons elected to drink their draft beers or shoot pool, ignoring the portable TV at the end of the bar. At least one who did watch was not impressed.

"He's the biggest crook we ever had," said auto mechanic John Ronkovic. "I think we need something like he have in England. When a politician doesn't have a lot of confidence they throw him out."

The pale blue light of the TV illuminated one corner of the room at the end of the Watergate tapes dispute, to update the nation on the boiling Middle East crisis and to face questions from what he clearly considered a hostile press corps.

And once again, America listened.

"But we're sitting in on history," objected Paul King, 23, when his fiancee, Martha Griswold, 19, stopped by the family's farmhouse in Westbury, N.H., to pick him up for a Friday night wedding rehearsal.

"We're going to be late," she insisted. She prevailed, and Paul departed with her for the church, leaving his parents, sister and hired man Frank Pitti to watch the President on a poorly tuned color television set.

"It seems his foreign policy is on the right track, but at home here's still in trouble," commented Leslie Knox, 33, owner of the prosperous farm. "Nixon was working for a raise, but he certainly won't get a raise, and I might fire him."

Knox wiggled his toes in his blue wool socks and nibbled at the remains of a stuffed pepper dinner as the President's criticism of the media. His wife, Barbara, sat nearby.

"I agree with the President, about television," he said. "I only they would give equal time to the good things that are happening. Always it's the political deceit and the bad things."

The Bill Sweeney family watched the conference in the family room of their white-framed home in Arlington Heights, a Chicago suburb. The youngest of their six children, 4-year-old Peggy, appeared most interested in whether she would hear "The Star-Spangled Banner."

"I don't know any more now than I did before," said Sweeney, a 35-year-old transportation executive. "He avoided the domestic crisis and talked all about the international things."

His wife, Marilyn, felt the same. "I can't help but think that the Mideast thing is just something to calm Watergate down."

About 10 persons watched the news conference in the lobby of the Doral Hotel in Miami Beach. Tom Mears, a paper company executive from Tibboux, La., felt the President handled himself well.

"I think he explained fully why he fired (Watergate special prosecutor Archibald) Cox," Mears said. "Nobody could impeach him. I think the press has been irresponsible and inaccurate."

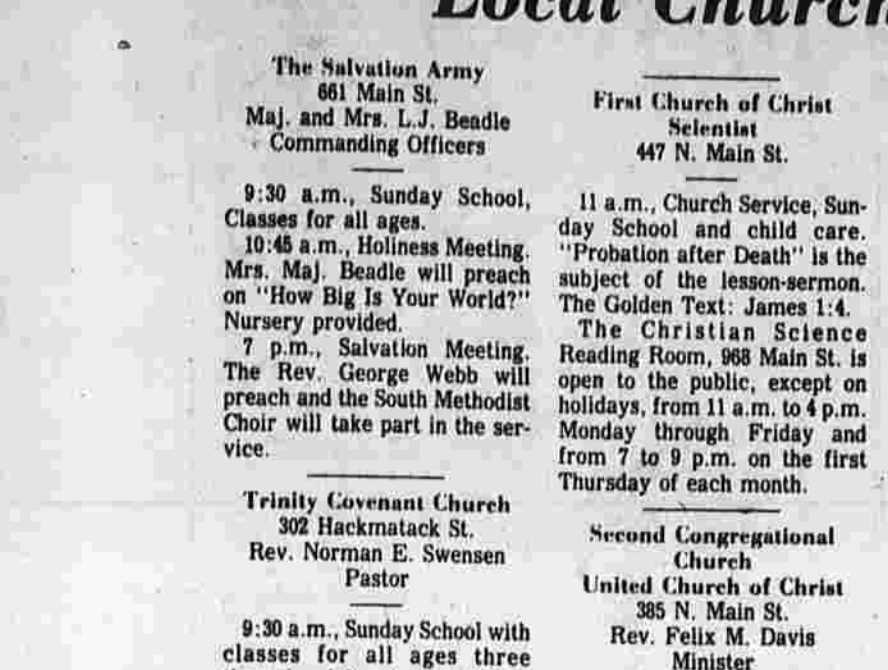

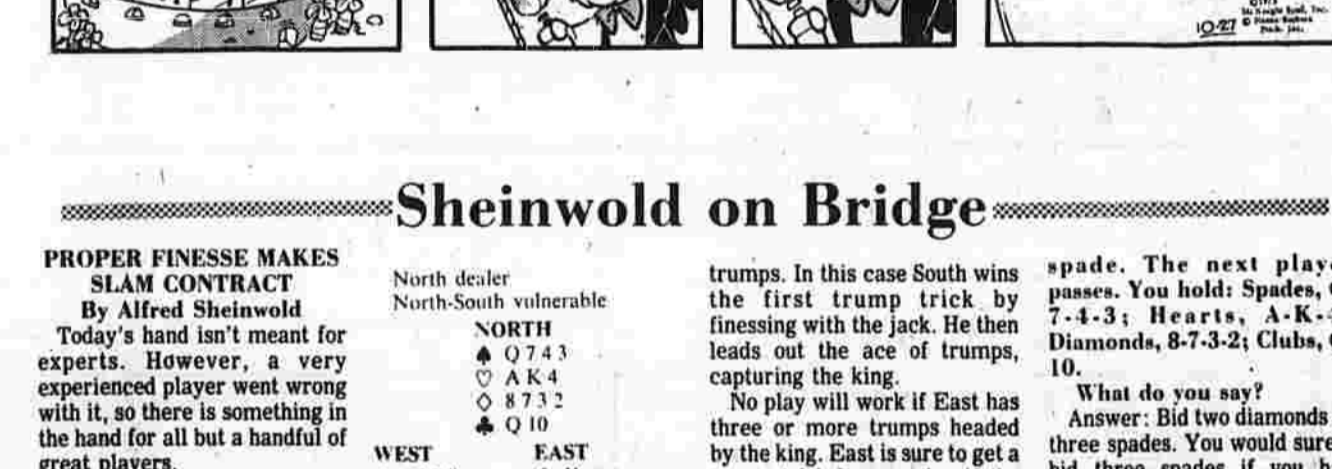

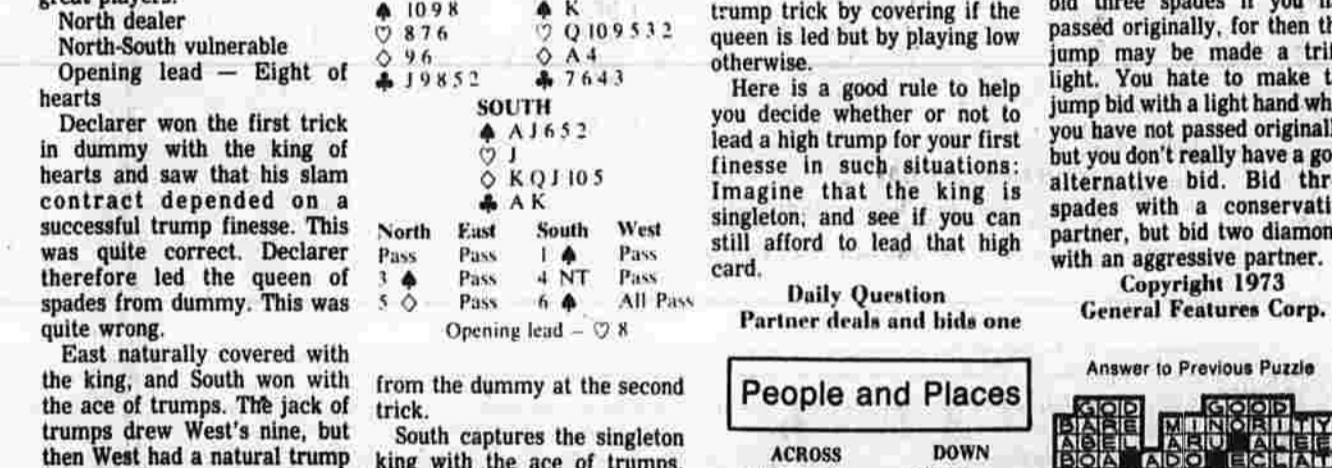

Giants Grid Kings

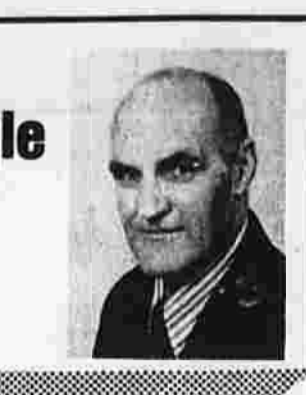

NEW YORK (AP) — Southern California, unbeaten but tied, puts his hopes for a second consecutive national championship on the line today against Notre Dame in one of college football's great rivalries.

"This is the biggest intersectional game of the year," says Coach John McKay of Southern Cal. "It always is, and I'm enjoying the hell out of it. I'll enjoy it win, lose or draw."

A sellout crowd of 59,075 will jam Notre Dame Stadium for the battle between sixth-ranked Southern Cal, 5-0, and the No. 10 Fighting Irish, 5-0. ABC-TV will beam the game to some 85 per cent of the country.

It's the weekend's only meeting of teams ranked in the Top Ten—or, for that matter, in the Top Twenty—by The Associated Press.

Angelo Argea likes his job. He's been the tour caddy for Jack Nicklaus for the past 11 years. A playing golf professional makes his living playing golf. Angelo's boss has won more money during his career than any other golfer in history.

A touring caddy is one that carries clubs for a special pro and no one else. Both women and men pros have them. A caddy follows the golfer from tournament to tournament. He gets to travel and see a lot of the country and its golf courses.

Like any tour caddy, Angelo "steps off the course" before play starts. This means that he walks around the course and counts how many strokes it is from one point to another. Then he writes it down. In practice rounds, Nicklaus will "step off the yardage" and the two will compare notes. By knowing the distances, Nicklaus will know which club to use. If Nicklaus asks his advice, Angelo will suggest a club.

Caddying for a pro is serious business. Often a great deal of money is at stake. Each pro works out the salary for his own caddy. Some caddies receive a fee for each tournament, plus a percentage of the pro's winnings. A caddy has other jobs, too. When the tournament is too far away for the pro to drive to he will often fly. His caddy will drive his car and meet him there.

Out of about 25 tournaments Nicklaus played this year, Angelo caddied for 18. Some golf tournaments, such as the Masters, won't let the pros use their own caddies.

Not all professionals have touring caddies. Each tournament has a Caddy Master whose job it is to line up local people to carry the bags. These caddies usually attend classes where they are given special training. When playing time comes, the caddies draw their pro name out of a hat.

Jack Nicklaus used to caddy for his father. Lee Trevino, Tom Weiskopf, and Bud Allin caddied when they were growing up. It's a good way to learn the game of golf. It's also a good way to pick up some extra spending money.
