

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
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

Impoundment Problem

We do not intend to get involved on either side of the issue of who is right or wrong in the matter of so-called mpoundment of state and federal

But, we think there are some basic ground rules that should be understood by those taking sides on the impoundment question.

First, ground rule one to remember, is that neither the Congress or the Assembly is infallible. For just as you hear many instances where they have failed to adequately fund deserving programs; they have just as surely, at times, attempted to fill bottomless pits with money.

Second, the executive branches of government are not infallible either and impoundment, depending upon motive, may or may not be good. It can be good if it serves as a check or balance on legislative excess and it can be bad if it is used to thwart a legitimate legislative act.

system of checks and balances and while we can challenge how the tool is being used in specific instances, we should be wary of challenging the right to have the tool ready should legitimate reasons arise.

Whether Gov. Meskill or President Nixon are right or wrong in any or all of the specific instances in which they have impounded appropriated funds must be decided on a case by case

The executive should have the power; but must be prepared to defend the withholding of funds as a principle and as a check and balance on the legislative.

For as we have stated neither governors, presidents nor legislators, are infallible and any provision-even impoundment of funds - which can prevent fiscal excesses should not hastily be discarded.

First, can the judiciary, the executive or the Congress, constitutionally appoint a truly ''independent'' Watergate prosecutor?

Whoever is appointed has to be responsible to someone and someone has to be in a position to remove the public official, special prosecutor or otherwise, if his performance does not fulfill his directives. The question then of

"independence" in a prosecutor is one of semantics for what the Congress may define as independence is just a way of saying the President should not be able to fire him. They can ask this but would they, if they created a congressional prosecutor, be willing to allow the same protection? We think

As for the judiciary appointing a special prosecutor, there is a serious question of ethics that a judge should name a prosecutor to conduct a probe and, if the evidence warrants it, seek

And finally, by designating whoever is given the task as a "special prosecutor," aren't we compromising his independence?

To be truly independent, we need an investigator wholly free to absolve as well as seek indictments in the course of his investigation.

If the justice department is considered unable to conduct an impartial investigation of Watergate, the Congress should take over the task either through a special committee or the current Watergate committee. To expect the President to appoint a special prosecutor "without any strings attached" would be just as unconstitutional as giving the joint chief of staff the right to use hydrogen
