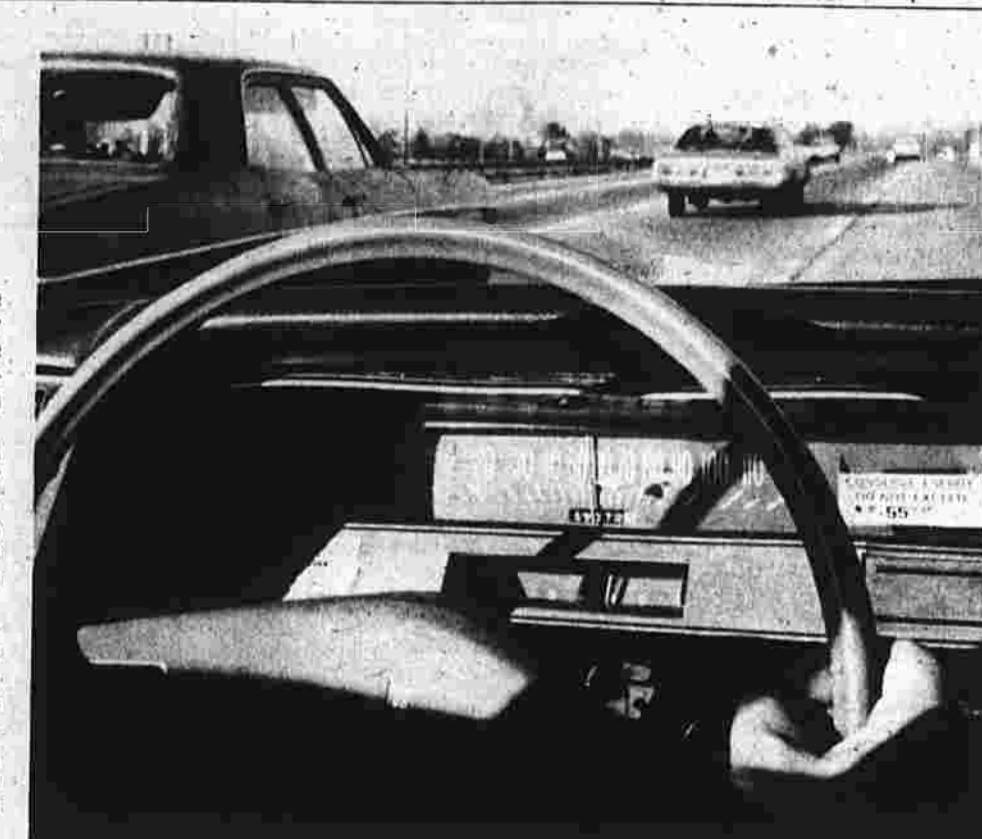

The two citizen groups have appealed to city officials to conduct citywide screening tests for cases of blood poisoning, which occurs most often in run-down neighborhoods where small children eat chips of lead-based paint, or plaster.

State health officials have acknowledged that lead poisoning is a widespread problem in all of Connecticut's cities.

The school board has granted the Columbia Teacher's Association a \$150 raise in addition to the annual \$50 increment.

The contract agreement, agreed upon and signed Saturday, after about a year of bargaining, was the first time benefits were negotiated.

Under the contract, teachers will receive a \$200 raise in addition to the \$50 increment during the second year of the contract.

The salary schedule for this year sets the base at \$7,700 for four-year preparation; \$8,200 for five-year preparation and \$8,700 for six-year preparation.

The contract covers grievance procedure, staff salaries, personal days, association leave, conference leave and general leave.

Salary increments may only be withheld on the basis of unsatisfactory performance, the contract states.

The contract included degree definitions and insurance benefits.

Teachers are covered under the full Connecticut Blue Cross plan under extended plan Cross semi-private credit rider with additional rider "benefits" in effect for subscribing member and family.

Full Connecticut Medical Service under Century Contract plan is provided as well as Major Medical Insurance coverage.

Maternity leave provisions provide that any teacher who becomes pregnant will begin her leave when in her doctor's opinion she is no longer physically able to work, or upon confinement, whichever comes first.

Downtown Manchester merchant Bruce Watkins has been appointed to "latrine detail" by the Mayor's Downtown Action Committee. Downtown committee chairman William Sleith this morning asked Watkins to check into availability of toilet facilities for downtown shoppers.

Watkins said, "I'll get a list of toilets." Sleith initiated the discussion this morning when he commented on the lack of public toilet facilities on Main St. He said toilets are "all part of serving the public and doing business."

Watkins mentioned that downtown merchants often have discussed possibility of a "comfort station" in a central area in the business district, but the question of maintenance has been a problem.

Sleith said merchants could take the necessary steps to "fix up" their existing store toilet facilities and make them available to the public.

"They (the merchants) ought to get with it," Sleith said, maintaining that the project would be "an important plus Main St. could do for itself."

Killian Rules On Rate Hike For Hospitals

HARTFORD (AP)—State Atty. Gen. Robert K. Killian ruled Wednesday that the state Hospital and Health Care Commission has the authority to order Connecticut hospitals, which boosted rates above the 6 per cent level Oct. 1, to make refunds.

The ruling was one of several questions that the commission had requested Killian to make when several hospitals in the state defied the commission's Oct. 6 suspension of all hikes.

Killian's other rulings stated: —That rate hikes of less than 6 per cent may be ordered refunded at the commission's discretion.

—That the commission cannot approve rate hikes above 6 per cent prior to a public hearing.

—That the commission had no legal right to rescind rate hike requests until Oct. 1.

At a hearing Wednesday, attorney George Nicholas of Bridgeport representing Stamford Hospital, challenged the power of the commission to review rates at all. He said the federal Economic Stabilization Act preempted the powers of the commission.

Nicholas claimed that the commission could not review increases over 6 per cent until January 1974.

Hebron Historical Society Plans Events

Twenty-six dealers will be exhibiting a variety of furniture and accessories to interest every collector at the fourth annual Hebron Historical Society Antique Show and Sale Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Rham High School.

In conjunction with the show, the Burrows Hill Schoolhouse and the Old Town Hall will be open to the public.

The schoolhouse, a charming example of yesterday's educational facilities, is a red clapboard one-room school built very early in the 18th century.

The original furnishings include the schoolmaster's desk and a long slate blackboard situated in the front of the room. The students' desks and long bench-seats were mellowed by the many generations of Hebron children.

The low wood-burning stove still stands in the center of the room. The schoolhouse was used continuously until the early twentieth century. It was then cared for by Edward Smith until he turned over the keys to the Hebron Historical Society in 1971. The building was restored to its present form under the expert guidance of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Brink of Brink's Mill, Hebron.

The Old Town Hall, built in 1838 at the meetinghouse for the Methodist Episcopal Society, will be the setting for early

home industries demonstrations in conjunction with the antique show. The building was purchased by the town in 1863 for \$600 and since that time it has served as a courtroom, polling place, ballroom and orange hall.

It was last used by the town in 1963 and in 1971 the deed was turned over to the Hebron Historical Society. Proceeds from the show will be used for continuation of the restoration project on the building.

And in keeping with the society's aim to open the building as a museum to foster an interest in Hebron history and to acquaint the community with the lifestyle of earlier generations a number of early crafts will be demonstrated.

Included in these crafts will be spinning and weaving, hand quilting, leaded glass designs, tape-weaving and blacksmithing.

Among the quilts to be displayed are Mrs. Bennett's Temple's Album Quilt, a copy of an 1824 quilt owned by the DAR in Maryland and Baltimore's Star Quilt as well as several made by Mrs. Ethel Brehant including one with flower designs of the fifty states.

And perhaps the most famous "One-Of-A-Kind" treasure, made in 1918 and auctioned off to raise funds to assist the American Red Cross during World War I is a full-sized quilt made by the Amston School Red Cross Unit and friends.

Known as a "Remembrance Quilt," it features a centered two-foot size Red Cross surrounded by squares containing 610 names of Hebron and Amston residents hand-written in permanent ink. The townspeople donated a sum to have their names inscribed on a square.

According to a newspaper article of June 1, 1918 describing the auctioning off of the bedquilt "after some fine speaking and singing by the children, the quilt was sold to Mrs. Gertrude Fries for twenty-six dollars, making a total of \$76 on the quilt."

The article goes on to say that "quite a number of fine coats and small articles were sold for twenty dollars and six cents and a pig, generously donated by Mr. Ames brought the sum of \$23.50. A ball game between the Bloomer girls and the boys was enjoyed and caused much merriment. The total receipts of the sale were one hundred and fourteen dollars and ten cents, which has been turned in to the Red Cross."

The quilt has been presented to the Hebron Historical Society by members of the Fries family with the stipulation that ownership of the quilt will not be changed without their consent and secondly, that should the Hebron Historical Society

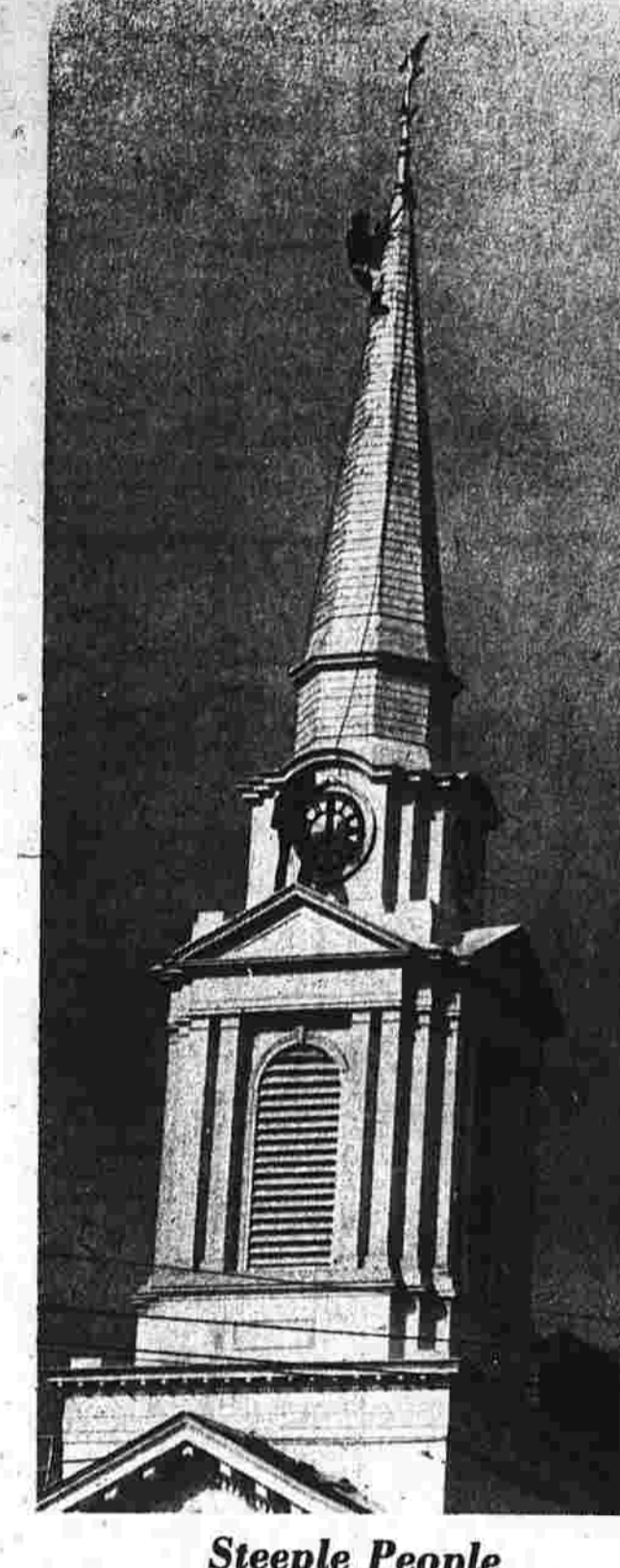
