# Election Reform

The election is over and while assessments as to why some lost and others won are being made; it is also a good time to reassess the election process in Connecticut.

It may be more than a coincidence but the state will be having a series of public hearings later this month on election law reforms.

And now in the wake of the election, we would hope that the parties, the candidates, and, most important, the voters, would reflect on the past campaign in general and the whole voting process in particular from registration on through the actual lever flipping with the idea of submitting to the election reform committee ideas on how the mechanics of conducting elections might be improved.

Some of the areas are quite complex and perhaps so because past experience has made it necessary. Others, to us, seem to belong to a different age when voters and communications were less sophisticated.

For the sake of discussion and with the thought of stimulating some soulsearching we offer the following random thoughts on the election process

First, the method of voter-making or registration seems to be unduly registration by party designation or for those who shun party labels as an unaffiliated voter.

We think an affidavit-type of registration could accomplish the same thing as the more formalized oath-taking process we now use.

We would suggest too that the large numbers of citizens who exercise the option of being listed as unaffiliated should cause concern. It might be better for Connecticut in the long run if all voters were registered as unaffiliated and make both parties concentrate less on the numbers game and more on issues and candidates which is the way people vote.

This of course might open the door to a direct primary system of selecting candidates which many states now use successfully. Understandably, in states where party registration is permitted and candidates are selected by some form of political caucus, this may be too much to ask of

our political parties. We realize the economic merits of limiting elections whenever possible to the regular mandatory ones but we wonder if we sometimes thwart the democratic process by overloading some elections with too many issues for the voters to fully understand and vote intelligently.

In Manchester Tuesday we had the regular slate of office candidates, bond issue for the schools, and 12 charter revision questions, which by the way could not be fully explained on the machines because of lack of space. And as we understand it, there were other towns where there were many more levers to flip.

And of course there is the perennial issue of whether there should be a party lever and if so just how it should be worked out mechanically.

As we have stated, we raise these questions not as the ultimate solutions but to stimulate interest in election making voting easier and more efficient; and in doing so getting more people to vote on the issues that come

before a democratic society. There must be safeguards against vote manipulation and fraud. But on the other hand, the voting process should not be allowed to become so complicated that it deters voting by

Let us hope the next Assembly can and will have before it make constructive and forward-looking suggestions to make voting easier along with better understanding of what and who we are voting for so as to cummunicate better to the electorate.

# World Series Splits Reach All-Time High

NEW YORK (AP) - When the Oakland A's won the World Series in 1972, they pocketed about \$20,000 apiece. For doing the same thing this year, they each came away with better than \$24,000.

That's inflation for you.

Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn released the World Series shares Thursday with the A's victory over New York worth a record \$24,-760.87 per man and the losing Mets getting \$14,960.18 apiece.

The biggest payoff pool in World Series history resulted from record attendances for the five-game National and American League playoffs as well as the Series, The ombined total attendance was 643,-

The total player purse was \$1,992,-461.17 with receipts for World Series and league championship series reaching \$5,337,281.25. The commissioner's office and both league offices share in the receipts as well as the participating World Series clubs and the first three finishers in each of baseball's four divisions.
